NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

During Native American Heritage Month, the Parish Anti-Racism Committee invites you to join us in self-education and advocacy on behalf of local Indigenous communities. Join us for a Duwamish documentary film event on November 16th (flyer in the bulletin) and Snake River Dam educational advocacy opportunities after certain weekend Masses.

As Pope Francis said during his apology to survivors of Catholicrun Indian Boarding Schools, "Any truly effective process of healing requires concrete actions. In a fraternal spirit, I encourage the Bishops and the Catholic community to continue taking steps towards the transparent search for truth and to foster healing and reconciliation."

Parish Land Acknowledgement

St. Joseph Parish and School sits on the traditional and ancestral land of the Coast Salish and Duwamish People, the original inhabitants of what is now known as Seattle and the Puget Sound area. We pay respect to the people of the Coast Salish and Duwamish, past and present, and honor the land itself which remains sacred to the Coast Salish and Duwamish People.

We acknowledge that these peoples, and many others, were forcefully removed from their land, some abducted & sent to boarding schools, and some murdered, often with the implicit and explicit support of the Catholic Church and the Jesuit Order. We acknowledge these sins and recognize that the consequences of these actions continue to affect these Indigenous communities.

As a Jesuit parish, Ignited by the Eucharist to Love and Serve, we know we cannot be faithful to our mission without changing our relationship to the Indigenous peoples of this land. We are committed to supporting the Indigenous members of our community as we educate ourselves (a largely non-Native parish) on Indigenous histories, cultures, and issues. We pledge to build deeper relationships with the Duwamish, Coast Salish, and other Indigenous stewards of this land and to work to repair the injustices of colonization.

First Reading

It happened that seven brothers with their mother were arrested and tortured with whips and scourges by the king, to force them to eat pork in violation of God's law. At the point of death he said: "You accursed fiend, you are depriving us of this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up to live again forever. It is for his laws that we are dying."

After him the third suffered their cruel sport. He put out his tongue at once when told to do so, and bravely held out his hands, as he spoke these noble words: "It was from Heaven that I received these; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again." Even the king and his attendants marveled at the young man's courage, because he regarded his sufferings as nothing.

Then the second and the third married her, and likewise all the seven died childless. Finally the woman also died. Now at the resurrection whose wife will that woman be? For all seven had been married to her." Jesus said to them, "The children of this age marry and remarry; but those who are deemed worthy to attain to the coming age and to the resurrection of the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. They can no longer die, for they are like angels; and they are the children of God because they are the ones who will rise. That the dead will rise even Moses made known in the passage about the bush, when he called out 'Lord,' the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob; and he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."

and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures.


He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

still abiding, ever guiding us to light. Ref.


We give thanks and rejoice for the gracious lives they led,

for the strength and the wisdom they passed






