The Mystery of the Pink Candle

I know this happiness / is provisional:
the looming presences— / great suffering, great fear—
withdraw only / into peripheral vision:
but ineluctable this shimmering / of wind in the blue leaves:

this need to dance, / this need to kneel:
this mystery.

Winter came to Seattle last week with a brilliance and bitterness that left many of us awed by the sharp-shadowed beauty of the world outside our windows. As we watched the mountain float in the southern sky, painted by the rising sun; or watched the Olympics carved against an early sunset, as plumes of vapor rose from rooftops and from passing cars, it seemed as though the world were held suspended in a frozen beauty—although, admittedly, the appreciation of that beauty was easier from inside a heated home than when we walked outside. Yet, even walking with popsicle toes and a ridiculous hat, I sensed the grace of these middle days, and felt as though the world was speaking the advent prayer of chill quiet, longing for the coming light.

But, like advent itself, these winter days bore with them more than quiet moments of hot cocoa and conversations around a fire. For the candles glow, but the circle of light is not yet complete, and the world—being the world—remains a place of loss as well as beauty, of darkness as well as light, of separation as well as profound and promised union.

Last week, Patricia Boyle, the mother of Rick Boyle, Assistant Principal at St. Joseph School, died in Spokane, surrounded by her husband and sons. Soon after, Steve Wodzanowski's mother, Rosemary, thought to be on the mend, died in New Jersey, again surrounded by her family. Others, too, connected to our community have passed out of our small circle of light, including Tom Royce, former Provincial of the Jesuits, who died in Spokane; and a young woman, Joan Kelly, sister in-law of Christine Kelly, who died of brain cancer at only 54. These are just a few, of course, of the many deaths in our world in these last few days—some, like Nelson Mandela, mourned with great celebration, some mourned only by a small circle of family and friends, and most mourned hardly at all, anonymous in the face of so much other suffering, so many other losses. Cold is the winter that surrounds us, and many are the hours of darkness as the winter gloom descends.

How odd it can seem that at this moment, as the world's light moves toward its nadir, our advent preparations call us to ignite the pink candle—or, as in St. Joseph, the candle with the pink ribbon. "Gaudete!" "Rejoice!" the Church proclaims, as we begin the third week of advent. Even as the hours of sunlight shrink across the northern hemisphere, as we feel the ache of our losses and the fragility of all that we had seen flourish in the sun, we are summoned to rejoice. How is this possible? How can our hearts, frozen and darkened in the wintering world, turn from the deep purple of twilight to joy? Yet, we are called to this: as the baptist was called to the desert, as Mary was called to her motherhood, as Joseph was called to welcome a child he knew he had not fathered. Rejoice! Rejoice!

With unfathomable love, God chooses to enter the world in all its darkness. God chooses to come among us, not with conquering armies nor with hosts of angels, flashing with the brilliance of the divinity. No. God chooses to grow in the darkness of a human womb—from fertilized egg to embryo, from embryo to child—wholly dependent on a mother's love, on the food her husband brings her, on the community of care in which she grows and lives. God ripens among us, in a dark place, protected from the cold world by a body of love. And as with Christ, so also with us: we grow surrounded by communities of love, by bodies who hold us and give us life, who carry us in our fragility and feed us with the small nurturance by which we are strengthened for the painful birth that will bring us into light and family. And at the same time, we are that body of love by which others are held and nurtured, even in the times of their darkness, in moments of loss and loneliness.

We rejoice today not because the dark is vanquished and the cold is no more, but because we are, as one body, the mystery of advent: the promise of light that cannot be overcome, of warmth and new life that neither death nor darkness can destroy. Rejoice!

Extension of the IRA Charitable Rollover

The fiscal cliff act passed on January 1, 2013, includes several important provisions that allow you to support the causes you believe in using your Individual Retirement Account (IRA). If you are 70½ or older, you can make a gift of up to \$100,000 to St. Joseph Parish from your IRA. The amount you give can meet your annual distribution requirement. By making an IRA charitable rollover gift, you are able to lower your income and taxes for this year while supporting the mission of our Parish.

How to Make an IRA Rollover Gift in 2013

Contact your IRA custodian to make a gift from your IRA for 2013. The IRS will treat the amount of the cash gift as if you had made a direct rollover to charity and you can then avoid federal tax on the amount of the gift.



Blood Drive Thank You!

Monday's blood drive brought in 29 donors. Our goal was 36 so we met 80% of our goal. Not a great turnout but, every donation counts and we collected 24 units which, because each pint can be separated into 3 different parts, will help up to 72 patients over the holidays!

Just this morning we had an order for a patient, a 22 year old male with Burkitt Lymphoma who had internal bleeding. He is O Positive but was transfused with O Negative because it was urgent and the doctor's didn't have time to 'type' him. He used 27 units of blood. That's almost the equivalent to the number of donors at St. Joseph's blood drive, just for one patient!

We are so grateful to all the donors who regulalry support us! You make a difference!



Participate in the Survey Answer the Pope's Call Let Your Voice Be Heard!

In asking the bishops of the world to listen to the ordinary women and men of the Church, in calling you and me and every other member of St. Joseph Parish to put our two-cents in about the issues to be addressed at the upcoming Synod, Pope Francis is signaling something quite radical: the Church begins with us.

This huge institution, which seems so far away, up the great ladder of hierarchy and across the sea in Rome, begins with the experience of God in the heart and life of individual men and women of faith, who are brought together by the love of Christ Jesus and the power of the Holy Spirit.

In this call, Francis reminds us of the words of the Second Vatican Council: "All the faithful scattered throughout the world are in communion with each other in the Holy Spirit so that 'he who dwells in Rome knows those in most distant parts to be his members¹¹¹ (Lumen Gentium, 13).

And in a way more profound and amazing than most of us have experienced, 'he who dwells in Rome' is clearly interested and enriched by the experience of you and me.

To answer the summons of the Pope in the short time available, dioceses and parishes around the world have sought various methods and tools.

At St. Joseph, we will offer a written survey.

Individuals are encouraged to respond to the survey questions, and to include reflections as requested. All are asked to respond prayerfully and honestly, with hearts open to the the movement of the Spirit in your own life and in the life of the community of the Church that you know. May God give us wisdom and insight, and so bless the Church with our reflections.
