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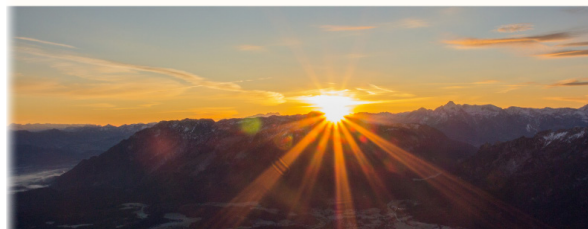

Encounters with Life

January and February Events **at St. Joseph Church**

On January 18th, discover new ways to bring prayer to life at the "Living Rosary" at 7pm in the Church. At this prayer service, each person present embodies a bead on the rosary as it is recited. This is a unique way for those both familiar and unfamiliar with the rosary to engage in prayer for the flourishing of all human life.

On January 22/23, join us for a weekend focused on becoming an Anti-Racist parish. Parishioner Jen Tilghman-Havens will give a homily on the topic, and we will also announce plans to fulfill our commitment to facilitating Anti-Racist trainings and workshops. Anti-Racism is a life issue: Black Lives Matter.

On January 29th, join us, along with the Intercommunity Peace & Justice Center, the Archdiocese of Seattle, KINO Border Initiative, and other parishes at St. James Cathedral at 3pm for a Save Asylum: Walking with Holy Families rally and march. We will be calling on the Biden administration to end the racist and deadly "Title 42" policy, leaving thousands of asylum seekers stranded in inhumane conditions.

On February 6th, we will be co-hosting, with Jesuit Restorative Justice Initiative Northwest, a screening and film discussion of [Since I Been Down](#), a film about how mass incarceration destroys lives and communities in the name of "justice." On February 16th, come hear Michael J. O'Loughlin, an award-winning journalist and author, discuss his new book [Hidden Mercy: AIDS, Catholics, and the Untold Stories of Compassion in the Face of Fear](#) at 7pm at Seattle University. We are extremely grateful to be able to bring to Seattle an author to tell these stories of Catholics in the 1980's and 90's who took a stand against the often-deadly ignorance of the Church and government to help care for their siblings suffering from AIDS. 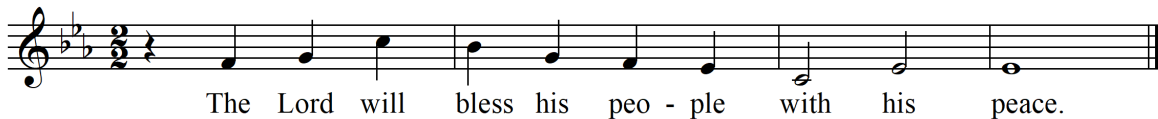

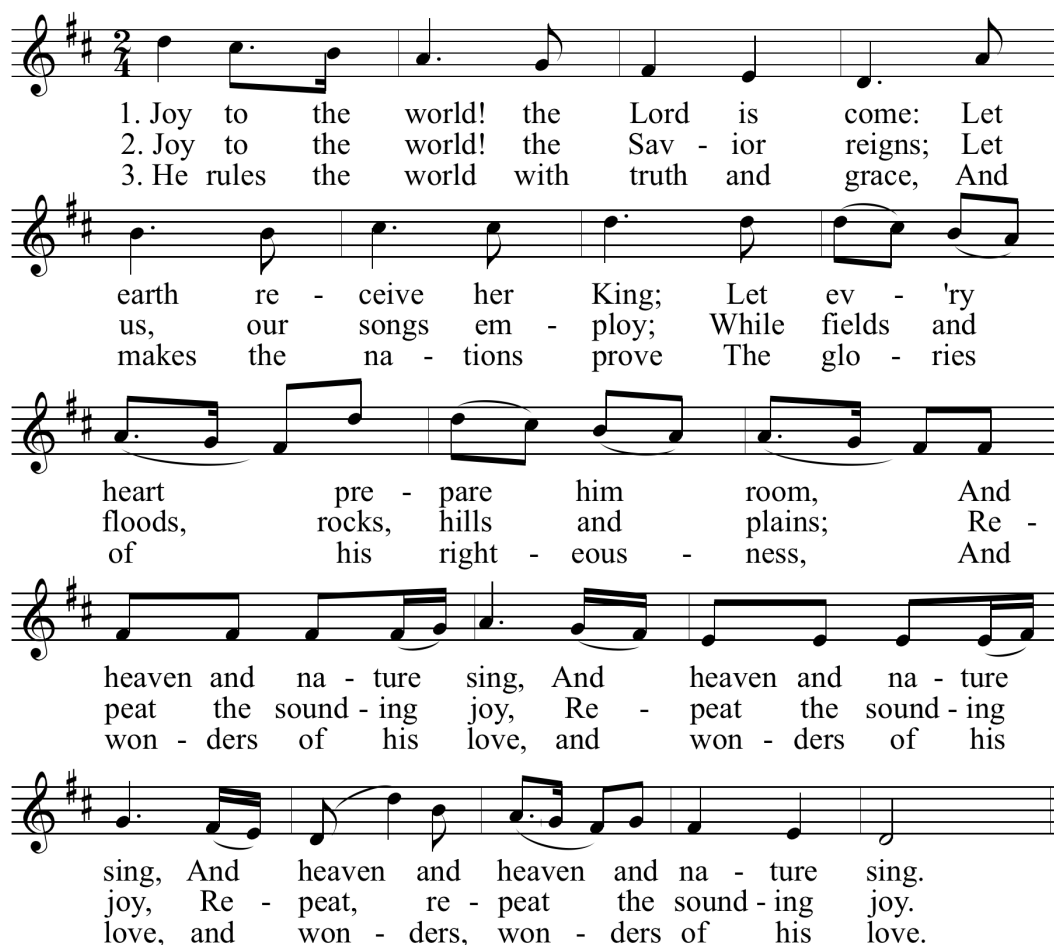

LGBTQ: It's All About Love

January 2022



Welcome to a new year! May we be blessed with open hearts and curiosity. We are called to love and serve one another; to see God in all around us. The beginning of a new year gives us the chance to look back at the gifts of the past year and look forward with commitment and intention.

Scripture - "A new command I give you: Love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." John Ch. 13, 34-35

Looking back - What has St Joe's parish done to fulfill this command and make the parish a safer and more welcoming home for our LGBTQ family? We signed the Tyler Clementi Anti-Bullying petition and encouraged other parishes to do the same. The weekly bulletin has included LGBTQ It's All About Love since June 2021. Our LGBTQ Lawn party on Pride weekend brought together queer and straight families and friends. We celebrated with rainbow cupcakes topped with rainbow rings and rainbow "God Loves Me" necklaces. Don't miss it in 2022! The LGBTQ ministries of St Pat's and St Joe's met at the end of the year to talk about ways we can work together, LGBTQ and straight allies, in the years ahead.

For personal reflection - what have we as individuals done to fulfill this command?

Looking forward - some suggestions to consider: Welcome someone at Mass that you haven't met before. Introduce yourself. Have a little conversation. Greet them when you see them again. Attend an event you might not usually. Michael O'Loughlin is coming to Seattle U in February to talk about his book, *Hidden Mercy: AIDS, Catholics, and the Untold Stories of Compassion in the Face of Fear*. St. Joe's and St Pat's are cosponsoring a book study and discussion of Michael's book on 2/2 and 2/9. Watch for more information in the bulletin. Read something outside your comfort zone that relates to our LGBTQ family. *A Queer History of the United States for Young People* by Michael Bronski is well written and engaging. *Felix Ever After* by Kacen Callender is a novel a young transgender person told me they liked a lot. Be open to learning more about our LGBTQ sisters and brothers. Perhaps even start a conversation with an out parishioner. ([Mark Petterson](#) can help you connect with someone, if you like.) Uncomfortable with LGBTQ people? With our being part of the St. Joe's family? Be willing to look at what may stand in the way of God's command to love everyone. If this seems impossible, or just plain wrong, consider praying about it.

Telling Our Stories - Readers are loving the stories from LGBTQ parishioners. If you're a member of St Joe's LGBTQ family who would be willing to tell their story, please contact Mark Petterson at markp@stjosephparish.org. In the meantime, get to know Harvey Milk, an LGBTQ hero. Check out Randy Shilts' biography, *The Mayor of Castro Street* or *Milk*, an award-winning movie starring Sean Penn.

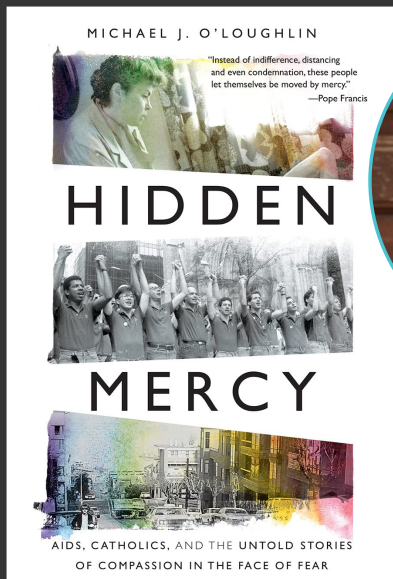

Becoming Antiracist

January 2022: Martin Luther King Jr.

“Yes, it is love that will save our world and our civilization, love even for enemies.” – Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Scripture: James 1: 22-25 You must be doers of the word and not only hearers who mislead themselves. Those who hear but don't do the word are like those who look at their faces in a mirror. They look at themselves, walk away, and immediately forget what they were like. But there are those who study the perfect law, the law of freedom, and continue to do it. They don't listen and then forget, but they put it into practice in their lives. They will be blessed in what they do.

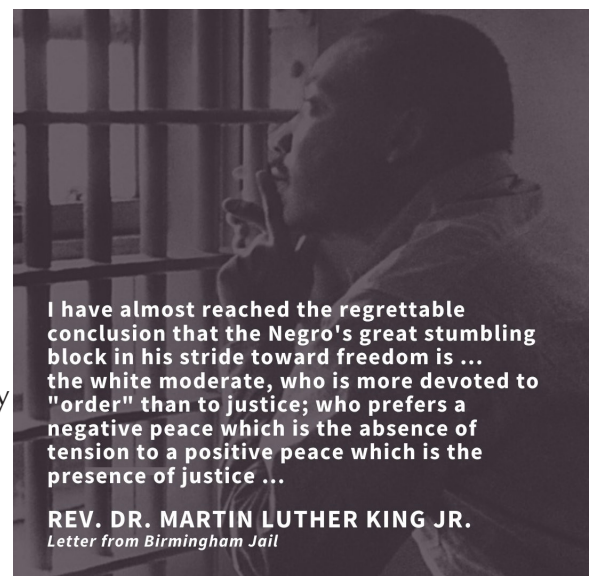
History: In August 1955, 14-year-old Emmett Till's mutilated body was found in the river after a white man thought he may have flirted with his wife in a grocery store. A few months later, with Emmett Till's lynching on her mind, Rosa Parks refused to move her seat for a white person on a bus. Parks's actions helped spark a boycott that would catapult a young minister named Martin Luther King Jr. to national renown. Just 26 years old at the time, King had been recommended as an able young preacher who could mobilize the Black middle class and church community. King said, "Well, if you think I can render some service, I will." This started the public career of one of America's most well-known activists. Martin Luther King Jr.'s "Letter from a Birmingham Jail" has since proven to be one of the greatest works of Christian political theology ever produced by an American. King recognized the need for Christians to be allies, working together in the Black freedom struggle, while acknowledging that most of the white church had chosen the path of complicity over advocacy. from *The Color of Compromise* by Dr. Jemar Tisby, 2019

For further reading: "On August 28, 1963, famed civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. shared his dream of a better world on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. His renowned "I Have a Dream" speech is only one among many places he laid out the philosophy of justice and nonviolence that changed the world forever. Fifty years after his death, King's writings remain the best articulation of our best collective hope for a more just, compassionate, and peaceful world. Here, in the only major one-volume collection of his writings, speeches, interviews, and autobiographical reflections, is Martin Luther King Jr. on non-violence, social piety, integration, black nationalism, and the ethics of love and hope. In the years after his death, the Nobel laureate's writings have only grown in significance and in their prophetic power to challenge and guide us onto a better future." from *A Testament of Hope, The Essential Writings and Speeches, Martin Luther King Jr.* edited by James M. 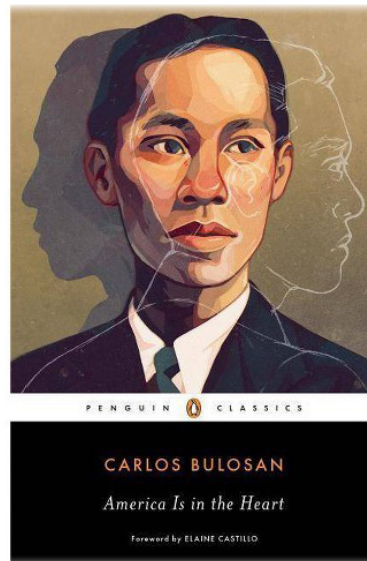

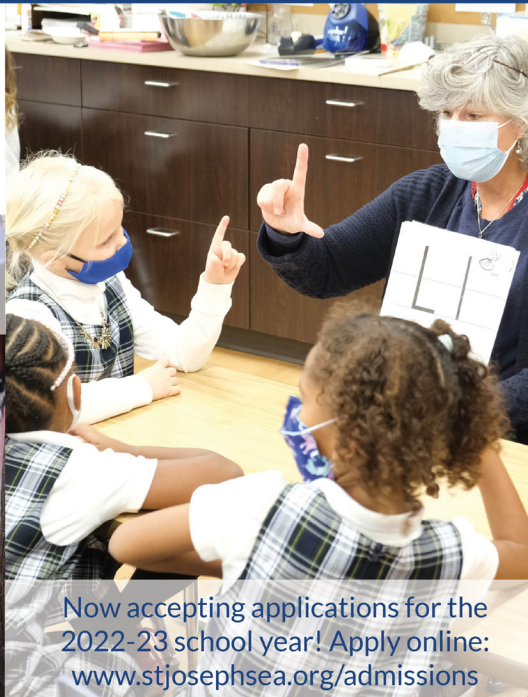

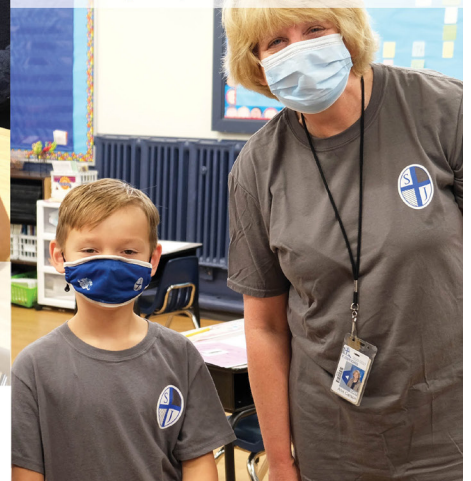
