

Jennifer has been a parishioner at St. Joseph since 1987. She and her husband Gerry Scully were married here in 1988, and raised their son Tadhg in the parish where, for many years, Jennifer taught in the children's faith formation program. Jennifer has also been a member of the Seattle L'Arche community for 39 years, 32 of which she was employed by L'Arche – as an Assistant, Executive Director and later, Director of Formation. Jennifer has been a volunteer singer at the 5:30pm contemplative liturgy since 1992.

JRJI NW, a work of Jesuits West Province, brings Ignatian Retreats and programs to correctional facilities, as well as engaging in education and advocacy for practices that are just, restorative and healing rather than punitive.

About JRJI Northwest: Jesuit Restorative Justice Initiative Northwest (JRJINW) is a pastoral ministry of restorative justice that strives to heal broken relationships with those who are incarcerated and their families as well as victims of crime and their families through prayer, education, and advocacy. JRJINW mobilizes constituencies to advocate for transformation of the justice system to become more restorative than punitive. 



Second Reading

Revelation 1:9-11a, 12-13, 17-19

I, John, your brother, who share with you the distress, the kingdom, and the endurance we have in Jesus, found myself on the island called Patmos because I proclaimed God's word and gave testimony to Jesus. I was caught up in spirit on the Lord's day and heard behind me a voice as loud as a trumpet, which said, "Write on a scroll what you see." Then I turned to see whose voice it was that spoke to me, and when I turned, I saw seven gold lamp-stands and in the midst of the lampstands one like a son of man, wearing an ankle-length robe, with a gold sash around his chest.

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained."

Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples said to him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

Now a week later his disciples were again inside and Thomas was with them. Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

Now, Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

This workshop is the culmination of one year of planning since the parish committed to facilitating anti-racism workshops at the Vigil for Racial Justice last May at St. James Cathedral.
