The Gift of Going with Grace

Just days before the beginning of Lent, in an otherwise commonplace meeting to announce the canonization of three saints, and speaking in Latin—a language even only a few of the Cardinals speak well—the Supreme Pontiff of the Catholic Church announced he was resigning from the ministry given him less than eight years ago by the College of Cardinals (or, one might say, by the Holy Spirit *through* the Cardinals). It was a decision that sets Benedict apart from virtually all of his predecessors—not just by reason of the act itself, but because, in choosing to resign, Benedict so consciously opposes an ecclesial theology upon which much of the traditional vision of the papacy relies. With clear reference to his predecessor, Blessed John Paul II (e.g., his use of the expression “*prayer and suffering*,” so often used to describe JPII’s gift to the Church in the last years of his life), Benedict intentionally abjures the spirituality upon which John Paul and so many previous Popes had relied, a spirituality that links the papal term directly to the active will of God: i.e., since God has placed the Pope upon the Chair of Peter, only God—through death—might remove him.

This vision of the Pope as directly in the hands of a God who sustains or removes him by divine decree has implicitly promoted the idea that the Pope, as Vicar of Christ, possesses not only a grace from God for leadership, but a virtual direct-line to the mind and heart of the Almighty. Feeding the un-Scriptural tendency by some to see *all* papal statements as divinely inspired and, therefore, as beyond human question), the Pope’s service until death has supported the notion that he is uniquely “*God’s man*”—divinely placed, divinely maintained, divinely inspired, and divinely removed. While never questioning the divine grace that undergirds the papal office, Benedict’s resignation returns a sense of proportion, a sense of humanity, a sense of the true In-

carnate character of the Pope to the office of the papacy. Though the Church is the Body of Christ, inspired and animated by the Holy Spirit, and though we believe that the Holy Father, as Christ’s Vicar is given graces to sustain the Church, what Benedict teaches, in this great act, is that the grace of God given to the Pope is still a matter of conscience and discernment, not a matter of instant revelation and transparent knowledge.

The greatness of character and the depth of inspiration present in the resignation of the Holy Father cannot, I think, be overstated. Though I have often found the pontificate of Pope Benedict troubling, this act deepens my faith in the Spirit who guides the Church and in the mystery of grace in every life. For here, on the edge of Lent, God shows us something profound: the power of prayer and conscience, the grace of humility, the willingness of a Successor of Peter to accept—as Peter himself accepted—that he is truly a servant of Christ in the Church, and that the Spirit of Christ, working in the Church, is greater than (and not dependent upon) any single person. Can any of us imagine the pressure upon Benedict to resist such an insight? Can we begin to suppose what it was to pray against the pressure of hundreds of years of tradition; of Cardinals and others whose interests were served by his papacy; of those many faithful Catholics who would, because of this choice, mark him as coward or measure him (unflatteringly) against John Paul II? I stand amazed and inspired by such prayer, and by the power of God’s love to fortify and move the heart of Benedict, who, in this one act, has taught us so much.

And so, this Lent, I pray that I may find these same virtues of humility and prayer, of generosity and discernment, of mortification and honesty in my own life, and I pray that they might guide the Cardinals who will gather to discern our next Pope.

ADVOCACY TO REDUCE POVERTY: Parishioners are invited to take part in the Dialogue for Justice and Catholic Advocacy Day

The Social Justice Commission is promoting several advocacy activities in February and March:

1. By February 20 – Registration for Catholic Advocacy Day – If you are interested in participating contact Catholic Community Services (CCS) at DialogueForJustice@ccsww.org or 206.328.5792. CCS will make arrangements for group appointments with legislators and chartered bus transportation to Olympia as part of Catholic Advocacy Day. Last year over 20 parishioners from St. Joe's participated.
2. March 10, 2:00 – 5:00 pm, Parish Center Arrupe Room – Convocation II: Standing with Those on the Margins – This year's convocation provides education on the priority issues included for advocacy in the Dialogue for Justice and Catholic Advocacy Day: TANF, Housing and Essential Needs Services, the Housing Trust and the Basic Health Plan. Our speakers include Senator Ed Murray, D 43rd District (keynote); Josephine Tamayo Murray, VP for Public Policy, Catholic Community Services and representatives from two of St. Joe's Outreach Partners: Chief Seattle Club and Jubilee Women's Center. Learn what you can do to reduce poverty and stand with those on the margins.
3. March 17, After All Masses – Letter Writing – Letters will be prepared for signing in the vestibule after Mass supporting the priority issues listed above. All you have to do is provide your return address and sign letters for your representatives. The letters will be delivered during Catholic Advocacy Day.
4. March 22, 9:00 am – 3:00 pm, Olympia WA – Catholic Advocacy Day – Remember to register in advance. Buses depart from Seattle, Tacoma and the Eastside and arrive at 9:00 a.m. at St. Michael's Parish in Olympia. The program begins at 9:30 a.m. and transportation is provided to the Capitol in time for legislative appointments at 12:00. ENVIRONMENTAL LEGACY OF
POPE BENEDICT XVI



Since his election to the papacy in 2005, Pope Benedict XVI has become known as the "Green Pope" for his prophetic words and actions urging all people, especially Christians, to recall their duties toward Creation. In his writings and addresses, the Holy Father reaffirms many traditional ecological teachings of the Church, including the giftedness of creation, the vocation of stewardship and the universal destination of created goods. In addition, Pope Benedict XVI has offered profound insights on the environment in

view of contemporary challenges in the modern world: the need for an international climate treaty, advocacy for renewable energy technologies, and attention to environmental refugees.

Pope Benedict's environmental legacy will undoubtedly be viewed as one of the strongest in papal history and includes consistent and emphatic attention to the modern issue of climate change. The legacy began with his first mass as the new pontiff (The external deserts in the world are growing, because the internal deserts have become so vast. Therefore the earth's treasures no longer serve to build God's garden for all to live in, but they have been made to serve the powers of exploitation and destruction.) and has continued since:

- 2010 World Day of Peace Message: If You Want to Cultivate Peace, Protect Creation
- 2009 Papal Encyclical Caritas in Veritate
- 2012 Address of His Holiness Pope Benedict XVI to the Members of the Diplomatic Corps Accredited to the Holy See
- Angelus- November 27, 2011
- 2011 World Day of Food Message
- 2010 Address of His Holiness Pope Benedict XVI to the Members of the Diplomatic Corps for the Traditional Exchange of New Year's Greetings
- Message to 2009 Summit on Climate Change
- 2009 Easter Message Urbi et Orbi
- Letter of His Holiness Benedict XVI to the Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople on the Occasion of the Seventh Symposium of the Religion, Science and the Environment Movement

Also during his papacy, the Pontifical Academy of Sciences published a scientific report: Fate of Mountain Glaciers in the Anthropocene: A Report by the Working Group Commissioned by the Pontifical Academy of Sciences which calls for bold action to address the climate change that is causing the loss of mountain glaciers.
