"The All Surrounding Grace"

Of Graduation & the Body & Blood of the Lord

As swimmers dare
to lie face to the sky
& water bears them,
as hawks rest upon air

the all surrounding grace.

In the last weeks of May and the first weeks of June, on a thousand platforms, before a million squirming graduates—not to mention parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, and crushingly bored siblings—speakers rise to offer words of encouragement and challenge. Much of what is said will be cliché: e.g., advice to dream big and work hard. Some speakers will say it better than others, some few may even penetrate the fog of the festivities, and touch the hearts of those who listen. But, for the most part, what they say will be little heard or long remembered by those to whom it is addressed; for these graduates (like most of us in great moments of transition) will be surrounded by their ghosts and by their dreams, by the poignancy of all that seems to be ending and by the fear and the attraction of what seems to be coming at them over the horizon.

At times, the pull of their various emotions can make graduates seem mercurial and perhaps a bit crazed. Mourning a past that seems to be disappearing and dreading a future that seems full of crushing expectations, even the best graduate can seem to careen, almost instantaneously, between being delightful and loving to being depressed and difficult (especially towards parents or close friends). They feel caught between a world they cannot hold onto (or that they feel they ought to let go of) and a world they do not know. At times, their hearts fill with the possibility of a future where they will live out their ideals: where they will be loosed from the binding power of parental control or teachers' rules. Then, just as quickly, the dread overtakes them and all they can see of the future is new structures they do not understand, new rules and demands they are not sure they can meet. In such moments, they lean back in sorrow towards the friends they seem to be losing and the school they have come to know and rule. Thrill and panic seem to alternate in their hearts—and perhaps in the hearts of their parents, as well.

Like many moments of transition in our life, graduation can make us feel like Indiana Jones on the edge of an abyss: we cannot see what is below us, but we feel the wall behind, pushing us towards the edge. We try to hang onto the past, because we fear the future; or we decide to leap into the future, because we feel the need to escape the past. But, in both of these scenarios, we forget that the deepest truth of our life is not in the disappearing past nor in the unmade future, but in the dynamic present: in *this* moment, this brief but eternal moment, where, uniquely, we live and move and have our being. For the past is our prologue—the unchangeable sum of experiences that prepare us, that sharpen us, that shape us for this moment—and the future is a blank page, its demands and its oughts nothing more than products of our imagining. It is here, today, between the prologue and the blank page that our life always exists: in the choices we make, in the ways we love or fail to love, in the words we let become flesh in our lives. Here, now, we put pencil to paper and write our story. And here, now, God meets us, blesses us, surrounds us with the grace of our living history and the freedom from which our future will be made.

This Sunday, we celebrate the Feast of the Body and Blood of the Lord; and it is appropriate that we do so in the midst of so many transitions. For of all the Sacraments, none shows as clearly the eternally present God as does the Eucharist. In the Eucharist, we are given not merely a remembrance, not merely a memorial of some past event. Nor are we given a mere symbol of some event yet to come. Rather, in our Catholic understanding, the Eucharist is an anamnesis—a living memory, a surrounding grace, made real in this moment by God's fidelity and love for us, and by our choice and reception. Thus, what we hold and taste is the real body and blood of Christ, present for us in the here and now. And though this holy communion unites us to Bethlehem and Nazareth, to the cross and the grave, to the empty tomb and the descending Spirit, it does so by grounding us in this moment of reception, this moment of real presence. Likewise, though it points us towards the Kingdom of God and its fullness, it does so by filling us, at this moment, with the God who is unfolding the Kingdom by our choices and our freedom.

So, let us send forth our graduates and go forth ourselves, as women and men of the Eucharist: freed from anxiety about the future or nostalgia about the past. Let us live in the "all surrounding grace" of the present moment, where God upholds us, and nourishes us, and sends us in love into the becoming world.

Youth Summer Service

Dots & Dashes

In late summer 2002, a small advertisement was posted in our parish bulletin. The advert was regarding a part time junior high youth ministry position and I was interested. At the time, I was about to begin my second year as a junior high school science teacher. After working 5 years on the lab bench for UW, it was through volunteering with Sunday school at my old parish and coaching CYO soccer that lead me to become a teacher in the first place. Now that my husband and I were members St. Joseph's, I thought it would be good to get involved with something and this seemed perfect.

Deacon Steve met me after the 5:30pm mass for my "interview." At least I thought it was an interview, but it was more of a meet and greet—I was hired on the spot! My task was to help Deborah Harris, who was the Director of Religious Education, re-start the Junior High youth group program that had been on hiatus.

We had a slow, but steady start—at the end of the year, though, I was ready to call it good and head back to the classroom. However, I was nearing the end of my pregnancy with my first child, and I decided to give youth group one more year since I was going on sabbatical from teaching anyway. As it happened, that summer there was an opportunity to take a small group of junior high youth up to Skagit Valley for a weekend migrant immersion experience. After the weekend, I was hooked; I didn't know it at the time, but youth ministry was going

to be an answer to a calling, and it would be these summer programs that fuelled the flames.

For the past 10 years, St. Joe's parish has consistently offered



summer service learning experiences for our middle school youth. These opportunities have grown since that first migrant immersion weekend in Mt. Vernon. Some years we stayed close to home, while the majority of the years have been spent in the Whatcom County area of



our state. We have had the longest relationship with the Agape program, which is run out of Western Washington University's

Newman Center; participating in 7 trips since 2004. St. Joe's will be heading up for the 8th time this August. The first year was new for both us and them, but with the arrival of a new campus director in 2006, the program has been consistent and rewarding year after year.

Agape is a weeklong service, faith sharing and learning program. There are learning modules about immigration, reflection journals, direct and indirect service work



and play time. Youth and adult chaperones are asked to fully participate in all the activities including walking food drives and grocery food collections, a migrant immersion day, playing and talking with families at the camps, and setting up and running a food & clothing bank. St. Joseph's largest contribution to the Agape program has been our backpack

& school supply give away during the Food & Clothing bank.

I remember how the backpacks started. An 8th grader, Kevin Bocek, had leftover school supplies as he was cleaning out his locker at the end of the year. He looked

around and saw so many brand new or near new items heading to the garbage, Kevin diverted them to his own pile. He passed the items onto me for distribution to the Agape families. That was the summer of 2007 and Erin Sweezey, a parent, led the group up that year. They distributed all the school supplies they brought with people clammering for more! Since that first year, many mi-

grant workers now delay their trips home to California, Texas or the next job in order to receive backpacks from St. Joe's for their children.

Kathy Marion, our parish school's junior high math teacher, has been very supportive of the school sup-

ply collection. For many years, she has the 8th graders collect, box, and label their leftover school supplies and it is where we get the majority of our materials. Last year, we distributed over 100 backpacks and we were able to do so with money donated by our parish & school families. We purchased new backpacks, Spanish/English dictionaries, calculators, and pencil pouches to supplement donations.



And from our 6th grade parish school teacher, Sally Sue McDonald who chaperoned on that same trip in 2010: "...immigration is one of the big issues of (the youth participants') generation, and the world will be impacted by how they deal with it. They have seen a side of this issue few ever will, and because of that, they have

knowledge they will be able to share when the time comes. It was the dialogue, questioning and thoughtful reflections they shared each day that helps me believe this group, as they become adults, will always hear a voice from their youth signing in their heads, 'Now how do I serve?'"

And finally from a youth participant last year in 2012: "The Agape Service Project was a

lifetime experience. I loved every minute we spent in the fields and with the migrant children. We met new



people along the way, and made new friends. I would definitely recommend it to anyone who is willing to make a change in their summer vacation."

In 2010 we worked on the Grubb Family Farmer for 4 hours. The youth helped weed his crops and stack hay barrels. His thank you card included the following message: "I hope your time with us will make you continue to respect the migrant lives and the struggle they face. Our care and concern in your lives has great meaning. I have told people that God sent me 28 angels to our farm."


