




Confiteor

First Reading

Deuteronomy 26:4-10

Brothers and sisters: What does Scripture say?

The word is near you,

When the devil had finished every temptation, he departed from him for a time.









Apostles' Creed


I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of Saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting.






Through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever.

The Synod: St. Joe's Listens!

"Let us ask: in the church, are we good at listening? How good is the hearing of our heart? Do we allow people to express themselves, to walk in faith even though they have had difficulties in life, and to be part of the life of the community without being hindered, rejected or judged?" ~ Pope Francis

On October 9th, Pope Francis used these words to open a unique <u>Synod of Bishops</u>, one that will last two full years (instead of the usual three months) and will having a long-lasting effect on how the Catholic Church listens to the people, and not just leadership.

This synod, rather than investigating one particular topic, is meant to discover how the Church can listen better. Reflexively, it is a synod on synodality.

The process "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission" begins with a diocesan listening phase from October 2021 to April 2022, followed by a continental phase from September 2022 to March 2023 and a final "universal church phase" that will look more like past synod meetings in the Vatican in October 2023.

St. Joe's will offer a series of listening sessions in March 2022 (both in-person and on Zoom) to hear the Spirit speaking to this parish. These sessions will be identical in format: an opening prayer and contemplation with the full group, then smaller breakout groups to converse with one another, beginning with some opening questions but open to the Spirit moving.

We invite you to attend one of these sessions - while our responses will eventually make their way to the Vatican in one form or another, the main goal of this Synod is learning how to listen to each other, as a parish. Please come and make your voice heard.

Novena of Grace



Kino Stories: Brothers and Sisters Seeking a Better Life

The St. Joseph's Kino Immersion trip was a transformative week for me. It brought to life the complexity and the tragedy of our immigration policies.

We had the opportunity to meet with a variety of people. Spending time with ranchers, whose property was on the Mexico-US border, and spending time with the US Border Patrol agents, demonstrated the complexity of the situation. Both of these groups referred to the migrants as "illegals." Both groups told us the majority of the migrants crossing the border were part of the drug cartel. They spoke of real issues that impacted them daily.

We, though, were also able to spend time with the courageous migrant people at the border, while they were being cared for at Kino. We saw many families with young children, whose parents said they hoped to find work, to move out of the severe poverty for the sake of their children. The fatigue and despair were visible on the faces of the young parents. A woman spoke of being severely abused by her husband and believed she wasn't safe in Mexico. Multiple young men spoke of their lives threatened by gang members, where they had the option of being killed or joining the gang. These men, like many others, hoped to get to safety and hoped for opportunities in the US.

The people we met weren't "illegals," they weren't criminals or smugglers. They are loving human beings, willing to leave everything they knew for a better life for themselves and their loved ones. They are hopeful, even when the situation appeared hopeless. Title 42 does not allow migrants the opportunity to request asylum or other humanitarian protection.

We entered Mexico among welcome signs. When turning back to the US we saw walls, barbed wire, and a locked border for migrants. As we all know, the US was built on the work and commitment of migrants. I'm very grateful for the work of Kino and I hope to be an advocate for those men and women and children who wait on the other side of our border.
