As I write this morning, looking out at the sunny plaza in front of St. Joseph church, I am struck by the beauty of the day. It is September 11, 2014, thirteen years since the hijacking of those four airliners—two in New York, one in Virginia, and one in Pennsylvania—that changed our lives and our sense of the world. Today, after thirteen years of war, after the invasion of Afghanistan and the lies about Iraq, after Guantanamo and water-boarding, after the Arab Spring and Benghazi, after the gas attacks in Syria and the murderous rise of the Islamic State, it seems difficult to place ourselves in an age before the so-called war on terror. We may forget what it felt like when we all held our breath in the days after the attacks, when the skies were oddly quiet and it seemed as though, for one brief moment, we might choose a different path, might not fall again into a cycle of vengeance and retribution with which history is littered. It did not, of course, work out that way. And now, we live in the aftermath, facing new challenges and new calls for war, as though more corpses could bring peace; more bombing bring justice; more shock-and-awe undo the despair that leads to terror; more homeless and heartsick American veterans ensure democracy a world away. It is hard not to think of the old adage, "When all you have is a hammer, everything looks like a nail."

Yet, we have more than a hammer. We are not condemned by destiny or fate to a century of endless war and constant violence. It is a great lie that we are ordained to live in fear, and that we must arm ourselves—as individuals, as nations, as a culture—in order to survive. God has not made us for this. Christ Jesus did not come into the world for this. The Spirit of God, that we have been given, is a Spirit of courage, a Spirit of mercy, a Spirit of self-emptying love. We are chosen for life, made for the reign of God: a reign that begins in the depths of our hearts, and can wash this world clean, if we let it.

To remember 9/11 simply as an act of violence and terror is to miss the miracle that the violence could not conquer; for as the buildings burned with toxic smoke, firefighters and police ran into the horror. They ran into the buildings. They climbed the stairs and saved those they could; and they died, not because the agents of terror struck them down. No. They died because they sought to bring life, to rescue the innocent, to stand in the face of fear and death, and to resist.

When I clear away the fog of these thirteen violent years, I remember the courage of those women and men, and the effect it had to draw our country and our world together. For a moment, we saw the deep truth that hope and courage were stronger than fear and hatred, that violence could not destroy the human spirit that would lay down its life for a friend. Catholics and Moslems, Jews and Atheists, the middle class cop from Staten Island and the commuter flier from Pittsburgh—all were neighbors and friends, all united by the deepest human good of saving the life of others. The hijackers could not kill that, could not even slow it down. And if, with time, we have clouded our memories with fear and hatred, with partisan bickering and pompous chest-thumping, we have missed the gospel taught to us in the ashes of New York and Washington, in the wreckage on that Pennsylvania farm.

We live in an age of miracles: Mandela emerging from prison on Robin Island with a spirit of compassion for his jailers; the students who stood in Tiananmen Square in 1989, and faced down tanks at the cost of their lives; the Buddhist monks who swarmed the streets in protest of the Chinese role in Tibet; Malala Yousafzai, the twelve year old girl shot in the head by the Taliban, for her support of girls' education; and just this week, the four Italian nuns killed in Burundi for their support of battered women and girls. None of these women or men had the power to overcome with violence those who would destroy them; yet, they had a power so dangerous to their opponents that each was marked for death or imprisonment. But no death, no violence, no acts of terror nor intimidation can overcome the Spirit of God moving in the human being fully alive, for the miracle of resurrection and life is never overcome.

This week, recalling the sacrifice of 9/11, let us imagine what the world might become if, instead of using the techniques of our enemies—violence, power, conquest—we used, instead, the techniques of those heroes, and ran into the burning buildings of the world to bring those in danger to safety. What if we risked all we have to preserve what is best in us? What if we chose to live without fear, without terror? It would take courage and could cost much; it would require, indeed, a miracle.

So, what are we waiting for?

- Find renewed hope in living the Gospel and putting your faith into action



"The Singing Thing"
WEEKLY REFLECTIONS ON THE MUSIC WE
USE AT ST JOSEPH'S
~ROBERT McCaffery-Lent

There are a variety of different types of music sung at any given weekend liturgy. And, here I'm not talking about style, but form. There are hymns and songs, of course, but also psalms sung in a responsorial fashion between the cantor or choir and the assembly (If today you hear God's voice, harden not your hearts), litanies such as the Agnus Dei and Kyrie, acclamations (Holy, Holy, Mystery of Faith, Great Amen), and last, but not least, dialogues (PRIEST: The Lord be with you. ALL: And with your spirit, etc). We generally need to use the songbook or a songsheet to sing the songs and hymns but, for the most part, the other music we can sing by heart.

As our church has continued to evolve I have come to see more and more that these simple dialogues between priest and people, or deacon or cantor and people, are hidden gems in the liturgy that help us to sing with ease and to build confidence. They are generally brief melodies with only a few notes and are always in a comfortable singing range. The recent document of the American Church on music in the liturgy titled: "Sing to the Lord" says about dialogues: "The dialogues of the liturgy are fundamental because they are not simply outward signs of communal celebration but foster and bring about communion between priest and people. By their nature they are short and uncomplicated and easily invite active participation by the entire assembly. Every effort should therefore be made to introduce or strengthen as a normative practice the singing of the dialogues between the priest, deacon, cantor or lector and the people."

Of course, dialogue, by the very definition of the word, involves at least two people in a back and forth "conversation". Fortunately, at St. Joseph we are blessed to have two priests and a deacon who are all willing to do their part and sing the dialogues. It's one thing to be part of the congregation and sing these together with a few hundred friends. It's another to be up there and sing solo! When we sing these simple dialogues each Sunday I always find myself being struck by how beautiful and simple these sung "conversations" are and how they lift up the quality of the liturgy. And I am grate-

ful for John and Glen and Steve and their willingness to do this and for all of us who are willing to enter into the sung prayer of our liturgy in this way. In doing so we, in the words of John Gallen, "Carry Christ to one another." Each of us has a voice that is beautiful in it's own way and each voice is needed to "carry Christ to one another."
