





God of all living, God of all loving, God of the seedling, the snow and the sun, teach us, deflect us, Christ reconnect us, using us gently, and making us one.






#### ALL ARE INVITED TO COME FORWARD

# St. Vincent de Paul Society: Together, Caring for Our Neighbors

Let us do without hesitation whatever good lies at our hands. — Frédéric Ozanam

The St. Joe's Conference of St. Vincent de Paul is our local chapter of the international aid organization. The pandemic over the past two-and-a-half years brought greater need for helping our neighbors on Capitol Hill and around Seattle cope with economic hardships. Recently, St. Joe's welcomed St. Patrick's parishioners into our community, and with it, their SVdP operations, parish boundaries, and a generous donation from the St. Pat's Jubilee Fund to help provide rent assistance to our newly expanded neighborhood.

St Vincent de Paul volunteers have the unique opportunity to provide a direct response to those who call for assistance. Your donations and continued support are the life blood of this ministry at St Joe's. However, new volunteers are needed to provide the people-power to help distribute the requested essentials to our neighbors. And with church operations beginning to expand into something resembling the "before times," it's more important than ever to support SVdP at St. Joe's and our combined neighborhood.

About St. Vincent de Paul: The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is 175 years old, and has had a presence at St. Joseph Parish since 1927. Run entirely by laypeople, the St. Joe's Conference of St. Vinnie's has volunteer members who help with intake and home visits. Historically, the group has focused on providing financial and material assistance to anyone within the parish boundaries, primarily with rent, utility, and grocery assistance.

A person in need of financial or other material assistance would call SVdP of King County, who would assign a parish conference to work with them, based on geographical proximation. If a call came within from the St. Joe's parish boundaries, a pair of volunteers from St. Vinnie's would head out to visit the caller. "It's more comfortable that way," Dan Tobin, longtime volunteer, explains. "The home visit is what makes us unique."

After the visit, the parish conference would determine what they could share with the neighbor, depending on the need and resources available. Another home visit, and assistance delivered!

Vincentian Dennis West recounts the transformative experience of working with St. Vincent de Paul during the pandemic:

"My volunteer efforts had been curtailed significantly due to work demands, but after being unceremoniously laid off due to economic and pandemic-related pressures facing my job sector, I found myself psychologically in a similar place as some of our Neighbors. Fortunately, the bi-weekly Zoom meeting and the community of Vincentians has been a true medicine of perspective and spiritual solace that has ameliorated my fears about COVID and unemployment.

Every day, we encounter individuals and families significantly affected by the pressures of this economy and pandemic - more than I could have imagined. Fellow parishioners have been exceedingly generous over the past year, but the St. Joseph Conference of Vincentians can't wait until we acknowledge your charity in person while holding a basket at the end of Mass on the first weekend of every month. "

# Learning from History to Promote Healing

In this presentation, Father Michael Carson will explore the history of the last 200 years—tracing where the concept of Native boarding schools originated, and how these institutions were rooted in the sin of racism and have left a path of destruction through Native culture and peoples.

In the second part of the presentation, Father Carson will take what we have learned from

history and develop some working ideas to promote healing and counter the historic trauma of boarding schools. The presentation will focus on the areas that the USCCB is coordinating with the bishops at this time: the work to move beyond apologies to concrete areas of restoration and reconciliation.

From his earliest days he received his spiritual and cultural grounding from his grandfather who was a full blooded member of the Louisiana Choctaw tribe. In Father Carson's current work with the USCCB, he coordinates ministry among the Native Americans throughout the country and serves as a liaison with the Bishop's Subcommittee on Native American Affairs, part of the USCCB Secretariat for Cultural Diversity.

# Becoming Anti-Racist: Filipino History Month

#### "A FULL LIFE FOR EVERY FILIPINO"

"The thief comes only to steal, kill and destroy; I have come that they have life, and have it to the full..." (John 10:10)

"...we make game of the lives and liberties of their inhabitants; we promised civilization and we begrudged it, fearing that the natives aspire to a fuller life..." (Philippine National Hero, José Rizál, from his novel, El Filibusterismo)

One only has to look into the eyes of an elderly fisherman's blank stare. Looking over piles of debris...of suffering...in hopeless resignation...ever watchful over the fate of his starving family; crouched under a narrow makeshift awning, all these from a devastating typhoon. Yet again, another typhoon. When once upon a time, the rain would bring everyone out for the planting season, rice farmers across his seaside hut would anticipate and engage in. These chores would easily turn into humble festivities, he longingly remembers those planting seasons.

In recent years, these yearly monsoons have become deadly; it now brings fear among many who devote their day-to-day existence from the bounties of the earth and the sea. Now, it is a matter of survival. For even if he, his family and the barrio endured an actual storm, it is in the weeks of anxious waiting for relief help that make many of them in their remote village literally starve to death. In fact, a few already have...

This is the reality that has become only too familiar among the poor and vulnerable of the world, the Philippines being one with a population of mostly hardy farmers and fishermen.

For the past three years, the <u>Foundation for Philippine Progress</u> has set its focus and attention upon these hamlets that hardly get immediate relief when calamities fall upon their fragile existence. As in the passage of John, the thief in the form of these natural disasters have come to wreak havoc in their simple lives...

The Foundation's vision of providing education, health and human services, we knew, will be a long journey that can only be driven by a collective spirit of commitment, compassion and perseverance. We have been blest, so far, with bright and ready faces of volunteers and supporters this side of the Pacific. Quite a few have joined the effort lately: organizing fund raising events and education programs; seeking out willing donors and supporters, talking to other organizations, or doing speaking engagements in conferences, churches, or gatherings.

In recent responses these past months, the Foundation has established regional partners through the Foundation's main conduit, the Citizen's Disaster Relief Center (CDRC). The Cordillera Disaster Response and Development Services, Inc. on the ground is one regional partner, attending to the aftermath of the recent earthquake in Northern Philippines. There are still communities which they haven't served yet. The Foundation also just concluded Community-Based Disaster Management Training in Barrio Lisondra, an island barangay in Surigao City in Southern Philippines, which was one of the areas severely hit by Super Typhoon Odette (Rai) in December 2021. This training is under FPP's Livelihood and Recovery Project in the said area.

Our early recovery project team in Leyte, an island province in Central Philippines, has also delivered the first tranche of support (backpacks) to elementary to senior high school students in Barrio Kantagnos, Baybay City, Leyte. In the coming weeks, another team will go to the area for the commodity voucher (school uniforms) distribution. These activities are under our Early Recovery Project in Super Typhoon Agaton (Megi) that hit Leyte in April of this year. Aside from our response activities, CDRC is also busy organizing forums on Sexual & Reproductive Health Rights of Girls and Women in Emergencies.

Responses in the past included providing fishing boats to a village that lost theirs in the storm; setting up a water pump for clean water source and to provide an irrigation system for a remote farm that had water supply problems; sending medical missions amidst the pandemic crisis for remote barrios; responses to the Taal Volcano eruption that denuded fishing villages in its perimeter; vegetable seeds for 4 mountain barangays (Agsaman, Recare, Cagmanaba, and Dorillo) benefitting at least 350 families; a total of 12 swine were distributed to the 4 barangays, an additional income source for the farmer beneficiaries...and the list continues in the three years the Foundation has existed. Indeed, there will be more to attend to in the future, for we know that these calamities will now become the norm for a people who are already poor.

Climate change has been hardest on countries whose mass base depend mainly on agriculture and fishing. The Philippines is situated geographically within the storm belt of the Asian-Pacific Rim in southeast Asia. Infrastructure destruction and economic impacts through loss of livelihood can be debilitating.

As a long-time parishioner at St. Joseph, I've seen how the church has stood to be the Light on the Hill for many in our community facing issues that greatly affect their lives: from race to gender to homelessness, to incarceration and even to the needs of communities outside our community here in Seattle. St. Joseph's Ignatian spirt of empowerment and hope continue to do outreach for the vulnerable.

Through this Love, we draw our strength in facing perhaps the most compelling challenge of humanity: Nature taking its cue from years of constant abuse of its air, its water, and its environment. We come as a parish to provide and to be aware, that we heed to the many who are calling to seek out their share of a full Life.

Finally, we acknowledge that these are economically trying times for many of us. For this helping out to be sustainable in the long run, we simply ask sharing the Foundation's existence for as many as we can. If possible, engage in its programs; learn more about the Philippines, its people, or its rich history...and, perhaps in time, there will be a good number of us. A dollar multiplied in great number, instead of just from a few, can become a substantial amount. For in the Philippines, and in any poor nation, for that matter, no amount is ever small.

In closing, we continue to be blessed, in the Ignatian spirit of Love and Giving...and we thank you all!
