Voting Your Christian Conscience (Part 2)

Asked by some Pharisees when the kingdom of God would come, he said in reply:

"The coming of the kingdom of God cannot be observed, and no one will announce, 'Look here it is,' or,

'There it is.'

For behold, the kingdom of God is among you."

-Luke 17: 20-21

In the Gospel of John, when Judas objects to the expense of the perfume with which Mary anoints him, Jesus responds, "The poor you will always have with you." For generations, oppressors--from feudal lords to Southern slave-holders, from Calvinist industrialists to the leaders of Salvadoran death squads--quoted this small phrase as a defense for their often ruthless maintenance of the status quo, in which the wealthy might be moved to charity but had no moral obligation in justice to undo the structures by which poverty exists in society. After all, if the Lord said that the poor would always be with us, doesn't that provide evidence that the distinctions of wealth and poverty are part of the pre-ordained plan for creation? Is it not a kind of hubris or even blasphemy to assume that the Kingdom of God might involve our actions of service and social construction? To those who think this way, the Church exists to tell us how to get to heaven--to administer sacraments that point us to God, and relieve us of our pain and suffering by promising that someday we shall leave this "vale of tears" and come to the rich promise of the other world. Political and economic activity is part of the profane order, beneath the dignity or engagement of the Church, and to be involved in this order is to violate the very notion of Church. Despite the fact that theologians from Augustine to Bellarmine wrote many volumes on the ordering of a just society, this vision of the Church as too sacred to be engaged in the ordinary things of the world (such as economics) grew increasingly popular, leading the Church itself to become a voice that supported charity, but never challenged the fundamental ordering of society.

Then, in the 1890's, Pope Leo XIII, in what would become a transformative document, *Rerum Novarum*, pronounced that Scripture does more than tell us how to go to heaven: it teaches us principles of human society and economic responsibility; it calls us to recognize the rights of workers and the dignity of human labor; it decries injustice and calls us not just to charity but to an ordering of society in which the rights of the poor and working classes are acknowledged. From that first document to this day, the Church has challenged women and men of faith to see the Incarnate call of Christ as some-

thing active in the world today--not just something for the world to come. In the writings of Pope Paul VI and, especially, in those of Pope John Paul II, the Church has become a challenging voice and an energetic teacher on the moral grounding of economic systems. Going back to St. Thomas Aquinas--who held (unlike John Locke and others) that private property was not an absolute right, but a benefit given for the sake of the common good--the Church has challenged the vast land holdings of South American families and the crushing debt placed upon the developing world through the policies of the developed. In the mid-1960's, Pope Paul proclaimed not just a need to care for the poor, but that the following of Christ requires a "fundamental option for the poor," and that such an option is found throughout the Old and New Testaments, coming to is fullness in the life Jesus. Further, this option must underlie the economic and moral life of every Christian--not simply as a matter of charity, but as a matter of justice. In the universal teaching of the Church, social policies and individual practices--whether of property rights or taxation, investment or debt, the organization of labor or the maintenance of public accommodations--that do not take into account the moral obligation of every society to the well-being of its most vulnerable people are fundamentally contrary to the teachings of Christ and the call of the gospels.

In an era when more Americans are in poverty than at any time since the beginning of the Great Society in the mid-1960's, when more children go to bed hungry, and more people around the globe are facing starvation not as the result of natural disasters but because of political policies; in an age when the writings of people like Ayn Rand are again becoming popular (even--perhaps especially--among Christians), writings which promote a kind of radical laissez faire approach to economics and affirm selfishness as a virtue; we need to ask ourselves, as citizens and Christians, how much we have opened ourselves to the Church's teachings in these matters. If economic justice is not simply a matter of charity--to be practiced when times are good and withdrawn when our self-interest demands it--but a matter of justice--which binds us in conscience at all times--then how does that challenge our voting? If, as we are told, we are to have a preferential option for the poor, as Christ himself had, what does that mean for the initiatives and ballot measures, the candidates and referenda upon which we must decide? Although the institutional Church cannot (or should not) make this decision for any Catholic, every Catholic must take seriously the questions of justice, and choose, not simply to maximize his or her selfinterest, but in a manner that recognizes what we all are: women and men who build the reign of God, as partners and disciples of Christ.

This Week On the Willis...

Paul Manz (1919-2009) was a very important American organist and composer during the 20th century. He was a virtuoso and performed all over the world and across the United States, but he was most famous for hymn festivals. In-

stead of a traditional organ recital, he would lead those in attendance in singing several hymns. He would introduce each hymn to be sung with a glorious improvisation based on the tunes and many times he would improvise between each verse. Several of these improvisations have been written down and the two pieces heard today come from one of these collections. Both "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty" and "Now Thank We All Our God" use the hymn melody as the basis for each respective piece. It is a modern version of the Cantus firmus style of composition from the Baroque era. With modern chord progressions and wildly entertaining chromaticism, these pieces are still are based on the historical Lutheran choral tunes, Lobe den Herren and Nun danket alle Gott, which can be heard pervading the texture as a robust trumpet sound.

I write to inform you that last night Kevin Santos, the young boy who we, along with the students of St. Joseph helped with his kidney treatment, an insuficient treatment as he needed a kidney transplant passed away. While he was still alive, he celebrated his first communion, his mother made bread and he went out to sell it, they made traditional artisan crafts and sold those to help with his trips to the hospital. His funeral will be tomorrow, and from here we appreciate your solidarity for Kevin's life. Johns Hopkins Hospital quoted a figure of \$300,000 (US) for treatment and the kidney transplant. Unfortunately, that was a death sentence for the poor boy. That is the way of life. Greetings to all and we appreciate your solidarity and prayers.




