

A Note From Fr. Chris



After Communion

The words of Jesus echo in our minds and hearts: "Take and eat... take and drink." "Do this in memory of me."

The altar is a table and our gathering a meal. It is a family meal so there is greeting and singing. Stories are told followed by reflection on our lives: how we should live, how we should love, to Whom we belong. All this comes to a climax – the Communion.

Do you give much thought to the idea that when you have come forward and received Communion that you have just then received Jesus Christ into your own body?

It is easy to be distracted; one has to navigate the turns and the walk back to one's pew. There is singing to be done with the rest of the congregation. Soon one's mind may have lost the moment, 'I just received lesus Christ.'

A suggestion: when the song is finished, sit or kneel and go back to the thought: 'I just received God's life into mine.'

Think that thought and then think this: Jesus Christ is in all the people sitting before and beside and behind me! Jesus is not in the tabernacle or on the altar now – Jesus is body and blood in the people all around me, just as in me!

Sit and enjoy the thought that God loves you so much that God wants to be inside you, to dwell in you, in all of us! This is a holy moment and it would be great if one could hold on to this thought for hours or even days afterward.

It's okay to sit after the song ends. While the choir receives and the utensils of Mass and remaining Hosts are gathered and put away, sit back if you like and give your heart and mind to the holy thought: God dwells in me, in us, all of us.



The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water.

John 4:5-15, 19b-26, 391, 40-42

"I can see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain; but you people say that the place to worship is in Jerusalem." Jesus said to her, "Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You people worship what you do not understand; we worship what we understand, because salvation is from the Jews. Liturgy Column: Bringing the Embodied Arts to Liturgy (Part 3)

Betsey Beckman holds a Master's in Ministry from Seattle University and is nationally and internationally renowned for her gifts of dance and prayer, most recently through her ongoing work with the online global community, Abbey of the Arts. For nearly 30 years, Betsey worked with youth and adults as director of Liturgical Movement at St. Patrick Church. As a new parishioner of St. Joe's, Betsey brings a wealth of experience, and has already begun sharing her gifts of gesture, dance, and drama in the context of our Masses and retreats. Since a focus on Liturgical Movement is relatively new for our community, we asked Betsey to reflect on the gifts of Embodied Prayer as we are invited to open our minds and hearts to holistic ways of praying as the Body of Christ.

Reflections from Betsey: Ignatian Prayer

There are many ways to pray. One way to pray is to become still and quiet so that we can allow the flurry of activity to soften and we can hear the still small voice within, inviting us, surprising us, guiding us. This is a welcome centering in God.

When we come together as community for Eucharist, we are invited not only to interior prayer, but also to actively celebrate our faith with one another in song, gesture, word, deed, color, and scents. We express our faith within a beautiful ancient tradition of procession, proclamation, incense, candles, genuflection, bows, Alleluias, greetings of peace, and receiving the Body of Christ to become our own flesh. We as Catholics have a rich history of sacramentality. But the forms themselves can be rote and dry unless they are embraced with our own intentional engagement. It is in this realm that I have experienced an invitation from Spirit to embrace and enliven the traditions we love so much – our liturgical rhythms, flow, and embodiment.

As we creatively engage liturgy, some of our choices are influenced by the culture around us. At St. Patrick, we have been greatly enriched by the culture of our Deaf community which lifts up the gift of sign language as dynamic expression. When the worshipping community at large learns some of the responsive prayers in American Sign Language, we pray twice - once with our words, and once with our bodies. We engage our whole beings in full, active, conscious participation. We also reach out to our deaf sisters and brothers to say – we are in solidarity with you.

Last week I wrote about embodying scripture as a way of praying in the Ignatian tradition. Here at St. Joe's, we have also begun sharing American Sign Language with some of the children and youth, and it is utterly delightful to see how enthusiastically the kids engage their whole selves in this embodied prayer. I have discovered that when children are invited to full expression while young, they often feel a growing permission through the years to continue to embody and express their faith in joyous (not just mandatory) ways.

There are different styles of liturgy, liturgical art, and liturgical music that are all welcome under our one umbrella of Catholic Church. St. Pat's brings a dynamic and playful style of gesture, movement, drums, streamers, processions, drama, and sign language as we arrive here at St. Joe's. We have discovered that these varied expressions engage folks with many different learning styles, such as kinesthetic learners and L'Arche community members. We are excited to share some of our gifts of movement with our new community, and we know that this expression may not be comfortable for all. We hope to offer thoughtful pieces that honor St. Joe's liturgical culture and also help us to continue to encounter God and one another in dynamic embodied ways.

Thanks for reflecting with me on bringing embodied arts to liturgy in this small series. Some events to look forward to include: Palm Sunday Passion Journey with our young folks, Easter Vigil gesture prayer and dramatic embodiment of Genesis, Easter Sunday American Sign Language by the children, and a 2-part workshop on embodied prayer with Mary Magdalene in the Easter season. I look forward to discovering how the Spirit is stirring us to live our call to become the Body of Christ together!

St. Joe's Asylum Accompaniment Team



Did you know? St. Joe's is sponsoring an asylum-seeker from Nicaragua! Alvaro Vargas arrived in El Paso, Texas, in December of 2022, with nothing but the clothes on his back, after walking from Nicaragua, through Mexico, to the border of the United States. Joe Cotton, Director of Pastoral Care and Outreach at the Archdiocese, has known Alvaro since he was 13 years old and a participant of NPH, and got him on a flight to Seattle and a place to stay.

Since then, a group of St. Joe's parishioners has formed a Welcome Circle for Alvaro, supporting him with basic necessities like clothing and transportation, as well as helping him find an attorney and healthcare. Leading this team are parishioners who have experience with the immigration system: Chris McNabb, Gretchen Brennan, and Dave Zablotny. Anyone is welcome to join the team! Just email Mark at markp@stjosephparish.org if you'd like to help.

Alvaro is fleeing violence in his home country and a complete lack of economic opportunities, but he is still trying to support his wife and four children in Nicaragua. He is unable to work right now due to his immigration status, so we are hoping to raise enough funds over the next few months to rent his own personal living space, as well as pay for his attorney fees, which can be upwards of \$10,000.
