It has been quite a week. As our nation stood between war and peace, between violence and something else we could not quite name, we prayed and wrote and held our breath. Certainly, we hated the murder of innocents caused by poison gas, but hated, too, the nearly incomprehensible plans to bomb without seeking-out either perpetrators or weapons, without wanting to change the balance of power in the region but wanting to dissuade all leaders from ever using weapons of mass destruction again. If, like me, your prayers were pleas not just for peace—though certainly for that—but also for some sense of comprehension, some sense of hope in the midst of what seemed like a choice between evils, then you may also have found that the conclusion of the week has left you strangely unsure. I find myself breathing again, thankful that the cruise missiles remain holstered and that the possibility for a diplomatic solution has somehow been given new life (though was it really as accidental as it seemed?); yet, I keep wondering if this is the answer to our prayer or only a delay in the crushing victory of violence and despair?

During days like these, a sense of powerlessness creeps into my heart. It seems so small to send off one letter to the President, to make one phone call or write one email message to Congress. Indeed, even my one prayer seems small, dwarfed by the call of the Pope and the cries of the poor. What is my one voice in the midst of so much noise? As will surprise no one who knows me, this is not a sensation I like: I want to be active and to effect the events that surround me. I want to do something! But what is there to do?

At such moments, my temptations veer between distraction and self-deception: either seeking to ignore the issues of the day by becoming immersed in nonsense—watching stupid television shows or reading countless celebrity blogs on Facebook—or trying to make my actions seem important by haranguing those who disagree with me—as though, if I just get a few more to agree, then my voice will matter. But even these devices seem

futile, and lead only to despair; for the anguish of the world continues to intrude, and the small voice I have been given continues to trouble me.

I was in just such a place earlier this week, as I prepared for daily mass. The optional memorial offered for the day, in the Jesuit calendar, was for Blessed Francis Gàrate, S.J., a Jesuit Brother who lived in Spain in the late-19th and early-20th centuries. Brother Francis grew up poor, and so was not well-educated when he came to work for the Society of Jesus as a laborer. Coming to love the Jesuits he knew, he entered the Society as a lay-brother and was assigned simple jobs for much of his life. Eventually, he was assigned to the role of door-keeper for the Jesuit community in Bilbao, Spain, where he stayed for more than 20 years, doing little more than answering the door, running errands, and greeting guests. Though it was hardly a job to shape the course of history, Francis did it always with gentleness, with generosity, and with a deep sense of grounding in the Holy Spirit. People who came to visit the community found themselves blessed by his hospitality, by his patience, and by the spiritual presence at the heart of his care for them, all offered with simplicity and lack of pretense. He never seemed to grow angry or frustrated by the varied needs of his charges, but answered the door, day and night, as he had been called to do-and so, in small ways, changed the experience of visitors and the hearts of those with whom he lived. He walked this small path of love, between his office and the door, for decades, and so made it one small part of the kingdom of God.

As Catholics, we often talk about the power of the small way. We quote Mother Teresa or St. Thérèse approvingly and think that we have learned to be satisfied with doing small things with great love; but the truth is, when I am honest with myself, I am rarely satisfied with the slow work of redemption. I want it now, and I want my efforts to make it happen. This week, however, feeling powerless in the face of such international forces, I was reminded that God-for whom time itself is an illusion of children—does not work at my pace nor by my power. Yet, God works, and God allows each of us to be part of that work. Our prayers, our fasting, our hopes, our kindness to one another, our small works of love and healing, or our few dollars given to Jesuit Refugee Services are not much—mere drops in the ocean—but they are part of the flood which is God's grace and love for the world, a flood that washes away boulders and changes the shape of coastlines. Drop by drop, footstep by footstep, choice by human choice, the reign of God comes into the world by the work of our hands.

Blessings Of The Journey

TEN YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF STEVE'S ORDINATION TO THE DIACONATE

September 13, 2003. In some ways it seems so long ago and in other ways like yesterday. What I remember most about the Liturgy itself at St. James is "lying prostrate on the floor" and being vested by my wife Cyndy and mentor Denny Duffell. However the next day at our regular Sunday Mass, when I was blessed by members of this community, including my parent's, is the memory I will always cherish.

I came to St. Joseph's Church as a Jesuit Volunteer over 30 years ago because I was discerning a vocation to the priesthood. This call was interrupted when I met my wife Cyndy and so I was content serving God and the people of St. Joseph as a lay minister.

When the Permanent Diaconate was reinstated I heard the call again. I struggled with the idea of betraying my coworkers, especially the women who were my colleagues in seeking ordination when it was not available to them. Yet the call remained strong in the midst of my questions, doubts and fears.

The words of St. Paul are very encouraging. "Clothe your-selves with compassion, with kindness, humility, meekness and patience. Above all, clothe yourselves with love and be thankful."

Ordination is a gift and in our formation we talked about the responsibility of Ordination. You no longer just speak for yourself. You are seen as representing the church and being the presence of Christ to those whom you meet and serve. I could not have imagined the graces of being invited into the sacredness of people's lives.

From the joy of presiding at Weddings and Baptisms, to the grief in planning and assisting at Funerals, it is a privilege and an honor. To be given a sacred trust by people sharing their hopes, dreams, fears and sadness, I have been enriched and transformed. Thank you.

Some of the surprising graces of my ordination were my

path into Hospital Ministry and more recently my training as a Spiritual Director. I must confess I never liked going to hospitals either as a patient or to visit someone. The training was painfully transformative. Hospital Ministry challenged me to rely on God's presence and taught me how to stand with others in their pain and sorrow. Today my primary Diaconal ministry to the Archdiocese of Seattle is coordi-

nating Eucharistic Ministers to provide a Catholic presence at Harborview.

For a while I thought I was called to do Hospital Ministry fulltime but the pull of the diversity of parish ministry was too strong.

I'm not sure how this fits in but selfishly ordination has held me accountable. What I mean is for me to get up and proclaim the gospel and break open the word I first need to be praying and preaching to myself. I can't possibly talk or preach to others about prayer, forgiveness, humility or generosity with any integrity if I am not working on these areas in my own life...first.

Another great joy has been my relationship working with children. What a blessing to be shopping at Safeway or out at dinner with my wife and have a child come up and say "Hi Deacon Steve".

My work with older Children Baptism stands out for me as a good symbol for my Diaconal Ministry. Once a month I meet with families and usually cook dinner, teach the kids through song and story and ringing the bells! Then to be able to go into the font with them and pray the words of Baptism over them it truly does bond you in a special way to those children and families.

What does the future hold? I realized what I loved most about Hospital Ministry was the one-on-one spiritual conversations with patients, staff and families so I decided to do a two year training program for Spiritual Direction with the Benedictine Sisters and now I am starting a private practice of companioning people.

It's been a great ten years!

I feel so blessed to have St. Joseph's as my base camp... to use a metaphor that Fr. John shared when he first came here as Pastor. The JVC has a motto, "Ruined for Life". I can safely say that motto was true for me, but in the best possible way. I often use the phrase, "Be careful what you pray for" and so my prayer is to be open to however God wants to use me and to have the courage to say, YES.

It's important that I ask forgiveness for the times I have hurt or failed you.

I would not be who I am today without the love and care of this community. I have grown up here in my ministry and as a person and I thank you for that gift.

We hope you have been enjoying our Weekly Questions about Immigration. We will be registering people during the month of September for our JustFaith series, which begins on OCTOBER 3rd. We will be available after all the Sunday Masses on September 15th, and would love to talk with you. We look forward to interesting questions and interested people!

Here is the information you need:

This Fall, St. Joseph's will be sponsoring an eight-week Thursday (6:30 – 9:00 pm) JustFaith workshop series on Immigration, beginning Oct 3rd, ending Nov 21st (the week before Thanksgiving).

As participants, you will discuss topics like US Border Enforcement, possible paths for legalization for the undocumented, the Immigration Detention system, the push and pull of global migration. We will watch documentaries, attend a Spanish-language Sunday Mass at a migrant parish, think about our own family's immigration story, meet and talk with real people who are living in the limbo of undocumented immigrants.

Answer: FALSE. Nationally, since 1994, even as the number of undocumented immigrants has doubled, the violent crime rate has declined 34 per cent and the property crime rate has fallen 26 per cent. Truth is, foreign-born people in America – whether naturalized citizens, permanent residents or undocumented – are incarcerated at a much lower rate than native-born Americans, according to the National Institute of Corrections.

Question for this Sunday, Sept 15th: TRUE or FALSE: My ancestors learned English, but today's immigrants refuse. Look for answer next week!

Given the gravity of the situation on in Syria, JRS is in need of your financial support there.

- \$105: a basic family kit: one mattress, two sheets, one pillow, two winter-blankets and two towels
- \$130: a food-basket for a five-person family for one month

- \$160: winter clothing for one family (pullover, jacket, trousers, shoes)
- \$210: one month's rent of an apartment for a displaced family
- \$5300: one day support for the families sheltered in the schools in Aleppo
- \$5300: cost of providing food for 10,000 people for one day
- \$10,500: the installation cost of the field kitchen
