People of the Word & of the Body

Easy at first, the language of friendship Is, as we soon discover, Very difficult to speak well, . . .

And, unless often spoken, soon goes rusty.

They devoted themselves to the teaching of the apostles and to the communal life, to the breaking of the bread and to the prayers.

-Acts of the Apostles 2:42-

Several years ago, when I had my former job as Provincial of the Jesuits, I was sitting in my office in Portland chatting with our recently hired health care coordinator for the region. The conversation was going well she was a skilled practitioner with great experience, a great disposition and enough grit even to get Jesuits to care for themselves. She had already been with us for awhile, and I was beginning to think we had a good, professional relationship, when suddenly the skies opened up with a huge storm of hail and lightning, right in the middle of our conversation. We both looked out the window at the grounds, becoming quickly covered with various sized ice-pellets; and we listened to the noise on the roof, so loud we could not even continue our conversation. As the storm lessened, we both said, "Wow!" and began to talk about rain and storm and our experiences of both. Even as we completed the business we had to do, the events opened us to share parts of our lives that do not often come out in passing conversations. For from our experience of storms we went to spirituality and nature, to stories of our life and places we had been. In that moment of delay and disruption, we moved from all the work and business of the day to some other level—some place where we were two people, sharing an experience and tying that experience into our whole lives. We had been colleagues, but we moved further that day to becoming friends, and, ultimately, companions in a mission we both shared and understood differently through that moment of union with each other.

For many of us, membership at St. Joseph Parish—or any parish, for that matter—may be a bit like this experience with my health care coordinator. We see ourselves as members of the Parish, and indeed are; but our membership involves primarily formal elements: St. Joseph is where we attend Mass on holidays and (most) Sundays; it is where we pay our tithe and send our children to school; it is the place we depend on for sacramental support, the number we call for baptisms or weddings or funerals, for anointing or occasional spiritual advice. We think of ourselves as members be-

cause of our history, because St. Joseph is the location of some great events in our lives, where we said goodbye to a parent or neighbor for the last time, or met our spouse at an eighth grade dance. We may see our membership at St. Joseph as a coincidence of geography, or as part of our heritage as a *Hiller*, or as a choice born of our Jesuit education or time in the JVC. Our feeling of membership might be deep and profound—an association we prize and even, perhaps, brag about; but, still, something seems missing. We long for a storm to quiet our *busy-ness* and open our hearts, a storm to empower us to speak what is deep within us, a storm by which we can grow from being *members* of St. Joseph to being companions and friends who *belong to St. Joseph* and to whom St. Joseph's belongs.

Good News People is a program organized to help us begin to deepen our relationship as a Parish, but allowing us the chance to talk to one another, to share an experience, and to come to know more about our faith, our Parish, and ourselves. Like a hail storm, it is a brief but intense experience—7 weeks, with 90 minute meetings—meant to take us out of our ordinary conversations and into a place where we can talk as community, as sharers of the Word of God and as those who try to live it in our daily lives. It is not a class, not group-therapy, not an obligation of membership or a debt to be paid; rather, Good News People is a chance for us to become (to use St. Ignatius' phrase) "Friends in the Lord," by spending time with each other over a common experience, and by sharing our own stories in the context of Scripture, tradition, and our journey as Church.

There is no doubt that many of us are taxed by a thousand obligations every week—from doctors appointments to youth soccer, from picking up the dry-cleaning to helping at the blood bank, from demands at work to the obligations of family life. Yet, in these 90 minutes a week, for the first seven weeks of *GNP*, is an opportunity for us to grow as a Parish through the growth of each person; a chance for us set aside the institutional weight of *Catholic* and become again *communion*. I hope we will take advantage of this grace, offered to us together.

Last year, in our Parish survey, two of the deepest desires expressed by those who responded was to grow in knowledge of their faith, and to deepen their relationship with God. We do this through the body of Christ—through the Eucharist which is this community. God will not fail to bless us if we try, but you and I both need to take the leap. Let us do so together; and as the storms of the world fall on our roof, let us listen as companions and speak the Word of God to one another.

"Crossing Borders"

We hope you have been enjoying our Weekly Questions about Immigration. We will be registering people during the month of September for our JustFaith series, which begins on OCTOBER 3rd.

This Fall, St. Joseph's will be sponsoring an eight-week Thursday (6:30 – 9:00 pm) JustFaith workshop series on Immigration, beginning Oct 3rd, ending Nov 21st.

As participants, you will discuss topics like US Border Enforcement, possible paths for legalization for the undocumented, the Immigration Detention system, the push and pull of global migration. We will watch documentaries, attend a Spanish-language Sunday Mass at a migrant parish, think about our own family's immigration story, meet and talk with real people who are living in the limbo of undocumented immigrants.

In the meantime, we continue our "test questions" on Immigration.

Last Sunday's question: TRUE or FALSE: My ancestors learned English, but today's immigrants refuse.

Answer: FALSE. While today's immigrants may speak their first language at home, two-thirds of those older than five speak English "well" or "very well," accd to research by the independent, nonpartisan Migration Policy Institute. And the demand for adult ESL instruction in the US far outstrips available classes. The typical pattern of assimilation in the US has remained steady, says immigration historian David Reimers: "The first generation struggles with English and doesn't learn it well. The second is bilingual, and the third can't talk to their grand-parents."

Question for this Sunday, Sept 22nd: TRUE or FALSE: Senator John McCain (R) and Sen. Charles Schumer (D), members of a bipartisan immigration reform group in the Senate, both agree that immigration reform legislation will "grow the economy by an additional 3.3 per cent and decrease the federal budget deficits by \$197 billion over the next ten years."
