#### Violence Against Women Is A Sin

In this day and age, unless Christians are revolutionaries, they are not Christians.

#### -Pope Francis-

It's not about the NFL. It's not about a few overly aggressive men, nor about women with a bad self-image. No. Violence against women is not about a few isolated individuals; it is about us. It's about a culture in which such violence has been, not so much hidden as minimized; privatized to such a degree that, even today, we refer to this particular kind of abuse as "domestic"—as though it were a matter to be kept in the home, to be "worked through" away from the prying eyes of larger society. Only rarely, when a man goes "too far"—e.g., when the neighbors are disturbed or the victim has to go to the hospital—has such violence earned social condemnation; and then, often, the condemnation refers not to the evil of the violence itself, but to the lack of proportionality shown by the perpetrator. In other words, he beat his partner more than a "reasonable" man would.

Violence against women, of course, is nothing new, nor is it limited to any one culture or community; rather, it emerges wherever women are reduced to something less than full humanity, where they are made into objects for men's possession or adornment. One can find such images of women in biblical texts—as when Lot, seeking to protect his male visitors from assault by the men of Sodom, offers his daughters up to the mob—or in the practices of some forms of Islamic fundamentalism. But beyond religion, one can also find this violence in various forms of urban culture, where women are worn as trophies, beside gold chains or furs; or in the airbrushed wilderness of modern advertising, in which even overt references to the violent domination of women is common.

One of the most insidious ways in which we have become acculturated to violence against women has been through the various popular images that diminish its seriousness. Just as the horrors of slavery have been minimized through repeated versions of the "happy Negro" of the ante-bellum South—e.g., recall Bill "Bojangles" Robinson dancing with Shirley Temple in The Little Colonel, or Butterfly McQueen fussing over "Miss Scarlet" in Gone With the Wind—so American culture has reduced the viciousness of spousal assault through the use of television and movies. Who remembers the many times Ricky Ricardo had to put his "whacky wife," Lucy, over his knee, for her own good? Or who recalls when, in the classic film, "The Quiet Man," the heroic John Wayne drags and kicks the over-proud Maureen O'Hara through field and farm, resulting in her losing that wrongful pride and becoming the dutiful wife, which (of course) she always wanted to be. Like parables of violence, these stories and images teach men the rightness of "knocking the girls around," and teach women that they should expect such treatment, until they learn to act in a way that doesn't "deserve" it.

Through the silencing power of shame, cultures have trained women and girls to see themselves as deserving of the beatings given by their spouses or boyfriends. Thus, the victims often assume the blame for such assaults, apologizing for the ways they "provoked" their assailant. Or, they claim that the act of violence was really a sign of care, i.e., "he did it because he loves me." Absorbing the lessons of a sick culture, many women come to believe the myth that such violence is inherent in the relationships of men and women, part the order of nature, and, sometimes, even the will of God. Few heresies are so deep in Western culture, and few distort as viciously the life and message of Jesus Christ; for Jesus was, himself, a victim of violence: beaten and humiliated, to the point of death, by aggressors who thought it both their right and their duty.

The notion that women are children meant to be disciplined by men, or that they are chattel to be used and abused at the will of their masters, emerges in so many cultures as to seem almost self-evident; yet, by his life, death, and resurrection, Jesus overthrows such "self-evident" truths with a new and liberating grace. Throughout the gospels, Jesus proclaims, by his words and actions, a different vision, a different paradigm of power and humanity, which respects women equally with men, and affords them equal dignity in society and culture. In his treatment of the woman caught in adultery (Jn. 8:1-11), in his praise and care of the woman with the hemorrhage (Mk. 5:25-34), in his acceptance of Mary when she assumes the place of a disciple (Lk. 10:38-42), in his praise of the woman who anointed him before his death (Mk. 14:9), in his dialogue with the woman at the well (Jn. 4), in his choice of Mary Magdalen as the first witness of the resurrection (Jn. 20:14-16), and in countless other direct and indirect ways, Jesus rejects the abusive and domineering power given to men in his culture, as in our own. On the contrary, he treats the women he encounters with dignity and respect, which scandalizes many of those around him; and he enters into dialogue and debate with women—as when the Canaanite woman presses him to offer his healing to her daughter, even though he had been sent only to the people of Israel (Mt. 15:21-28). In these encounters, lesus never resorts to violence or diminishment or

abuse. Rather, he affirms the absolute and divinely ordained value of women—an affirmation that does not diminish the value of men, but that overthrows the culture of violence, which we have both inherited and perpetuated.


Recently, Pope Francis proclaimed that "unless Christians are revolutionaries, they are not Christians." The gospel of Jesus Christ up-ends our notions of normal, overturning our long and bloody history of domination and violence. To be a Christian is to stand in absolute opposition to those principles of power that rule this world: where the strong beat upon the weak, and victims are blamed for their own oppression. True Christianity is a revolt against every custom and myth that would accept or, even more wickedly, promote such abuse. While this revolutionary characteristic of Jesus and his followers has not always been applied to the relationship of men and women, it must be if one is to be faithful to the example and teaching of Christ. Violence against women is not simply a societal phenomenon or a sociological problem, violence against women is a sin—a fundamental and tragic rejection of God's will. We must stand against this sin; must educate our sons and daughters that violence against women is not the way things are, but only the way we have allowed things to become. The revolution of grace is upon us. Let us stand up and banish this sin from our world.




