What Graduates Can Learn From the Ascension

When they had gathered together they asked him, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?" He answered them, "It is not for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has established by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him from their sight.

-Acts 1: 6-9-

In reading the beginning of the *Acts of the Apostles*, it is easy to feel superior to those who followed Jesus and gathered with him on that mountain just outside of Jerusalem. After all, even though they have been with Jesus for years before his crucifixion and resurrection, and with him for another forty days after his resurrection, they still ask the same old question, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?" Wow! Are they that clueless? Can they still be asking about the kingdom of Israel?

But before we roll our eyes and think how much wiser we are than these bone-headed apostles, perhaps we should take a breath and ask ourselves if we really understand the ascension ourselves—or if we are just so familiar with it that is seems as though we understand. Of course, we know it happened, but does it really make any more sense to us than it did to the apostles? After all, why should the resurrected Jesus leave us to fend for ourselves? Why do we have to await a second coming when we already have the first? Would it not be better for him to do as the apostles ask, and establish the kingdom of God right then, instead of waiting until "the end of the age"?

Looking at the centuries of violence and hatred that have occurred since the Ascension— looking at the Inquisition and the Second World War, at the brutality of the holocaust and the kidnapping of two-hundred schoolgirls, at the despair of Columbine and the madness in Santa Barbara—who doesn't reasonably think that we might have all been better off had Jesus done what the apostles asked, and established his rule over all the earth right away, instead of taking off for heaven and sending us the Holy Spirit?

Yet Jesus leaves. And we are left, with this messed-up world, waiting for what will come, looking up at the sky, and wondering, "Why?"

The answer to that question is, of course, the answer to most questions, when it comes to Jesus: he leaves because he loves us. In his departure, he reminds us that his mission is more than a personal mission, more than a statement of his own power and glory. Jesus came into this world not so that we might become his subjects, but so that we might become his sisters and brothers; so that we might become as he is. He came so that we might realize our own calling, and then he left so that we might live that calling fully as the body of Christ in the world.

Only when Jesus completes his mission in the flesh, can we take up ours. Only when he ceases to be, exclusively, the Messiah, can the messianic age begin; only when he ascends out of the role of the singular body of Christ in the world can the whole world become that body, that Christ. As Jesus was anointed by the power of the Spirit in the Jordan, so must we be anointed—must be "Christed"— by that Spirit at Pentecost, and in this way become the new and complete body of Christ. Thus, when we look up into the sky and ask, "What's next?" the answer we find is in us: as a community of faith, as the daughters and sons of God, as the Church.

What happens on that hilltop is a commencement, of sorts, when we are called to step forward and take our place at the side of the One who formed us. We may no longer stand, watching Christ at a distance; for we are now to become Christ in the world. We are now his presence and his power, his promise and his mission for all creation.

This week—and in the coming weeks—thousands of young women and men will cross stages and receive diplomas, indicative of some accomplishment, some conclusion. But, in truth, these graduations are less about the past than they are about the future, less about accomplishments than about mission. The diploma handed to each graduate is, in fact, a ticket entitling him or her to enter a new world, where all that has been achieved is but prologue, and all that has yet to be done awaits the gifts and experiences each one bears.

Every graduate commences into a new beginning, becoming all she has received, and summoned to give of himself as so many have given to him. We are not called to gaze up into the sky, wondering what future will be given to our world by God; we are called to set out from this mountaintop, as people filled with the Spirit of God, as women and men missioned to build the future that our world so desperately needs.






Sacred Silence

Dear Brothers and Sisters: My apostolic journey to the Holy Land in these days was a great grace for me and for the whole Church. It commemorated the fiftieth anniversary of the meeting of Pope Paul VI and Ecumenical Patriarch Athenagoras, which marked a milestone along the path to Christian unity. Patriarch Bartholomaios and I prayed together as brothers before the tomb of the Risen Lord and we renewed our commitment to work for full communion between the Churches. My journey was also meant to encourage the efforts of those who work for peace in the Middle East and those who care for the many people, especially refugees and children, suffering the effects of war and violence. As you know, I have invited the Presidents of Israel and Palestine to join me in praying for peace. Finally, I wished to confirm in faith the Christian communities in the Holy Land, to acknowledge their difficulties and to support their charitable and educational works. May the prayer and solidarity of the entire Church sustain their witness to the Gospel message of hope and reconciliation, and help to bring God's gift of peace to those blessed lands.

some time now.

This weekend we celebrate the Ascension of the Lord. When most of us grew up we knew this holy day as "Ascension Thursday." But, in 1999, in an effort to make it possible for more Catholics to be able to participate in this liturgy it was moved to the Seventh Sunday of the Easter season. There are still some dioceses where it remains on Thursday but, particularly in the western US, it has been celebrated on the following weekend for quite

The tenor of the readings for these last few weeks of the Easter season has changed rather dramatically as Jesus prepares the disciples for his leaving. He missions them out into the world and promises to be with them always..."until the end of the world." There is much good music, too, that captures the spirit of this promise and this commission.

During the months of August and September 2005, the National Association of Pastoral Musicians (NPM) conducted a national online survey called *Songs That Make a Difference*. Catholics all over the United States were invited to name a liturgical song that has made a lasting impact on their own life of faith and then to provide a brief explanation for their choice. "Be Not Afraid" written by Bob Dufford, one of the St. Louis Jesuits, was ranked #3 on this list. In a couple of short verses the song manages to speak to the deep, dark fears that are part of being human and facing the challenges of life and wrap them in God's promise to "go before us always." Each refrain ends with the invitation: "Come, follow me, and I will bring you life." We sing this at the 5:30 contemplative mass this weekend.

There are plenty of hymns that tell the story of Jesus' "ascension" from the first reading from the very beginning of the Acts of the apostles...essentially the story of the birth of the church. Jesus, who has been talking with the disciples, suddenly disappears, being lifted up into a cloud obscuring their sight. The punch line is always the angel appearing and asking the disciples why they're sitting around gazing into the sky. There's work to be done! The one we'll sing this weekend is "Hail the Day That Sees Him Rise." The text was written by Charles Wesley who wrote over 6,000 hymns in his lifetime and, along with is brother John, founded what we know as the Methodist denomination. He wrote ten verses so you can tell he wasn't Catholic! The tune is LLanfair, which,

as you can probably tell from the consecutive letter "L" is Welsh. The composer was Robert Williams and it was harmonized by John Roberts. The main tune is apparently named after Williams' hometown of Llanfairpwllgwyngyllgogerychwyrndrobwllllandtysiliogogogoch. (I am not making this up!). In English, the name means "church of St. Mary in the hollow of white hazel near the rapid whirlpool of the Church of St. Tysillio by the red cave."

And, finally, there is music to support the gospel story of Jesus missioning the disciples to go out to all the world and "make disciples of all nations." "Go To the World" is, many believe, one of the greatest hymn tunes of the twentieth century. It was written by the great English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams to be wed to the text: "For All the Saints" which we commonly sing on All Saints day. The poem, "Go to the World," was written in the 1990s by Sylvia Dunstan an ordained minister in the United Church of Canada. She has many wonderful, contemporary hymn texts included in our Catholic songbooks.
