A New Year & Better Vision

You do not have to be good. You do not have to walk on your knees for a hundred miles through the desert, repenting. You only have to let the soft animal of your body love what it loves.

Many years ago, when I was Provincial of the Jesuits, it was my job to approve young Jesuits, at the end of their theology studies, for ordination to the priesthood. I recall writing those letters of approval, always touched by both trepidation and hope that this man might be gentle and generous, broken enough to bend but strong enough to support those in need. I prayed that he would avoid the terrible two-sided pitfall of our profession (a pitfall into which I have fallen too often) of believing either that he didn't matter at all or that he mattered too much. In trying to communicate my prayer, I came to favor an image to which I still return when thinking about ministry—that we are called to be like the lenses in a pair of glasses: i.e., it matters how we have been ground and how clear we are, but we should never imagine that we are the thing for which people are looking. We may help with focus (such is the work of ministry), but we do best when we empower others to see beyond us, to see the One who is at work within the movement of the seasons and the hearts of all women and men. Like any good pair of glasses, we are most successful in our ministry when those we serve forget that we are on; and concentrate, instead, on the power of the Word that lifts their heart, and on the horizon towards which they sail.

Such a notion of ministry depends upon an optimistic and, perhaps, naive faith in the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit, as well as a belief in the foundational grace planted within each person. It is this Holy Spirit who illuminates the world, and who broods in all Creation with a power and a glory that is unmarred by sin or by the corrupting power of our failure. Thought it is true that in every person and in the world at-large, sin distorts our vision of reality—limits our ability to trust the unfolding grace that we are offered—still, fundamentally, every person made by God is already possessed of grace and oriented towards the source of all love and hope. We are made for God, just as a person with eyes is made to see; and so, while our vision may need some adjustment, it is only as an assist to the grace given to us at our Creation by God and restored for us in the sacrifice of Christ. We are, already, "Temples of the Holy Spirit"-something every minister, every priest, every bishop and Pope must recall in order to serve well the God of the gospel. It is not our job, as ministers, to make people good, but only to help those fundamentally good people get past their nearsightedness or their astigmatisms, their fears and self-created blindness, to help them see what God has already put before them as gift and promise.

But if this has been my long-standing view of ministry in the Church, this last year has been a time of challenge. Though often out of the headlines, the undertow generated by the abuse and leadership crisis of the last fifteen years has drawn women and men who love the Lord farther away from our Catholic community. Meanwhile, the verbal thickness of the Roman Missal has reenforced, with many of its grammatically muddled prayers, a sense that we are nothing but unworthy sinners, whom God only begrudgingly saves—rather than the loved sinners whom Jesus befriended, and whom God has rushed to rescue. Likewise, in actions against the Sisters and in various statements regarding gender and identity, those in offices of responsibility within the Church, have offered a very different view of mission and ministry than I have ever held—a view not of a world filled with God's grace, waiting only to be discovered by our improving insight, but of a world that is fundamentally suspect and degraded, where only the mediation of priests and prelates allows for clear guidance and true sight.

As the year drew towards its close, I had begun to think my own sense of the Church and our mission hopelessly out of line with the times; but then, something happened, in the horror around the Sandy Hook shootings, that restored my faith in the inherent grace at the heart of the world, and the call we have to help that grace find focus. On the Saturday after the shootings, as we gathered with the community for prayer and silence, I saw women and men-some regular church-goers, some probably rarely in the pews—come forward, tears in their eyes, and each one light a candle of remembrance and hope. In our moment of need, we sought a vision of solace and a God, not who judges, but who knows what it means to mourn the death of a Son on a sad and dreary afternoon. We turned to the Church—to each other, to St. Joseph—as a place to make visible the vision of our hearts, and as community that might focus the desire already within us.

I have no doubt that the world (and the Church) will continue to be blind at times, and that it will sometimes make me crazy. Yet, I know that when we are together, we have a chance to take off the blinders and, through our ministry to one another, see a God at work in the world. The vision is not held in the hands of a few, but depends on us all. May the new year deepen in each of us and in all of us this call to ministry, this call to vision.

Centering Prayer: Finding God Within Ourselves


