A Note From Fr. Chris



GIVE SOMETHING UP FOR LENT † MAKE ROOM FOR GOD †

Dear Friends,

For many of us early in life we are schooled in the practice of "giving-up" something for Lent. It is such a pervasive notion in our culture that even non-Catholics will speak of it and might even ask: "What are you giving up for Lent?"

Fasting, abstaining and almsgiving as Lenten practices are about giving something up (or away). They are fundamental practices of Lent that come to us from long-time observances of Jewish law. Jesus speaks of them and urges them as meaningful when done with the right attitude. (Mt 6:1-6, 16-18)

Why give something up? Why sacrifice and deny oneself eating or drinking or doing something one likes doing?

In terms of a spiritual practice, doing such things is making space. In fasting, for instance, one eats less and allows oneself to become hungry; allows oneself to learn from the emptiness of the stomach. Not always feeling full and satisfied one leans into the idea that the body is more than food, hunger is more than want, room is needed in one's soul for God. It is good to be hungry for the Holy One.

The same principles apply to abstaining. One stops eating or drinking a favorite food or liquid so one can experience want, i.e. the want of something else besides my usual pleasures and fulfillments. Want for God has a chance to assert itself in my heart when I'm not always fulfilling my taste for certain foods and drink.

Almsgiving is the most simple. Give away some treasure and make room in your wallet, the wallet/treasure chest of your heart, in order to make room for God. When I always live with the security of a full wallet I can forget there are others not so kindly blessed. I am even in danger of thinking I have to protect my treasure from others; I am in danger of making of my treasure a 'god' I must keep and hoard.

Jewish practice and Jesus' teaching set a different standard for us to try: fast, abstain, give. In our short-hand way of talking about this we say: "What are you giving up for Lent?" Don't be fooled; we are not giving something up. We are, rather, making room for God.

Have a blessed Lent!




First Reading


Genesis 2:7-9, 3:1-7

The LORD God formed man out of the clay of the ground and blew into his nostrils the breath of life, and so man became a living being.

Then the LORD God planted a garden in Eden, in the east, and placed there the man whom he had formed. Out of the ground the LORD God made various trees grow that were delightful to look at and good for food, with the tree of life in the middle of the garden and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

Now the serpent was the most cunning of all the animals that the LORD God had made. The serpent asked the woman, "Did God really tell you not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?" The woman answered the serpent: "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; it is only about the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden that God said, 'You shall not eat it or even touch it, lest you die.'" But the serpent said to the woman: "You certainly will not die! No, God knows well that the moment you eat of it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods who know what is good and what is evil." The woman saw that the tree was good for food, pleasing to the eyes, and desirable for gaining wisdom. So she took some of its fruit and ate it; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they realized that they were naked; so they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.








ALL ARE INVITED TO COME FORWARD





Join Us for "Reflect and Renew" Lenten Small Groups

Looking for new ways to engage with Scripture and your community this Lent? St. Joe's is hosting a small group reflection series during the first five weeks of Lent as we journey towards Easter. 



Tree of Hope for Sister Parish Scholarships

Similar to a Little Free Food Pantry, the Community Fridge is a "take what you need, leave what you can" model of mutual aid. Anyone can leave fresh groceries, sandwiches, soups, dairy, bread, and anyone can take what they need! This is a concrete way of caring for our neighbors and strengthening community. Liturgy Column: Bringing the Embodied Arts to Liturgy

Betsey Beckman holds a Master's in Ministry from Seattle University and is nationally and internationally renowned for her gifts of dance and prayer, most recently through her ongoing work with the online global community, Abbey of the Arts. For nearly 30 years, Betsey worked with youth and adults as director of Liturgical Movement at St. Patrick Church. As a new parishioner of St. Joe's, Betsey brings a wealth of experience, and has already begun sharing her gifts of gesture, dance, and drama in the context of our Masses and retreats. Since a focus on Liturgical Movement is relatively new for our community, we asked Betsey to reflect on the gifts of Embodied Prayer as we are invited to open our minds and hearts to holistic ways of praying as the Body of Christ.

Reflections from Betsey

As Catholics, we have such a rich tradition of embodied prayer! Going back to the Hebrew Scriptures, we read that King David danced before the Lord and Miriam raised her tambourine in ecstatic dancing praise; and in the Psalms, we hear that the Israelites bent low in humility and let their hands rise like incense in the evening offering. In the New Testament, we hear Jesus telling stories of how the family danced with exuberance at the Prodigal son's return, and we see the people waving palms in celebration at Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem. We also hear Christ's own words – and actions – of offering his very body to us as a gift of radical presence in Eucharist and in the ultimate offering of self on Calvary.

Even throughout the centuries of our church, there have been many cultural expressions of artistry, dance, and embodiment in the history of our Catholic liturgy. Our embodied prayers include the Sign of the Cross; the blessing of forehead, lips, and heart; sitting, standing, and kneeling in worship; our processions and beautiful sacramental actions with incense, oil, and water. In various cultures across the globe, we can witness the Catholic Mass including such expressions as Africans dancing with drums to express praise, Hawaiians lifting their gestures in hula at Mass, and Mexicans offering indigenous dances to honor Our Lady of Guadalupe (as they do at the Feast of Madre de las Americas each December at St. James Cathedral.)

In this series of three short articles, I'd like to reflect on the history of movement in our traditions here at St. Joe's and at St. Pat's over the past 30 years and consider how we might explore ways to pray vibrantly and creatively in the months and years to come.

I'm delighted to be here at St. Joe's, and I see my ministry as two-fold. On the one hand, for the past 20 years during Lent (and occasionally in Advent) I've been invited to St. Joes as a guest artist to proclaim the Gospel through story-dance. As a soloist, with my own body-prayer I am honored to bring the scripture to life and offer this prayer on behalf of everyone (just as King David danced before the Lord, and all were stirred as they witnessed his offering). Secondly, I have a calling to work with children, youth, and adults, to engage them in creatively entering liturgy so that they too can come to know scripture and song text from the inside out. Children have an amazing enthusiasm for life that can be channeled with prayer and artistry in our liturgy. (You may have witnessed the group of kids I directed at the 4pm Mass on Christmas Eve. What a joy!)

I look forward to sharing more about this with you. Stay tuned for more reflections on our embodied journey together!
