Almost Home

This last week, I celebrated my 56th birthday. During those 56 years, I have spent 25 years as a student, and have also been a pizza cook, a microfilmer, a house-painter, a waiter, a bartender, a tutor, a teaching assistant, a Jesuit volunteer, a high school teacher, a philosophy instructor, a minister in a Jesuit community, a campus minister, an alumni chaplain, a local superior, a provincial, a delegate to a General Congregation of the Jesuits, a former-provincial, and a pastor. I have assisted at approximately 350 weddings, and presided at a couple of hundred baptisms and funerals, while hearing countless confessions. I must admit, I sometimes wonder if I will ever be able to keep a job.

It was not supposed to be this way. When I was a boy, I used to imagine myself going to law school, entering political life, and following in the footsteps of Bobby Kennedy. Indeed, even choosing to go to Georgetown was, in part, a desire to get close to the workings of government. But somehow, none of it has worked out quite as I expected.

Thinking of the crooked path—filled, it seems, with false starts and wrong turns—that has led me to be sitting at this desk, looking down at the front of St. Joseph, I have, more than a few times, wondered about God's plan for my life. Have I really, finally chosen the right path, i.e., the way God intended? Have I opened the doors I was supposed to open, or were there others that I missed? And what is the plan for the future? What is the map of my life that God is holding?

I don't think I am alone in such thoughts. Indeed, almost every day I meet women and men who worry that they are not living up to God's plan for them; that they have somehow missed a crucial turn in the road, or taken a turn that God never intended. They wonder how they can ever find the path again—ever return to God's plan for their life. Filled with regret and anxiety, these women and men (whose struggles seem so familiar to me) fear that they are lost in a spiritual cul-de-sac where their life turns in circles, unable to find the plan God had so generously provided.

As I wondered about God's plan, and how uncertain I was in my following it, I came—as so often happens—to Mary, the mother of Jesus and the model of all disciples. Praying over the readings for the Feast of the Annunciation (March 25), I found an insight that I never before

imagined: God does not have a plan for our life, God offers an invitation.

Suddenly, as when a long-absent friend enters a room, I felt my heart open and the weight on my shoulders become less. God has not drawn a map of my life, or anyone's life, and then asked me to guess which path leads to happiness and which to misery. Rather, God enters into relationship with each one of us, and stays in that relationship through every twist and turn: inviting us closer, inviting us to be loved, inviting us to make a path by walking it. Just as Mary responded to the invitation of the angel (and, I wonder, had others, perhaps, responded differently before?), so each of us, in every moment of our lives, is invited to respond, invited to follow, invited to "come and see" where Jesus is walking, and where we may yet make a path. When Mary says, Yes, there is no sense that she understands all that will follow; nor is there a sense that all that will follow is precisely preordained. She does not see the blood of Calvary or the tomb laid open, does not imagine the heartache or the loss. She sees only the next step: to say yes or to say no. Yet, moved by her love for the One who asks, she says Yes, and enters the mystery.

In our desire for certainty and control, we may create our strategic plans and our action steps; we may want the path to be laid out before us by a mapmaker God. But God does not want to be our cartographer, God wants to be our friend and our companion. So, God calls us to put aside all the fears of regret and failure, and invites us to open our hearts and our lives, and leap (at least a little) into the unknown. The invitation is to be with Christ; it is a call into a journey with One who loves us, not a summons to follow a plan that a distant deity has left behind. And even if that journey may seem random—as mine has sometimes seemed—if it is made with Christ, it will always bring us home.

The trick, of course, will be to discern what is our own ego-call and what is the invitation spoken into our hearts by the Beloved. But this discernment will be possible when, like Mary, we fast from ego; when we practice giving up our pre-made plans or the objects which distract us; when we cultivate the experience of listening and measuring God's voice in our hearts. (Hmmm: fasting, giving, and prayer. That all sounds vaguely familiar.)

In these last weeks of Lent, we have an invitation before us: to come closer to God, to abide with Christ, to walk with the Spirit on roads marked by sorrow and glory. It does not require us to figure out some vast plan, but only to say Yes to the One who loves us, say Yes to that "Great Wide Open"—and then take the first step.

The Origin of the Way of the Cross

The devotion known as the *Way of the Cross* (or, sometimes, *Stations of the Cross*) began in Jerusalem, during the late 3rd or early 4th century, AD. As the Church became officially recongnized, devotion to the places of Christ's suffering and death led many on pilgrimage to Jerusalem-including Helena, mother of the Emperor Constantine. In Jerusalem, the sites were used for instruction and inspiration , and the pilgrims who visited bought what they found back to their own countries, influencing worship and theology throughout Europe.

Because a pilgrimage to Jerusalem was, for most people, impossible, in the 5th century, St. Petronius, Bishop of Bologna, had chapels designed at the monastery of Santo Stefano to recall the most important shrines of Jerusalem. At this monastery, the faithful could recall the suffering and death of Jesus and imagine themselves in the Holy Land. This is the earliest expression of stations in Europe.

Following the Crusades, pilgrimage to Jerusalem again became popular, and from the 12th century it appears that a journey along the *Via Sacra* (the *Holy Road*) was common for pilgrims, though stations as we know them were not yet established. The Franciscan monks, given care for the holy places in 1342, established the *Via Dolorosa* (*Way of Sorrow*), and then brought the devotion to Europe in the 15th and 16th centuries.

In 1686, Pope Innocent XI gave the Franciscans the right to establish stations within their churches, a right later given to all churches. Over the years, the 14 stations, now considered traditional, were created as a type of miniature pilgrimage that all could take, especially in Lent

The Scrutinies

On the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent, we celebrate the Rite of Scrutiny. Now I'll grant that the notion of "celebrating" something called a "scrutiny" seems more than a little strange and perhaps pedantic in a particularly "churchy" way. In fact, since the early church, the "elect" - those preparing for baptism and full initiation into the Catholic community of faith at the Easter Vigil – have used the three great gospels stories on these three weekends as a source of inspiration and reflection on this last part of their journey - the home stretch of their preparation. The "Woman at the well," "the Man Born Blind" and the "Raising of Lazarus."

The scrutinies are "rites for self searching and repentance and have, above all, a spiritual purpose" according the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. They are "meant to uncover all that is weak, defective or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out and strengthen all that is upright strong and good." It is important to note that the presence of the elect in our midst and the celebration of these rites renews, not only the elect, but the entire community. For all of us this Lenten season is a time for spiritual recollection and interior reflection in preparation for the celebration of the paschal mystery and helping us to know more fully Christ's presence in our lives. Since ours is a culture that neither favors nor fosters meditative quiet the act of interior listening is an art learned only with some difficulty and with practice.

As part of the rite of scrutiny, there is, of course, music. There is always music because it helps us to express our love and our faith on a deeper level than mere words. The brief refrain is tailored to the particular gospel theme for that day: "We thirst for living water," "We search for light in darkness" and "We long to rise to new life." In between each repetition of the refrain the cantor sings the prayers of intercession and, as the cantor raises their arm to invite the response of the assembly, it's important that the elect hear our voices to know of our care and support for them! As St. Augustine says: "Singing is for the one who loves." By its very nature music has both an individual and a communal dimension. In a sense it is very personal but if music does not "sound" then it is not music, is it? Thus it is no wonder that singing together in church expresses so well the sacramental presence of God to God's people.

Let us sing together!




