We Are All Ninevites

"You are concerned over the gourd plant, which cost you no effort and which you did not grow; it came up one night and in one night it perished. And should I not be concerned over the great city of Nineveh, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand persons who cannot know their right hand from their left, not to mention all the animals."

-Jonah 4: 11-

Again the throb of compassion rather than the breath of consolation: the recognition of how long, how long is the mourners' bench upon which we sit, arms linked in undeluded friendship, all of us, brief links, ourselves, in the eternal pity.

This week, in the daily readings for Mass, we have had the chance to listen to and pray with the *Book of Jonah*. Though many of us know at least some part of the story—e.g., Jonah ran away from God, was swallowed by a fish, got thrown up on shore three days later, etc.—for most of us, this is just another in a whole list of somewhat odd historical or prophetic texts in the Old Testament. Yet, for me, it has become one of my favorite parts of Scripture—and, this week, I have begun to notice how timely are the lessons of *Jonah* in the age of Pope Francis, on the one hand, and our dysfunctional Congress on the other.

The first thing to know about Jonah, however, is that it is not historical—it is a story, pure and simple, and a comedy at that. For those who believe that the Bible contains only lofty tomes of serious theology and often grim history, the Book of Jonah is both a challenge and a gift. While based upon a real character—a member of the prophetic guild, mentioned in 2 Kings, who lived in 8th century Palestine—the story of Jonah has as little to do with its historical namesake as the movie, Abraham Lincoln, Vampire Slayer, has to do with the historical 16th President of the United States. Though mistakenly placed among the Prophetic Books, Jonah is written far later, as a comic allegory meant to explore the strange and wonderful mercy of God. Like Job, its more tragic counterpart, Jonah takes us beyond the simple notion of God's justice, where the law breakers are evil and worthy of punishment and the law followers are admirable and deserving of reward. Instead, the God of Jonah pardons the guilty foreigners and loves them, while the supposedly virtuous and law-abiding Jewish Prophet, though never harmed by God, is seen as something of a putz, who never comes to appreciate the true nature of the God he serves.

When Jonah runs away from God at the beginning of this book, the reader is led to believe he does so because he is afraid to do as God has asked: i.e., to go to Nineveh, the capital of one of Israel's great enemies, Assyria, and tell them they are all about to get destroyed. Which seems a fairly natural hesitation. Only later, when the Ninevites have all repented, do we realize the real reason Jonah runs away, as he tells God, "This is why I fled at first toward Tarshish. I knew that you are a gracious and merciful God, slow to anger, abounding in kindness, repenting of punishment" (4: 2). As a patriotic Isra-

elite, Jonah wants Nineveh destroyed, wants God to kill them all; but he knows that God is a soft-touch for the repentant, and that God's annoying mercy is likely to let the Ninevites off the hook, if they listen to the message Jonah brings. Of course, once God shows he is not going to let Jonah run away, the reluctant Prophet does bring the message—in as short a form as possible. In a city that it takes, reportedly, three days to walk across, Jonah offers a mere eight words of warning, "Forty days more and Nineveh shall be overthrown" and then goes off to watch the show.

Unfortunately for him, these eight words are all that is needed to lead the entire country into repentance. Though they have no knowledge of the God of Israel, have no proof of anything Jonah says, all the Ninevites, from the king on his throne to the cattle and sheep, begin a fast and cover themselves with sack-cloth and ashes (and if you can picture the cows and sheep in sackcloth and ashes, you get a sense of the comedy the author intends). And God, compassionate even upon these foreigners, relents—much to Jonah's dismay.

Of course, God also tries to be compassionate to Jonah; tries to teach him the lesson that true justice, Divine justice, is inseparable from compassionate love. He gives him a gourd tree for shade, and then has a worm kill the tree, to open Jonah's eyes to the hatefulness of death. But all Jonah feels is resentment, as though he is entitled to the tree, and God was now stealing from his wealth. The story ends with the foolish, though still beloved Prophet asking for death, as God tries to convince him of the goodness and blessedness of all life. We leave the story laughing, but perhaps, also, a bit uncomfortable.

In these days of divided government—when children await WIC payments for food and cancer patient advocates clean houses to make ends meet; in these times of war and displacement—as refugees stream across the border from Syria or remain trapped amid the rubble of war; in these places of fear and mourning—where hopeless mothers abort their unloved children and weakening elders look for death—how many of us sit complaining that the gourd tree, given us by grace, has been taken away? How many of us grumble, like Jonah, blaming and resentful that *our side* has not yet won, that we have not gotten *our* rights, that those *others* have not yet perished? But this attitude—foolish and funny, were its effects not so disastrous—need not define us, need not control us.

As Pope Francis shows, with courage and compassion we can be like the God who sent Jonah to Nineveh and sent Christ Jesus into our midst: "gracious and merciful, slow to anger, abounding in kindness, repenting of punishment." But if we are to be like Christ, or like God who made us, we must gentle our Jonah-hearts, our resentment and our sense of entitlement. We must speak our message of repentance forcefully, but not from anger, from compassion; from the experience of suffering we share with whole human family. If we are to be like Christ, we must become the givers of mercy and the mercy which is given, willingly laying down our lives, even for our enemies; indeed, especially for our enemies. We must become compassion together, rejoicing for the life of the Ninevites—not to mention all the animals.



Sister Parish in El Salvador

One of the greatest achievements of our 26 year relationship with our Sister-Parish of San Bartolomé in El Salvador has ben the DHP Scholarship Program, which St. Joseph has helped maintain--although only sporadically. In a region where many young people emigrate because of poverty and lack of work, these scholarships help students attain an education in El Salvador, and then require them to return to their community and give back. Serving nearly 40 students (though the program receives three-times that number of applicants), with a budget of only \$35,500, the impact of these scholarships is huge compared to the cost. Yet, even at these low costs (less than \$1000 per student per year), the program has trouble meeting expenses for the number of students.

This year, on Mission Sunday Weekend, October 19-20, St. Joseph Parish will support our brothers and sisters with special envelopes to maintain this scholarship program. Envelopes will be available and you will be able to give on-line, as well.

As an added incentive, an anonymous St. Joseph parishioner has agreed to match all funds raised, dollar-for-dollar. This is a wonderful and graced opportunity to bless bountifully from the bounty we have received.





This weekend we will start to sing a new setting of the Gloria. As you know, the translation of the mass changed two years ago, which necessitated new music for all the various acclamations, some of which we had come to know so well. Every parish in the US (and other English speaking places around the world) has struggled over the past two years to learn new mass settings and the most difficult of all of these has been the Gloria. Music directors have struggled to make decisions about which settings are the best for their community to learn and to try to guess what might become the next "Mass of Creation" (the mass setting that was far and away the best known over the past 30 years). The reason that the Gloria has been so difficult is that the text for the Gloria is much longer than any of the other acclamations and, since it is translated word for word, no value was given to how it would "sing." While refrains are not too difficult to set compositionally, the verses tend to sound like the composer jammed a bunch of words into a meandering melody.

I believe the simple chanted version that we have learned over the past two years has enabled us to re-learn this ancient hymn and to pray it reasonably well. We also want to have a more upbeat metrical version for the Gloria in our parish repertoire and that is what we will introduce this weekend. Since it is metrical, the verses will initially be sung solo by cantor and choir until all of us have a chance to hear it several times and we can all begin to pick it up. It will take some time for all of us to get it, a year or more, and that's fine. We're not going anywhere!
