
Welcome Sister Parish Delegation From San Bartolome in El Salvador

She is a walking example of faith, hope and perseverance.

Vicenta is a member of the sister parish committee but lives and teaches in a neighboring town of Carasca. We are excited to have Vincenta come up and spend most of her time in our school. Vicenta's smile and life of service is an inspiration.

Maria is the young woman who was in the video we showed at all the Masses last Fall to raise funds for the Sister Parish Scholarship Fund. Maria returned to Arcatao after finishing college and is working as a Counsellor as well as Youth Minister. She is the future of El Salvador and her enthusiasm is contagious.



The Church Is An Inefficient Mess

I hate to garden. I hate the planting and the watering and the weeding and the harvesting. I hate it all. But most of all, I hate the waiting. If I want flowers or vegetables, I go to QFC and pick up what I want. It's quick, it's convenient, it's immediate. The notion of sticking something into the ground and waiting for it over several months—through the shoot, through the bud, through the flower, through the fruit—seems an incredible waste of time. I am sure patience is a virtue; I am sure I need it. . . I just want it now!

This week, standing in the cold on 4th Avenue, I rejoiced as "our" Seahawks rode by in triumph; yet, even as I stood there, I could feel myself impatient with the waiting and with a slight sense that my being there was just a bit hypocritical. After all, I know that neither I nor most of the 700,000 people freezing beside me were there at the countless practices, or were cheering on the many cold mornings that these unlikely champions were laboring to become what they are today. Like buying flowers at QFC, I must admit that I prefer to pick my teams already grown and beautiful, and when they are not, I grow impatient and move along to something else.

But if my impatience is (usually) benign, the quest for efficiency and quick satisfaction that permeates our culture is not always so gentle. It manifests itself in ways that overlook real human suffering and avoid the long struggles so often necessary for justice. It can even lead to a kind of self-destructive resignation by which life becomes just another tool to be managed with efficiency. I recall a case in Texas, where a middle-aged man, convicted of a doublemurder and awaiting execution, appeared on television. Speaking to the prison chaplain, he noted that he had been in trouble most of his life. Now, he said, in prison, he felt he was finally at peace with God. But he wasn't sure that it would last, and in a strange distortion of the prayer offered by Simeon when he saw the child Jesus appeared with his parents in the Temple ("Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation"), this prisoner told the chaplain: "If I have to die, it should be now, when at least I am sure of going to heaven. I'm not sure what state I'll be in later."

There is a grim efficiency in such a statement, an efficiency perhaps characteristic of our whole culture. How often we look to the bottom-line, to the results that we desire, and then seek to reach those results as quickly and expeditiously as possible. We want nourishment, but we don't want to spend the time needed for 3 minute oatmeal, so we grab a breakfast bar on the way out the door. We want to get where we're going, so we drive on freeways instead of back roads, maybe even weaving between lanes to maximize our time-distance ratio. We want fruits or flowers, so we go to QFC instead of to the garden. We want to be identified with a championship team, so we brave the cold for

one day instead of going year after year to "meaningless" games. We want safety, and so we build death-chambers and prisons instead of nurseries and schools. We want salvation, and so we seek an economical God, who'll trade an hour a week for eternal life; rather than a savior who asks us to be disciples every day. In some of these cases, the trade-off is small and insignificant; yet all of them represent a habit of the short-cut, a custom of reducing life to its results. We are, we tell ourselves, a practical people—what a shame it is that our God is so inefficient.

Last Sunday, the Church celebrated the Feast of the Presentation, the feast of the Lord Jesus entering for the first time into his Temple. But how does our God enter? Not with great efficiency, not surrounded by angels with flaming swords, in a manner that would quickly bring all to submission and "conversion." Rather, God comes as a weak, dependent child, in his poor mother's arms—many years away from ever being much of a presence. The refiner's fire that comes is not the roaring power of God, but the muffled gurgle of a baby at his mother's breast and the quiet call of love and recognition.

Of all those in the temple area, it is only Simeon and Anna—two old, weary hangers-on—who see "the day of his coming" and who recognize the grace that has appeared. Everyone else, we can imagine, is busy about the work of sacrifice and exchange, busy imploring God or trading service for love. But Simeon and Anna—faithful and foolish, constant and terribly inefficient—allow the Lord's time to shape them and transform them. In their apparently insignificant lives, they avoid the short-cut and the bottom line, and spend their days doing good, in small ways, until God's grace appears for them.

When Pope Francis says that he prefers a Church that is "bruised, hurting, and dirty because it has been out on the streets," he challenges the cool efficiency of our culture; challenges the spiritual short-cut and the fast-food morality that leads to judgment instead of mercy and death-chambers instead of schools. Proclaiming a living communion, he reminds us that the Church is not a factory, in which salvation can be mass produced.

Rather, the Kingdom of God grows with the messy inefficiency of a child: grows with bruises and failures, through hopes and years of seemingly futile effort—and there are no short-cuts. To become the living Church of God, we must surrender efficiency for fidelity, the quick-fix for unwavering perseverance and for faith that grace is at work, even in the darkness of the winter soil, even in the countless days of practice, even in the small works of love that touch just one soul and dry just one small tear. It will never be efficient, it will often be a mess, but it is surely what our heart desires and what will give life to all the world.

For Those Who Cannot Eat Gluten, An Invitation to Eucharist



Please join us for Catholic Advocacy Day in Olympia on Friday, February 21st! Our theme is Proclaim Justice & Life for All! Our time together will include:

- Briefings on legislative issues and stories of how advocacy is making a difference
- Mass with Archbishop J. Peter Sartain
- **Appointments with legislators**

The purpose of Catholic Advocacy Day is to meet with our legislators to advocate for people who are poor and vulnerable. CAD is a day of relationship building with legislators and targeted advocacy based on Catholic Teaching and the current bills and budget matters being taken up by the legislature. The priority issues can change from year to year, depending on the bills that are currently before the legislature. The areas we will address with our legislators may include 1) economic justice, 2) housing, 3) access to health care, 4) child welfare, 5) life issues (abortion, assisted suicide, and death penalty), 6) environment, and 7) criminal justice.

We will assist in coordinating buses for the trip to Olympia. Bus locations will depend on registrations and departure times will depend on the bus locations. All bus departures will be early in the morning (6 am to 7:30 am depending on the location). We will provide confirmation emails approximately one week prior to CAD with detailed information about bus locations and departure times.
