Pope Francis, Interview with Eugenio Scalfari (Atheist editor of La Republica)

Do you feel touched by grace?

"No one can know that. Grace is not part of consciousness, it is the amount of light in our souls, not knowledge nor reason. Even you, without knowing it, could be touched by grace."

Without faith? A non-believer?

"Grace regards the soul."

I do not believe in the soul.

"You do not believe in it but you have one."

Your Holiness, you said that you have no intention of trying to convert me and I do not think you would succeed.

"We cannot know that, but I don't have any such intention."

And St. Francis?

"He's great because he is everything. He is a man who wants to do things, wants to build, he founded an order and its rules, he is an itinerant and a missionary, a poet and a prophet, he is mystical. He found evil in himself and rooted it out. He loved nature, animals, the blade of grass on the lawn and the birds flying in the sky. But above all he loved people, children, old people, women. He is the most shining example of that agape we talked about earlier."

Your Holiness is right, the description is perfect.

"Francis wanted a mendicant order and an itinerant one. Missionaries who wanted to meet, listen, talk, help, to spread faith and love. Especially love. And he dreamed of a poor Church that would take care of others, receive material aid and use it to support others, with no concern for itself. 800 years have passed since then and times have changed, but the ideal of a missionary, poor Church is still more than valid. This is still the Church that Jesus and his disciples preached about."

You Christians are now a minority. There are certainly many of you, especially in Africa and Latin America, but you are a minority.

"We always have been but the issue today is not that. Personally I think that being a minority is actually a strength. We have to be a leavening of life and love and the leavening is infinitely smaller than the mass of fruits, flowers and trees that are born out of it. I believe I have already said that our goal is not to proselytize but to listen to needs, desires and disappointments, despair, hope. We must restore hope to young people, help the old, be open to the future, spread love. Be poor among the poor. We need to include the excluded and preach peace. Vatican II, inspired by Pope Paul VI and John, decided to look to the future with a modern spirit and to be open to modern culture. The Council Fathers knew that being open to modern culture meant religious ecumenism and dialogue with non-believers. But afterwards very little was done in that direction. I have the humility and ambition to want to do something."

The Life & Light of St. Joseph

An old woman was leaning against a wall, her face upturned, her shoulders heaving. 'She's dying!' the tourist reported to Enami.'

'What would you like us to do?' Enami asked angrily. 'This old woman isn't the only one dying in this country!' At that very moment, the crowd suddenly opened a pathway. Two young nuns in grey frocks, a white woman and an Indian woman, approached the old lady, leading two men who carried a litter. They whispered something in Hindi to the old woman, then wiped her vacant face with wet gauze. 'Those nuns work with Mother Teresa,' Enami informed the Japanese. 'They search out the fallen in Calcutta and care for them until they die.' 'That's pointless,' Sanjo jeered. 'That's not going to get rid of the poor and beggars throughout India.

Seems futile and stupid to me. 'I'm Japanese,' Mitsuko spoke to the Caucasian nun. 'Can I ask why're your doing this?' 'What?' With a look of surprise, the nun opened her blue eyes wide and stared at Mitsuko.

'Why are you doing this?'

Her eyes still brimming with surprise, the nun slowly answered. 'Because, except for this. . . there is nothing in this world we can believe in.'

It may be only an odd coincidence that brings together the Church's *Month for Life* and the beginning of the St. Joseph Stewardship campaign; only an accident by which these days, when we pray for all vulnerable people—children and refugees, victims of war and violence, the aged and infirm—are also the days when the members of this community are asked how they might become more fully engaged in the mission and ministry of St. Joseph. Yes. It might be just a coincidence. But if it is, it is, indeed, a fortunate one, since the Church's call to value each person as a unique image of God is precisely the source of our mission at St. Joseph, and the strength of our ministry as a People of God.

"Ignited by the Eucharist to love and serve!" So proclaims our mission statement, and in this proclamation, it offers us a challenge: to be ourselves for each other, and to be ourselves for the world. To bring the experience of Jesus Christ, that each one of us has had uniquely, out of the sky and the theory, into the real world of love and service. This is Stewardship, and it is something each of us must choose, if we are to imitate Christ, who became not all humanity, but one human being, loving and serving in a particular place and time, and who calls his followers to do likewise.

For, this fire that is ignited in us is not generic, but as diverse as the population of St. Joseph. It is the fire that leads Mary Ott to rise, even on the coldest mornings, to set the altar in preparation for daily mass. It is the fire that moves Dolores

Browne to rise against the pains of age and proclaim the word of God as though it were burned on her soul. It is the fire that lights the way for Beth Peterson when she comes to the still-dark school in winter, and that fire that warms the houses where Tom Newman brings the gift of St. Vincent de Paul. The fire that ignites this community warms the heart of George McCall, and shines in the voice of Jennifer Kelly. It is a torch carried to the West Bank by John McKay, and to West Seattle by Jennifer Paquette. It is a flame, ignited by the great Paschal fire of Christ Jesus, but living in the many fires that make up this community of warmth and light, of passion and transforming love.

The richness of St. Joseph Parish may be found in this multiplicity of fires, ignited by the Eucharist, at the altar we all share. But it is also in the tremendously personal love and service given through this Parish community. I have seen such love in many ways during my years at St. Joseph: in the teacher who leans down to a pupil's side, listening for the small, scared voice, and then showing a way that frees the child from sorrow and from feelings of failure; in the successful lawyer, who brings sandwiches and fruit for the St. Martin de Porres shelter, and then stops and talks with the homeless man sitting on the bench outside the church; in the altar server, who leans over to her younger partner, to help her understand what comes next and why; in the volunteer who pours coffee, always with a smile, for a family she does not know, but who have come to St. Joseph to bury their mother. Each of these, and a million other moments, recall that we who are St. Joseph live our mission of Stewardship by loving and serving, not humanity, but each human being brought into our path. We do not always do so perfectly, of course, but we try, because in each of these people we see the face of Christ, the light of God, the presence of the Spirit whose love we have come to know. This is why we give of our fortune: because we have begun to give of our heart.

In this Month of Life, the Church calls us to see each living being as an image of God—from conception to death, in poverty or in wealth, native born or immigrant, Catholic or Moslem, gay or straight, strong or powerless, innocent or horrendously guilty—and to love them, in the particular and blessed way we are able to love. So, too, as Stewards of St. Joseph, we are asked to see the individuals who bless us and the individuals who need our blessing, too. Let us give, not to another agency, but to one another; let us love, not the vague generalities, but the living body of Christ enfleshed; let us bless, not in mere words, but with hands and lives, and the crazy generosity of the beloved.




Family Mass & Pancake Breakfast
