All kids need clothes. But there's something special about that first day of school when most children show up with maybe a new pair of shoes, a new shirt or dress. For kids from poor families, just

All of us in the St. Joseph Parish St. Vincent de Paul Conference thank you for your donations of money, and also the household goods and clothing you give to our stores. Your help is special, just like that new dress or shirt for kids on that first day of school.



### Open to Grace

Lord, let me know you; let me know myself. -St. Alphonsus Rodriguez, S.J.-

It has begun. At St. Joseph School, teachers have arrived for service days still dressed in the t-shirts and shorts of summer, but with that look of zealous anxiety and eager reticence characteristic of the beginning of a new school year. Even amid the slightly over-scheduled construction, these professional educators are not unlike their charges: gathering their markers and their construction paper to make their rooms unique and appealing to the sensibilities of their soon-to-arrive students. It is a bit intoxicating to be around, and even in the Parish Center, we feel the buzz and await the blessed onslaught.

Meanwhile, at Holy Names Academy and many other schools in our region, the year is already begun, and the second week of orientation and study is drawing to its close. This last Tuesday, fresh on the heels of a three-day weekend, I was blessed to be with the community of Holy Names for their Mass of the Holy Spirit, celebrated at St. Joseph Church. Led in by the class of 2018, I stood in the red vestments of the votive mass and looked out with awe at the amazing diversity of faces and cultures, of styles and manner, of maturity and talents present in that churchand, indeed, present in the many Catholic schools of the Seattle Archdiocese. Looking at the teachers who stood guard on the edges of each class, and at the Sisters and administrators watching from the back, I was touched by their gentleness and joy, their watchfulness over the girls entrusted to them. And I felt united with them in their work: What grace we are called to shepherd! What grace we are given to receive! What grace we are summoned to prepare for the service of the world and the blessing of all human-

Not by our own merit, but because God calls us and works through us, are we given the grace to educate these children and young adults. Yet, indeed, it is our mission—as parents or as teachers, as pastors or as lay ministers, as a community of faith and as individual believers—and we must accept it, as those first disciples accept the call of Christ on the seashore or as Paul accepted it on the road to Damascus. Grace surrounds us, ready to break forth, and each of us must accept it, must nurture it, must empower it to shine with all the light of Christ, both for our own sake and for the sake of all the world.

Standing in the sanctuary of St. Joseph, looking at the students of Holy Names—at the vast choir on the steps of the high altar, at the numerous cellists and violinists in the south transept, at the class officers setting the table, and the ninth graders nervously lining up in the narthex—I was struck by this responsibility, and by the many factors in our culture that labor to destroy such grace. Especial-

ly for young women, there exists a constant pressure to become a commodity, an object for consumption, whose value rests, not in her intrinsic and unique grace as incarnate spirit or as Sacrament of God, but in how completely she meets the expectations of a mass-market economy. For the poor, this often results in women becoming objects of exchange, as human trafficking debases the most sacred of acts by driving from it every ounce of humanity. But even among the wealthy, this culture of flesh and finance seeks to rob both men and women of their graced identity and cover their light beneath the shadow of mass consumption and artificial desire.

But the call of the gospel is not a call to uniformity; nor is the kingdom of God an expression of market research. Rather, for the daughters and sons of God, true and lasting joy comes in the blossoming of each person's unique combination of graces: in the poet who loves to play football, or the cellist who likes to LARP; it comes in the size-16 dancer, and in the 7-foot sophomore who'd rather play Shakespeare than hoops. It comes when teachers and parents, when mentors and friends, when the whole People of God open the pathway to all the graces kept within the youth of our world.


This is the purpose of Catholic education: to allow of the grace of God to be liberated in the heart of each one of God's daughters and sons. The mission of Catholic education is not about creating better workers, or better consumers, or even better parishioners: the mission of Catholic education is about drawing forth what God has already created—the women and men for whom Jesus Christ gave his life. It is about fostering a lifetime of growth and transformation, as unlimited as grace itself.

This year's theme at St. Joseph School is "Open to Grace" a phrase that can be read either as a description or as a command. If we are to be God's People, we must take it as both. For in the young hearts and minds that grace our classrooms, we are entrusted with souls open to the grace of God everywhere, souls waiting to be nourished, and needing to be protected and encouraged. These children are, by the nature of God's presence in their lives, beings who are open to grace. Yet, in a hostile world, this natural openness is not enough, and we-parents and teachers, friends and believers-must stand with them, showing them the way and opening them to all that their hearts' contain. We are called to open the way of grace by loving all our children, by challenging them and emboldening them, by supporting them and accompanying them in their journey of hope and discovery.

And in that great irony of the kingdom, as we open our children to grace, we, too, will find it in abundance, and come, with our children, into the fullness of God's mercy and light.

# A selection from Pope Francis General Audience, St. Peter's Square, Wednesday, 27 August 2014

•••the Apostle Paul, then, exhorted his communities not to forget that they "are one body" (1 Cor 12:13). Experience tells us, however, that there are so many sins against unity. And let us consider not only the schisms, let us consider the very common lapses in our communities, "parochial" sins, those sins in the parishes. Sometimes, in fact, our parishes, called to be places of sharing and communion, are sadly marred by envy, jealousy, antipathy.... And gossip which everyone passes on. There is so much gossip in parishes! It is not good. For example, when one is elected president of that association, they gossip about him. And when another is elected president of Catechesis, the others gossip about her. But this is not the Church. This is not what one should do, we must not do it! We must ask the Lord for the grace not to do it. This happens when we aim for first place; when we place ourselves at the centre, with our personal ambitions and our ways of seeing things, and we judge others; when we look at our brothers faults instead of their talents; when we give more weight to what divides us instead of to what we have in common....

Once, in another diocese I had before, I heard an interesting and kind comment. It was about an older woman who had worked all her life in the parish, and a person who knew her well said: "This woman never criticized, she never gossiped, she always wore a smile". A woman like this could be canonized tomorrow! This is a good example. And if we look at the history of the Church, there are so many divisions among us Christians. Even now we are divided. Also in history, we Christians have made war among ourselves for theological differences. Let us think of the 30 Years' War. But, this is not Christian. We must also work for the unity of all Christians, to take the path of unity which is what Jesus wanted and prayed for.
