Meet the Homilist: Eduardo Peñalver



Eduardo Peñalver is Seattle University's 22nd president. Prior to being named Seattle U President, Peñalver served as the dean of Cornell University's Law School from 2014 until 2021. Peñalver is a Rhodes Scholar and a professor of law who clerked for former U.S. Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens. Peñalver received his bachelor's from Cornell's College of Arts and Sciences in 1994 and his law degree from Yale Law School in 1999. As a Rhodes Scholar, he received his Master of Arts in Philosophy and Theology at Oriel College, Oxford.

In addition to Cornell Law School, Peñalver has held faculty appointments at Fordham Law School and the University of Chicago, where he was the John P. Wilson Professor of Law. He has also been a visiting professor at Harvard and Yale law schools. Peñalver's work on property law has been published in scholarly law journals at Yale University, the University of Michigan, Cornell, and the University of Pennsylvania. He is considered a leading voice in the "progressive property" movement, deriving many of his insights from Catholic social teaching.

His research explores how property law creates or reinforces communal bonds and how property rights mediate the relationship between individuals and communities. His book, Property Outlaws (co-authored with Sonia Katyal), published by Yale University Press in February 2010, explores the vital role of disobedience within the evolution of property law. His book, An Introduction to Property Theory (co-authored with Gregory Alexander), was published by Cambridge University Press in 2011.

Peñalver was raised in Puyallup and is married to Sital Kalantry, an associate professor of law at Seattle University School of Law. The two met as undergraduates at Cornell and have two sons.

A New Pastor for St. Joe's: Welcome, Fr. Chris Cartwright, SJ!

We are thrilled to welcome Fr. Chris Cartwright, SJ, as the new Pastor of St. Joe's, and we look forward to continuing to create community together, led by the Holy Spirit.

About Fr. Chris

Fr. Chris joined the Jesuits in 1970 and has served as a pastor at parishes and college campus ministry centers in Phoenix, San Francisco, Sacramento, Honolulu, and Los Angeles (including a summer in Seattle, studying Philosophy at Seattle U!). Most recently, he was the Assistant Director of the Cardinal Manning House of Prayer for Priests in Los Angeles, a retreat center.



Fr. Chris is excited to be returning to parish ministry at St. Joe's, a special parish in a special city. "Different from Jesuits who have chosen education as their ministry, I was always attracted to pastoral ministry," Fr. Chris explains. "The Jesuits have provided me with many opportunities to work in pastoral settings. I am excited to be returning to a parish. From what I have heard for many years about St. Joe's, I consider myself lucky to be joining you."

Growing up in a family of seven children, the concept of parish-as-family forms the basis of his worldview. "Everyone in a family, like a parish, is so important for the variety of experience," he says. "I love that parish life covers the fullness of life experiences, seeing how people grow and develop.

"A parish is tasked with trying to take seriously the teachings of Christ. The questions are simple: what can I do, and what can we do, as a community? A parish is where we experience individual and communal discerning and working to fulfill the mission.

"I'm not coming with a program or agenda – that's absurd – we'll get acquainted and move forward together in the Spirit. I don't know what things will be like, and I don't worry about that! All I know is if I go, and make friends, and join others in prayer and life, who we will be and how we will serve will be revealed. We'll learn the future together."



Agape Service Trip - A Transformative Experience

Last month, 17 of our 8th and 9th graders went on an immersion trip to Whatcom County to serve migrant farmworkers with the Agape Service Project. The students set up and served a food bank that served approximately 340 families (over 1,000 individuals total), provided pastoral accompaniment to farmworkers and their families, and farmed with Breckenridge Blueberries (a family-owned ethical farm) and Growing Veterans (a veteran-operated farmed designed to serve veterans with PTSD).

The students not only learned the impact of hands-on service through the lens of Catholic social teaching, but also about the importance of putting faith in action by writing several letters to our senators advocating for the dignity and labor rights of farmworkers and their families. They were truly the hands and feet of Christ in the world!
