A Five-Week Small Group Reflection



Join Us for "Reflect and Renew" Lenten Small Groups

Looking for new ways to engage with Scripture and your community this Lent? St. Joe's is hosting a small group reflection series during the first five weeks of Lent as we journey towards Easter. Join us for this brand-new program that will encourage us to reflect on Scripture, dialogue about our faith with others in a safe, structured, small-group setting, and prepare us for encountering Christ.

Each group will consist of 6-8 people, including a trained facilitator, and will meet five times, beginning the week of February 26th. You don't have to worry about forming a small group – just show up and organizers will help put together diverse groups that will stay consistent for the full five weeks.

Faith Justice Committees will also provide supplemental prayers to focus your Lent on Immigration, Climate Justice, or Anti-Racism if you decide.

Groups will meet on Sundays, 12:30pm – 2pm, and on Tuesdays, 7pm – 8:30pm at the Parish Center.




Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18

Do not the pagans do the same? So be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect."



Gracious God, we praise and thank you for the Catholic Church in Western Washington.


We praise and thank you for the women and men who have shared the joy of the Gospel here for more than 170 years.

"Be Mine."


My advice? Say to God: "Yes. I will. I'm yours." Then let yourself imagine how big a smile this will put on God's heart.



Black History Month: African Americans on the Path to Sainthood







As we mark Black History Month, Catholics must come to understand that the Church has a long history of anti-Black racism. From the Doctrine of Discovery issued by Pope Nicholas V in 1452 that sanctioned and promoted the colonization and exploitation of non-Christian people, to Catholic participation in slavery, to Catholic-run Indigenous boarding schools, to not standing in solidarity with African Americans today, this is our history, and we must acknowledge it.

To commemorate Black History Month, the Anti-Racism Committee at St. Joe's is highlighting six African American women and men whose causes for sainthood are currently advancing: Venerable Pierre Toussaint, Servant of God Mother Mary Lange, Venerable Henriette Delille, Venerable Augustus Tolton, Servant of God Julia Greeley, and Sister Thea Bowman. (This is the second article in the series.) Let us acknowledge and celebrate these African Americans who have helped build our Catholic Church. To date, there are no American-born African American saints.

Servant of God Julia Greeley

After dark so as not to embarrass families, Servant of God Julia Greeley pulled a red wagon full of food and clothing that she distributed through the streets of Denver, Colorado. Born into slavery in Missouri in 1840, her right eye was destroyed when she was five by a whip from a slave driver. She later moved to Denver where she developed a devotion to the Sacred Heart and the Eucharist, and joined the secular Franciscans. With her earnings from her labor for wealthy families, Julia began her ministry of distributing food, clothing, and other necessities to poor families. She is known as the Angel of Charity.

Venerable Augustus Tolton

Born into slavery in 1854 in Missouri, Venerable Augustus Tolton became the first Black Catholic priest in the United States. After being freed, Tolton's family moved to Illinois. He wanted to become a priest, but because he was Black, he was rejected by every American seminary to which he applied. Supported by Fr. Peter McGirr, Tolton eventually studied in Rome and was ordained there at the age of 31. He continually met rejection by Catholics because of his race until he developed St. Monica's Catholic Church in Chicago for Blacks, which seated 850 parishioners.

Servant of God Sister Thea Bowman

"Black Sacred Song is Soulful Song," proclaimed Servant of God Sister Thea Bowman. Born in 1937 in Mississippi, Thea Bowman received the consent of her Methodist parents to convert to Catholicism. Despite their objections, she joined the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration at age 15. After many years of teaching she was instrumental in the 1987 publication of the first Catholic hymnal directed to the Black Community. She challenged her Church to accept her as "fully Black and fully Catholic."








St. Joseph's Women's Ministry Lenten Morning of Reflection
