The St. Joe's Women's ministry is looking for help with planning events. We would like to offer four events per year for the women of our parish for spiritual renewal, and we need help in a few areas:


We need people who are willing to help **plan and facilitate** women's events. If you want to lead a small group bible study, lead a hike, retreat, or other event, we need you.

Gospel Matthew 2:1-12

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet:

And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel. "

Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage." After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.



I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen








Agape Service Project fosters service, community, and prayer as participants encounter Christ and uphold the dignity of our farmworker brothers and sisters.

Encounter & Kinship

Farmworker Community - relational, direct services include food bank & mobile food distribution, summer enrichment for children, increased access to health & human services

Middle & High School Students - service-learning immersion experiences, put Catholic Social Teaching & prayer into action, empowered to be agents of change

College-Aged Young Adults - servant leadership formation, summer of leading & serving all aspects of program

Highlights

- Always strive to provide culturally-appropriate items served in a bilingual (Spanish-English) setting
- Summer 2022: Served an average of 439 families weekly at our food bank & additional mobile food distribution
- Summer 2022: over 40,500 diapers distributed at 7 weeks of food bank & mobile distribution
- Agape was selected for the Washington State Migrant Education Program 'Health Provider of the Year' award for the 2020-2021 school year.





Who are Farmworkers?

- Approx. 1.5-2 million men, women, & children who plant, pick, & pack our fruits & veggies; work our dairies, nurseries, & feedlots
- 71% are Foreign-born workers; at least 50% are working without legal documentation
- Age of 12: one can be legally hired to work
- For every \$1 you spend on produce, a farmworker only gets 9 cents
- Agriculture is one of the most hazardous occupations in the U.S.
- Skilled laborers whose work is dignified & essential
- Our neighbors who have touched our food, and therefore our lives

Most dramatically of all, farmworkers too often struggle with food insecurity, meaning the workers who feed America too often cannot feed their own families.

SERVICE, COMMUNITY + PRAYER

Groups have the opportunity to encounter others through service, community, & prayer. The week includes:

Prayer + Formation - Daily sessions of prayer, social justice formation, & reflection root our work in Christ and Catholic Social Teaching

Community Building - Engaging activities help strengthen your group & community through the culture of encounter

Agape Food Bank - Groups spend a full day setting up and running a food bank for the farmworker community in Whatcom County

Mobile Food Distribution - Eliminating barriers to food (ex: transportation), groups help distribute food directly to 4 farmworker housing sites

Summer Enrichment for Children of Farmworkers - Create community with children at local farmworker housing sites; provide educational & recreational activities (ex: sports, games, crafts, reading)

Volunteer Farm Work - Groups support local mission-oriented farms; helping farms that are caring for creation & people



LOGISTICS **Program Fees**

\$400 per youth participant (schools/parishes may charge more to cover transportation & additional costs)

The program fee funds: lodging and all meals, t-shirts, programming (formation, reflections, prayer, etc.), service supplies, resources, operations & safety supplies, and the staff who make it possible.

Community Living - We intentionally live simply to enter into a spirit of solidarity.

- We recognize that the communities we serve may not receive the quantity and quality of food that we may be accustomed to, therefore we serve simpler meals to bring us closer to our family in Christ.
- Groups stay at Assumption Catholic Church & School (Bellingham, WA); groups sleep on the floor of classrooms & share in the responsibility of daily chores

Staff - Agape's summer staff are college-aged young adults who are on fire for their faith, passionate about social justice, and excited to work with and empower the youth.
