

Dear Friends,

Last Saturday 54 of our children (from grades 2 through 7) celebrated their First Reconciliation. Some years after their baptism, this is only the second sacrament they have received. It anticipates their third sacrament, 1st Communion; a sacrament we expect they will receive each week for most of the rest of their lives.

These youngsters probably don't know the significance the sacraments and moments of grace that are ahead of them in life or those graced moments that occur each day in and around them. They are so young, how can they?

Friends, it is our sacred duty to help our children (and one another) to grow in understanding and appreciating God's grace and goodness in our lives. Having brought them to the Church for the sacraments and avenues of God's love, we must act and live in ways that make for them a lively, inclusive, welcoming, compassionate and caring church community. 





We praise and thank you for the women and men who have shared the joy of the Gospel here for more than 170 years.


Send your Holy Spirit upon us that we might encounter your Son anew and become more effective partners in sharing the Good News of his saving love.



PARTNERS IN THE GOSPEL

Dear Friends,

Last weekend you heard from Fr. Matthew and Deacon Steve about the *Partners In the Gospel* initiative that has begun in our Archdiocese. Having watched them on our YouTube channel I am very grateful for their careful explanation of the program and how we have our own role to play in this mission for the Church. (I would have been on hand personally but a bit of surgery for a pre-cancer on my nose prevented me. I expect to be back among you in another week.)

Let me be clear: as Fr. Matthew told us last weekend, since we have joined together with St. Patrick Parish it is not expected that we will be asked to include another parish to our community. But let us be generous in our thinking: if we find we believe it would be a good thing to add another parish community to ours, if we find we believe the Spirit of God is leading us to such an action – let us not be afraid.

Fr. Matthew said it well: it is God's church; we are God's people. We have been asked by our Archbishop and the leaders of our archdiocese to take stock and think wisely and generously about our future. Not just our future as St. Joseph Parish, but all the Church here in the west side of Washington. As the Second Vatican Council proposed: we are meant to 'read the signs of the times.' Our leadership has put before us serious issues we have been facing for some years and which must be dealt with carefully as we move into our future. Much is at stake.

I urge you to go to our parish website and there you will find a link to the *Partners In the Gospel* video and information page of the Seattle Archdiocese. Watch the video. In a very Ignatian manner let yourself, your emotions and heart and mind, be stirred and moved. Contemplate the movements in your heart. Wonder at the feelings, positive and negative and worrisome, that arise. Ask yourself: "What does this mean to me?" "What does this mean for us, this Church at this time?" "What does God wish from and for us?"

We will be praying and thinking of these things for many months ahead. Even if our own parish (already joined with St. Pat's) does not create a larger "family" parish, we do need to join all our brothers and sisters in the Seattle Catholic Church walking together in this procession of change and progress. For today, let us start with contemplation – a very Ignatian inspired notion. Works and solutions and actions are for the future. St. Joseph Parish – let us pray! The prayer all the archdiocese is praying is featured in our weekly bulletin.

I look forward to walking and praying forward together with you.
