#### Into the Darkness

It is not so much suffering that draws us close to Christ, as Christ our Lord who in His suffering and scandalous death on the cross

draws near to our sufferings and afflictions as human beings.

Recently, sitting with a friend over coffee, I fell into one of those conversations that does not really end when you move off to the next appointment but keeps cycling and deepening throughout the day. We were talking about death, and what the Church teaches, and what it all really means, and what we really believe. It was one of those conversations that we so often avoid because of our fear: fear of death itself; but also fear that, if we think about death, we shall discover how thin is the ice of our faith, and shall fall, irredeemably, into the bone-chilling waters of despair. Better to whistle through the graveyard, or watch another episode of the Kardashians—such is the way we hide from our fears and from the fathomless mystery of eternity.

Yet, I think, for many of us, the fear and the dread may be masked, but are never effectively escaped. Rather, fear and dread float constantly in the background of our thoughts and in the recesses of our hearts—like Muzak of the soul—and though it may seem sometimes louder and sometimes softer, depending on the other noises which distract us, such fear and dread are always there, waiting for an occasion to swell and consume our attention again—as when someone we love dies, or when we see a death that seems sudden and incomprehensible: the death of a child, the death of a young father, the random death of a friend through senseless violence or freak accident.

In these moments, the depth of Catholic theology resonates with a power and a beauty that is often forgotten in dealing with lesser things. Unlike many traditions, Catholicism refuses the facile answer that death and suffering are simply a part of God's hidden plan, and that if we knew more or were more faithful, we would all be happy in the midst of what seems like great loss. Though God's goodness does transcend and redeem human suffering, that redemption is not a denial of such suffering, nor is that transcendence an excuse for avoidance. Indeed, the healing message of Christ's cross is linked to the reality of the suffering he accepts out of love for us. Thus, while we may console each other with an acknowledgement of God's ultimate triumph, we must reject a theology that seeks to explain away the greatest of human sorrows in tragically simplistic terms. Such theology is just another way of avoiding the depth of the mystery we face, and the breadth of the love that is offered us in God's response.

In the Catholic tradition, immersed as it is in the notion of Incarnation and Sacrament (i.e., in the belief that God has become flesh and that ordinary things radiate with sacred meaning), human suffering and loss are not covered-over by Divine Providence, not explained away by some unknown but reasonable Divine Plan. Instead, in our tradition, the gap is real and the wound is true. There is no simple explanation that can wipe away human suffering, no Divine Plan that relieves us (or should relieve us) of our sense of loss, or even our sense of dread. Indeed, nothing in God closes the abyss to let the faithful walk over. On the contrary, our tradition holds that God enters the world to share with us the whole of the human experience—even suffering, even loss, even dread; thus, when Jesus weeps at the tomb of Lazarus, or cries out in anguish on the cross, he is not play-acting, but living fully the pain and loss we all know too well. His suffering, his anguish of heart and body, make Jesus our brother and consoles us in ways no teaching ever could.

So often, in moments of greatest need, the theology of the Church can seem too distant, too mechanical to penetrate the darkness we may feel. Notions of God's Providence or the trials of the faithful or even the promise of Eternal Life—where suffering is no more and the virtuous find peace and consolation—all fall like ashes on the tongue. That is not to deny the truth of these teachings, but only to acknowledge that such concepts, as concepts, are often insufficient consolation when moments of dread descend upon us. To one who mourns or to those filled with the fear of death, theology is like a perfect mathematical truth: elegant and even graceful, but unable to touch fully the mystery of the human heart or comfort us in the midst of incalculable loss and anguish. We all stumble in these moments, looking for words or ideas, when words and ideas are impossibly limited.

In these moments, there is only one answer to the mystery of the abyss, only one response that is both honest and faithful to the reality we stand before—and this is the answer God gives. Not words, but presence. Not thoughts, but embrace. Not answers, but a hand held out, arms opened wide. It is not an explanation of suffering that we receive in Christ Jesus, but the love of One who knows what we have been through, and who has shared it fully. Because of the cross of Jesus, God, knows what it is to lose a Son, and knows the dread of entering death with only faith that death will not triumph. Because of the cross, God offers comfort, not as an outsider, but as one of us. In Christ Jesus, the wisdom of God abandons trying to explain the abyss, and instead takes our hand and jumps in at our side. Such love is the only answer we get, the only answer that can bring us back to life, and the only answer that we can share with those who may need such life from us.

- \* Drink plenty of fluids (juice or water).
- \* Get a good night's sleep, too!
- \* Bring a friend with you to give blood. You could save six lives together! Each unit of whole blood you donate saves 3 lives right here in our community. Your help is crucial to that lifesaving process!

#### This Week On the Willis...

Rhosymedre, today's prelude, is by the great English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958), and is from the collection "Three Preludes on Welsh Hymn Tunes." Vaughan Williams was a prolific composer of symphonies, chamber music, opera, choral music and film

scores. He also was a collector of folk songs, and this influenced a variety of hymn tunes and hymnals as well as his own compositions. Today's piece is based on the Welch hymn-tune "Rhosymedre," written by the 19th century Anglican priest, John Edwards (1806-1885). This hymn tune has been set with several different words over the years, but here is a version that fits with our Baptism weekend, set by UCC minister James Haddix:

In your great love, O God, full parenthood is known: A father mourns his child, a mother's strength is shown. Let parents' faithful lives unbind your love that through them we might find Christ's deeper love for all humankind.

May your household of faith one family become, That love may be increased and none may be alone; That mother's love and father's care and children's joy we all may share, and children's joy we all may share.
