

The Flood

The State of Washington has only one prison for women, located in the little town of Purdy near Gig Harbor; and in the days before the second bridge was built across the Narrows, it was a difficult drive to get there for a Mass on a Tuesday evening.

Somehow, though, passing through the check-points—where one door needed to be closed before the other could open, and where the gates were topped with razor-wire—has an amazing power to focus the mind. I have always found that going into a prison, even as a visitor, has a tremendously spiritual effect on me—as though all my strengths and gifts were locked outside, and yet I was invited to enter deeper and deeper into this place where I was watched and suspected, and where all I had for protection was the fact that I had been called to be there.

On this day, arriving at the area where Mass was to be held, I was greeted by the chaplain, who asked if I had time to talk to a woman who was deeply distraught. It seems her father, who had abused her for years, had died that morning. I said, "Of course," and was led into one of the guard's offices, where a middle aged Latina sat sobbing. Sitting down beside her, I asked if she wanted to talk, and she looked up, and began to tell me her story. For the next ten minutes, in an avalanche of words, she recounted all the cruelty and violence of her household: the alcoholic fits, the beatings and the sexual abuse; she told how she had been driven onto the streets and into the life that led her to Purdy. And as I listened, I thought I understood something, thought that she was sobbing because at last this brutal man was gone and all these events—though rushing back now—were at last really over. But I was wrong.

It was not because of all these horrible events that this woman wanted to see me; nor because the death of her father had reminded her how cruelly she had been treated. It was not because the final vengeance of death had now been exacted. Rather, she wanted to see a priest because she had never forgiven her father, even after he had gotten sober and repented; she had never given him the mercy he sought nor released him for what he had done to her. And now, she worried, it was too late. Because she never forgave him, he was most certainly in hell—and for all her anger and hurt, she did not want that for him, and wished that somehow she could still offer him her mercy.

I was stunned and humbled by what she said, and I had to struggle to find words of comfort: assuring her that God heard her prayers, even now, and that limitations of time would never restrict the mercy of God. But, honestly, I did not fully understand her powerful need to offer forgiveness. And as she cried on my shoulder, and the chaplain came to tell us we had to get ready for Mass, I sensed how small my help had been and how dry my words. The last thing she asked me was if she could pray for her father in the prayers of the faithful, and I told her yes. Then she was led out one door by the guard and I was led out the other by the chaplain.

In prison, the times allotted for Mass are strictly maintained—a loud horn sounding when the prisoners must move to their next assigned place. At Purdy, in the large room where the Mass is held, the prisoners self-segregate: the Latina gangsters over in one spot, the African-American gangsters in another, the lifers in the back, the older women up front, and those who belong to none of these groups, packed together near the middle. As Mass begins, most of the women pay little attention, though the older women generally take the lead, singing and responding with a zeal and hope that always moves me. In the front row, on this night, was the woman with whom I had spoken, surrounded by her friends, who comforted her as best they could.

After a brief homily, based on the readings, I began the prayers by inviting the woman to stand and pray, and I stepped back. Much to my surprise, she stepped to the center of the room and repeated everything she had said in the guard's office-sobbing at times, but clearly recounting her fear that her abusive and alcoholic father was now in hell and she could do nothing for him. Suddenly, as she wept, one of the lifers stood-up in the back of the room—a young, white woman, with close cropped brown hair. She had that blank, dead face so often found in prisoners with no hope of release; and as she began to walk towards the front, I worried a bit about what was happening. But when she came face-to-face with the older woman, she suddenly reached out and took her in her arms, saying softly that she understood, she'd been there. And there they stood, embracing and supporting one another, sobbing together, for minutes that seemed like eternity—a flood of mercy and grace breaking down every barrier and raising both to new life.

I think most of us do all we can to hide the wounds we have received, to disguise the ways in which we have been hurt. We carry grudges like shields, and count on our scars to keep us safe. We fear that mercy will undo us, that forgiveness will wash us away. Sinned against, we defend ourselves with sin—giving no mercy and asking none. And in all this, we little realize the prison of resentment that holds us, the desert of anger in which we live. But sometimes the prison walls are breached, and the desert taken by a sudden storm; and mercy, stronger than death, is given us by the grace of God and the embrace of Jesus Christ—clothed in the guise of one of our fellow prisoners.

The following is a notice from the Archdiocese of Seattle regarding a current IRS tax scam.

IRS TAX FRAUD SCAM Update March 12, 2014 (Eng & Spa)

Urgent Notice~Updated on March 11, 2014 at 12:00 P.M.

It has recently come to our attention that some Archdiocesan employees and volunteers are victims of a national tax refund fraud.

Victims' social security numbers have been used in fraudulent tax returns for the calendar year 2013. Please be assured that we are taking appropriate steps to determine whether or not there has been a breach of systems within the Archdiocese which may include Parishes and Schools, the systems of our vendors, or if there is a problem with some other source. We have hired the forensic security firm Stroz Friedberg to assist us in analyzing and repairing the affected systems. We are also working with the FBI and IRS to address the issue. We will update this site as more information becomes available.

All employees and volunteers of the Archdiocese of Seattle should take the following steps as soon as possible:

- 1. Call the IRS Identity Protection Specialized Unit at 1(800)908-4490 extension 245.
 - a. The IRS representative will walk you through steps to determine if your tax identity has been compro mised. Note: For joint filers, both spouses should speak to an IRS Identity Protection Specialized Unit representative.
 - b. If your identity has been compromised, follow the instruction given by the representative. Steps to be taken will vary depending on each individual filer's circumstances, but may include:
 - i. Complete and file IRS Form 14039 'Identity Theft Affidavit'. Note: a copy of your identification will need to be filed with this form.
 - ii. Contact Equifax to report the fraud at 1(800)525-6285. They will notify the other major credit reporting agencies.
 - iii. Submit a report of the theft to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). This can be done online at www.consumer.ftc.gov/articles/0277-create-identity-theft-report.
 - 1. Click on "How to Create an Identity Theft Report" and follow the directions listed. The FTC will assign a case number.
 - iv. File a police report with your local police department. Call the department for instructions on how to complete this. In Seattle, this step can be done by phone.
 - 1. The police department will assign a case number.
 - v. Call the FTC to report the number assigned to the case by the local police department. You will need the FTC case number to complete this step.
 - vi. Contact the Social Security Administration at www.socialsecurity.gov/fraudreport/oig/public_fraud reporting/form.htm.
 - vii. If your identity has not been compromised, consider having the IRS place a note on your file in their records. In addition, it is possible to file Form14039 'Identity Theft Affidavit' to alert the IRS to the risk that an event has occurred that may affect your future income tax filings. The IRS representative can explain this process to you.
- 2. Further information from the IRS can be found at www.irs.gov/uac/Newsroom/Tips-for-Taxpayers,-Victims-about-Identity-Theft-and-Tax-Returns-2014.

Re: URGENT NOTICE - Security of Personal Data

The Archdiocese of Seattle sent out an urgent notice regarding victims of national tax refund fraud. We understand that there are members of our community who have been affected. Please closely read the attached notice from the Seattle Archdiocese. We highly recommend following the directions they outline to determine whether your information has been compromised.

To keep informed of latest developments, please visit the Seattle Archdiocese website at www.seattlearchdiocese. org

St. Joseph Parish takes the protection of our parishioner, volunteer, student, and employee data very seriously. We have in place integrated measures to protect your personal data and retain your trust.

- 1. All hardcopy parishioner, volunteer, student, and employee records are stored in separate areas in locked cabinets and offices. Staff access to this information is highly controlled.
- 2. Any and all hardcopy credit card information is stored in secure cabinets within locked offices.
- 3. There is no gateway between the servers and systems within the Parish and those at the Seattle Archdiocese.
- 4. Online giving functions, our servers and membership databases are managed by reputable third-party vendors which maintain current PCI compliance, as well as compliance to US Federal Government OMB requirements. All transactions use industry-standard encryption technology.
- 5. All computers-as well as our server-are password protected and up to date with OS patches and virus protection software. Firewalls and intrusion detection block unauthorized access to our systems.
- 6. Backups are done regularly and securely stored offsite.
- 7. We conduct periodic security reviews in all our systems and maintain industry-standard best practices to safeguard your information.
- 8. All banking records are kept under lock and key.
- 9. Archived records are stored in a secure place away from current year documents.

Please know we go to great lengths to ensure your personal data is protected and that there has been no data breach of parish records to date.


