

Synod Update

The Archdiocese of Seattle has released the final synthesis of archdiocesan-wide Synod listening sessions. 11,000 people participated (including over 100 from St. Joe's) from 127 parishes. This document will be sent to the USCCB, which will then send a report to the Vatican. Tim Hunt from the Archdiocese and Corinna Laughlin from St. James led the synthesis effort, which included dozens of lay volunteers from parishes around the Archdiocese.

You can compare the Archdiocese report with our own parish report (here, on page 12: https://www.stjosephparish.org/files/1131.pdf). Among other issues, the synthesis report includes language such as "Young people are keenly aware of hypocrisy and want a Church of integrity, a Church of service, a Church that advocates for justice and combats climate change in concrete ways. They sometimes struggle to explain why they are Catholic to their friends, especially when they perceive the Church as sidelining women and rejecting the LGBTQ+ community."

"Catholic people of color call upon the Church to address racism more forcefully and to acknowledge the wrongs of the past with sincerity and transparency."

"LGBTQ+ Catholics have experienced rejection. When they do feel acceptance from a particular priest or parish community, they know that might not be the case elsewhere. The parents, family members, and friends of LGBTQ+ people share this pain."




Profession of Faith


I believe in one God, the Father almighty,

All stand upright.






Women's Ministry

Women's Home Mass & Dinner July 19th | 6:15pm On Capitol Hill




The women of St. Joseph are invited to gather with us at a parishioner's home near St. Joseph on the evening of July 19 for Mass and dinner.

Help Sisters in Poland Serve Blind Refugees from Ukraine

Parishioner Maria Van Wollen writes this reflection and request for support of blind children fleeing the invasion of Ukraine:

In 1918, Blessed Mother Elizabeth Rose Czacka founded an order of Catholic nuns caring for blind children in Laski, a small town on the outskirts of Warsaw, Poland. Affected by the blindness herself, Mother Czacka worked tirelessly until her death in 1961 to help the children in her care integrate with broader society. I was born in Poland and my family has supported the Laski center ever since I can remember.

Today, the Society for Care of the Blind continues to be run by the Franciscan nuns, with four centers in Poland and two in Ukraine. Russia's war has displaced the Ukrainian children and their families, many of which have found refuge in Poland.

Taking in the Ukrainian children has overwhelmed the meagre resources of the Polish centers, and the Franciscan Sisters of Laski are in urgent need of financial support. The Polish government only provides limited funding for maintaining the school and paying salaries of the teaching staff. The living costs of the resident children and all other costs (supplies, equipment, clothing) are covered by donations from individuals and charitable institutions. With the arrival of so many refugees, the centers are dealing with an acute shortage of resources.

Your generosity can help the incredible work being done by the Franciscans in Laski to support the Ukrainian families, who are affected not only by blindness, but now also by a savage and unprovoked attack on their homeland.


ACA Update - Thank You!
