The Church of the New Chalcedon

Understanding Our Community as Communion

The Word of God was made human in order that we might be made divine. The Word displayed itself through a body, that we might receive knowledge of the invisible Father.

-Athanasius-

In the year 451, challenged by controversy and dissent, the Church met in an ecumenical council in an ancient maritime city in Asia Minor known as *Chalcedon*. In this council, the Church sought to understand and define the nature of Christ Jesus, and the manner in which he could be both human **and** divine. Some held that Jesus was simply a human being, upon whom the power of God had been poured in abundance—a sort of *super-prophet*, but divine only by adoption. Others held that Jesus was a human body possessed of a divine soul—as though the Incarnation replaced the humanity of Jesus the person with the soul of the divine Word (a sort of *divine zombie*). Both of these positions (one called *Adoptionism* and the other *Monophysism*), however, denied the fullness of the unity by which human beings are saved. After all, only God can save us, but God saves us only by becoming fully what we are. If God is less than fully human, than not everything that is human is redeemed; and if Jesus is less than fully God, he cannot be the source of our salvation.

In order to solve this seemingly impossible paradox, the Church gathered at Chalcedon developed the doctrine of two natures in one person, i.e. Jesus is one person who is both fully human and fully divine. One nature does not conquer or replace the other, but both subsist within the unity of Jesus Christ—whose very identity is that unity. In the harmony that comes from love, the divine and human natures are united in one person, whose life is to express that unity. This means that, with the coming of Jesus, human nature is now truly and fully a part of God, and God is fully and truly a part of humanity. There is no separation imaginable, because Jesus is the point of union, and he is one.

We speak about this union almost casually, (think of the phrase “*true God and true man*” in the Creed), or sing about it in Christmas songs (as in *O Come All Ye Faithful* when we sing of, “*God in flesh appearing,*”) without ever realizing what a tremendous insight into God’s love the Incarnation brings. In the Incarnation of Jesus, God has let us in the door, allowed us—human beings—to become a part of the inner life of God! We are part of the Trinity! Further, this mysterious and wonderful union of

the divine and the human in Jesus is, also, our key to understanding the true nature of the Church. For just as the Church is the body of Christ, so also, it has that feature of Christ by which apparent opposites exist at the same time. The Church is divine, yet it is human; it is institutional, yet it is charismatic; it is universal, yet it is always particular; it is social, yet it is simultaneously personal; it is transcendent, yet it lives as part of each particular culture. In the same manner as its founder and head, the Church is a unity of all sorts of opposites and a mystery that lives in plain sight. It is a reality that is *both/and* and not *either/or*. It is our communal self-understanding and, simultaneously, the visible presence of Christ.

In the season of Advent, we are invited—we are called—to awaken ourselves anew to the wonder of the Incarnation and to the living Christ in the Church. Though the readings of Advent point back to the time of preparation for Jesus’ birth, this is not so that we will make-believe that Jesus has not yet been born. Rather, the readings and the rituals of Advent exist to recall us to that moment when our race was transformed through the power of God and the grace of the Holy Spirit; and, at the same time, the readings and rituals exist to remind us that the transformation is not yet complete, since the whole world is not yet living as one with God in Christ. The Kingdom of God *exists now* since God has become flesh in our midst; yet, the Kingdom of God is *still to come*, since the Incarnation of Jesus is still being realized in all of us and in all human society.

The great insight of the Council of Chalcedon suggests that the true Church, i.e., the body of Christ in the world, must reflect the same union of the divine and human that one finds in the person of Jesus. This is not to say that Jesus had the blueprints for St. Peter’s in his back pocket or intended to create the Roman Curia. Rather, the Church is “*founded by Christ,*” in that we are following in his footsteps. Each of us, and all of us together—the living People of God, full of weakness and touched by grace—are becoming what Christ is. Although still in *Advent* (i.e., our time of preparation), this Church, this community of faith, of which Christ himself is the fullness, strives for that communion with God which is our destiny. And yet, even as we strive **towards** Christ, the birth in Bethlehem means that we strive **with** him, as well (another paradox). In Advent, we are reminded again that we need only awaken, only repent, only say “yes” with all our hearts to find that community of faith, that unity of love, that communion, that true Church which Christ has modeled and prepared for us by his coming into the world.

The plan is to meet monthly (Dec-April) with family catechesis at home between sessions. In accordance with Archdiocesan policy, the norm is for children seven years of age and older to be fully initiated into the Catholic Faith by receiving the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil Mass. Children younger than seven receive the Sacrament of Baptism only at the Easter Vigil or a designated Sunday Mass during the Easter Season. MUSIC FOR ADVENT

In my files I found a bulletin column written by Denise Pyles, one of my predecessors at St. Joes. I think it is beautifully written so, with a few tweaks here and there to reflect the music we are using this season, here it is:

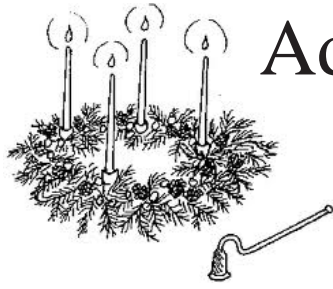
Coming home to our faith through the music of Advent and Christmas

Advent and Christmas is one liturgical season that is a time of preparation and celebration of the birth of Christ – that element of the Paschal Mystery of Jesus Christ which speaks of hope, promise, longing and celebration of our salvation – in God who becomes Emmanuel – One with us. We hear this echoed every Sunday at liturgy each time the prayer is proclaimed after the Lord's Prayer: "...protect us from all anxiety as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our savior, Jesus Christ..." Advent and Christmas are seasons of waiting and of celebrating this joyful hope in Christ. Listen to the lyrics of some of the music that is sung during the Advent and Christmas season:

- People look East the time is near....make your house fair....set the table....Love the Guest is on the way (*People Look East*)
- O come O Wisdom from on high...teach us in her ways to go...cheer us by your drawing nigh...bind in one the hearts of humankind (*O Come, O Come Emmanuel*)
- Jesus, Hope of the World...Jesus, Light in our darkness....here we receive you in bread and in wine (*Jesus Hope Of the World*)
- Comfort O my people...speak of peace...now prepare for God a way (*Comfort, Comfort O my People*)
- Wait for the Lord...be strong, take heart (*Wait for the Lord*)
- For you O Lord my soul in stillness waits, truly my hope is in you. (*My Soul in Stillness Waits*)
- O Christ, Redeemer of us all, we pray you hear us when we call (*Creator of the Stars of Night*)
- Joyful all you nations rise, join the triumph of the skies (*Hark the Herald Angels Sing*)
- Heard the story, tidings of a Gospel true, thus rejoicing, free from sorrow, praises voicing...Christ the babe was born for you (*Infant Holy, Infant Lowly*)
- Good Christian friends rejoice, with heart and soul and voice...Christ is born today (*Good Christian Friends Rejoice*)
- O tidings of comfort and joy (*God Rest You Merry Gentlemen*)
- Awake and greet the new morn, for angels herald its dawning...behold the child of our longing...and lives now inside us forever (*Awake, Awake and Greet the New Morn*)
- Joy to the world...let us our songs employ...repeat the sounding joy (*Joy to the World*)
- Glad tidings of our God to bring...an endless song of thankful praise (*What Star is This*)

Home is a place of the familiar in our hearts where our faith resides. "Coming home" is a way of paying closer attention to our relationship with God. As we enter this new liturgical year, let the music of Advent and Christmas bring you home to your heart, to that place of deep hunger for God, to that place of inner-connectedness with community, to that place of nourishing faith that fuels you to action, and to that place of strong centeredness in God that gives you courage to praise and celebrate Emmanuel, God-with-us, no matter what circumstance in life – in all ways and always

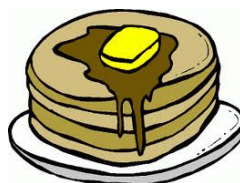

The Esoterics, Saturday December 8th, 8 pm
SYBILLA reprised: the complete Hildegard motets of Frank Ferko

The Esoterics will bring its nineteenth season to a spectacular finish by reprising its performance of the complete Hildegard motets by American composer Frank Ferko (b 1950) this December. Ferko's motets, composed between 1993 and 2012, set texts by the 12th-century mystic Hildegard of Bingen. Ferko has had a long relationship with Hildegard and her visions, and has written both instrumental and choral music inspired by her work. In this concert, The Esoterics will perform sixteen motets by Ferko, with a newly-composed world-premiere motet, *O nobilissima viriditas* (2012). The texts of Ferko's motets come from Hildegard's *Symphonium celestium revolutionum*, a cycle of more than seventy poems that she composed for use throughout the church year. In his realization of Hildegard's visionary texts, Ferko employs organ-like textures and harmonies that evoke the music of Messiaen and Poulenc. An accomplished organist and composer for organ, Ferko is a scholar on the music of Messiaen, on whom he has lectured extensively. In his motets, Ferko's lavish harmonies are juxtaposed with acerbic phrases of Medieval counterpoint.
