# Seeing Lazarus at Our Gate

There was a rich man who dressed in purple garments and fine linen and dined sumptuously each day. And lying at his door was a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who would gladly have eaten his fill of the scraps that fell from the rich man's table.

-Luke 16: 19-21-

Each individual Christian and every community is called to be an instrument of God for the liberation and promotion of the poor, and for enabling them to be fully a part of society.

This demands that we be docile and attentive to the cry of the poor and to come to their aid.

-Pope Francis, Apostolic Exhortation-

Recently, a report from Oxfam noted that the 85 wealthiest individuals in the world—a number too small to be considered as a percentage—control approximately the same amount of wealth as the poorest half of the world's population. Further, the report notes, approximately 1% of the world's population controls half its overall wealth. Taken together, these two statistics indicate both a staggering concentration of wealth in the control of a relative few, and a huge disparity between the wealthiest of the world and the vast number of poor. Though such statistics say nothing of the moral value of the *persons* involved—i.e. people are not immoral because they are rich nor moral because they live in desperate poverty—they call us, as Christians, to consider the gospel justice of such disparity, and impel us to discern what our faith and our Teacher would have us do.

In the story of Lazarus and Dives, there is no sign that the rich man intentionally or deliberately harmed the poor one, who lays at his door. Indeed, nothing in the story ascribes to the rich man any evil purpose or action—i.e., there is no sense that his wealth is stolen or that he is corrupt in his use of it. However, the vast discrepancy between Dives and Lazarus, and Dives' blindness to his poor neighbor, signifies a social sin, a rupture that destroys the very order of the universe, as God intends it. Lazarus, so poor and hungry that the dogs come and lick his sores, is kept from living a fully human life by a system in which he has no power; while Dives, who lives in wealth and comfort, accepts the functioning of this system without question. In his failure to act, Dives, thus becomes (perhaps unintentionally) a contributing part of this sinful structure, and so loses himself within it. In this way, Jesus proclaims that we must do more than *not* be corrupt; we must actually seek to do good, and undo the parts of any system which lead to such vast, unconscionable discrepancies.

The Christian tradition, especially in its Catholic articulation, has never believed in an absolute right of private property; rather, personal property exists in the service

of the common good. Because all things come from the abundance of God and exist within God's Providence and through God's will, distribution of the goods of the earth is conditioned by God's love for the world and for the people within it. So it is, that all persons, made in the image and likeness of God, have an equal moral right to the things which sustain their lives and allow them to fulfill the end for which they are created.

The Catholic tradition has, therefore, long held that personal ownership of property is good, because it is an efficient and effective means to meet the needs of the community at large. Just as individual liberty of thought helps in the filtering of truth from falsehood, so a right to property helps spur development and create more efficient and generally beneficial means of production and distribution. Movement of capital and labor, more effective means of production, innovation, creativity, etc. all may be served through the possession of private property. But such property is not, in that, an absolute good, and may be (indeed, should be) checked so as to ensure that all individuals have a relatively equal ability to realize their humanity through possession of the basic goods of life: e.g., adequate food, habitable shelter, potable water, breathable air, basic health care, fundamental education, honorable work, etc. This is why the Church, from its earliest days, has supported redistribution of wealth through both voluntary and involuntary means (e.g., through charity, through taxation, and, in extreme cases, even through the unrecompensed seizure of individual property). It is why, since the 19th century, the Church has supported such policies as collective bargaining and trade union organizing, charitable foundations and progressive taxation: all for the sake, not of equal distribution of property, but of equitable distribution of both the benefits and liabilities of society.

Today, as Pope Francis challenges the proponents of unbridled capitalism not with an alternative economic theory but with the gospel of Jesus Christ, we cannot sit on our couches, gazing at our iPads, and ignore Lazarus at our door. Nor can we be satisfied because we have not personally injured the poor or, by our own actions, been the cause of their suffering. Rather, we who live in places of power, we who have voice—even though we may think it small-must speak up in admonition against the structures that distort and destroy the most vulnerable among us. We must seek ways of closing the gap between rich and poor, so that the poor might have the chance for dignified and humane lives. This is not the agenda of one political party or another; it comes not by choosing between more personal charity or greater governmental action. Rather, it calls us to conversion of our hearts and our social system, calls us to reject the ideology of mine. It calls us to become stewards of the world's wealth, who hold all things for Christ, embodied in those who wait just outside our door.





# Catholic Schools Week A Reflection



I went to Assumption Catholic School in Spokane where it was common for kids to ask their parents if they could go to public school for the fourth grade, then return to Assumption for the fifth grade. The impetus for these requests was that leaving the school during the fourth grade meant avoiding Sr. Jackie.

Sr. Jackie was mean. And by mean, I mean she made you turn your homework in on time, keep your columns straight on math assign-

ments, look at her eyes when you spoke to her and respond to every question, written or oral, in a complete sentence. She also made you keep your shirt tucked in. She was mean.

Her discipline system was ruthless. If you spoke out of turn, failed to turn in your homework or exhibited any mischievous behavior, your name was written on the board. That was a warning. The next infraction garnered a check after your name and meant no recess for you. Two checks meant two recesses, and so on.

One time, Sr. Jackie didn't think the side comment I made in religion class was funny. "Mr. Fennessy, go put your John Hancock on the board." An astute student of history, even in fourth grade, I walked up to the board and in very large letters signed John Hancock's name as close to what I had seen on the Declaration of Independence as I could. "Go ahead and put a check after your name, Mr. Hancock." One of many recesses I spent inside...

I made it through fourth grade, and because of Sr. Jackie, I still keep my columns straight and my shirt tucked in. My mom bumped into her in the grocery store several

years ago and told her that I was working in Catholic schools. Sr. Jackie laughed out loud and said, "Serves him right."



# St. Vincent de Paul

Next weekend will bring the first Sunday of the month, the day when we collect donations after the weekend Masses. Your generosity always is appreciated because it makes a real difference in

peoples' lives—including 55 2nd graders from our own St. Joseph School.

Toward the end of last year, the three second grade classes from St. Jos' School took a community-outreach visit down to the St. Vincent de Paul headquarters facility on 4th Avenue South. Led by teachers Grace McLaughlin, Mary Guerra and Kesslie Hollingshead, and some stalwart volunteer parents, the St. Joseph kids pitched right in.

First they learned about the work of St. Vinnie's: the stores that sell donated furniture and other durable items in good condition. They were taken on a tour of the facilities: the call center where requests for help come in, where the donated items are received and displayed, and the food bank where people of all ages come to pick up much needed supplies for their tables, cupboards and refrigerators.

Teacher McLaughlin explained the food bank proved to be the highlight of the kids visit. The St. Vincent de Paul staff had everything ready and well organized for the students to lend a hand. Rather than just stand and watch, they all stepped up and participated in handing out the bread, the canned goods, the veggies and the boxes of cereal. "They could see face-to-face the people who needed help—some of them their own ages—and realize that not everyone is doing well in life," McLaughlin said "And that by handing out the food the children were helping real people with real needs."

Someday, perhaps some of those second graders will become members of the St. Vincent de Paul Society. Perhaps some will even be at the church door to accept donations on the first Sunday of each month.

Please join us for Catholic Advocacy Day in Olympia on Friday, February 21st! Our theme is Proclaim Justice & Life for All! Our time together will include:

- Briefings on legislative issues and stories of how advocacy is making a difference
- Mass with Archbishop J. Peter Sartain
- **Appointments with legislators**

The purpose of Catholic Advocacy Day is to meet with our legislators to advocate for people who are poor and vulnerable. CAD is a day of relationship building with legislators and targeted advocacy based on Catholic Teaching and the current bills and budget matters being taken up by the legislature. The priority issues can change from year to year, depending on the bills that are currently before the legislature. The areas we will address with our legislators may include 1) economic justice, 2) housing, 3) access to health care, 4) child welfare, 5) life issues (abortion, assisted suicide, and death penalty), 6) environment, and 7) criminal justice.

We will assist in coordinating buses for the trip to Olympia. Bus locations will depend on registrations and departure times will depend on the bus locations. All bus departures will be early in the morning (6 am to 7:30 am depending on the location). We will provide confirmation emails approximately one week prior to CAD with detailed information about bus locations and departure times.
