### **PRESENTATION**

If we live in this world challenged by a reality of pandemic, wars and natural disasters, among other difficulties at the local level, to inform the protagonists of solidarity with life, human development, peace and dignity, the following concerns jump out:

How has this affected us in terms of support for young students? What difficulties and achievements have been had in 2022? And in this regard, what do we propose for this year 2023?

With the Russia-Ukraine conflict, there has been a rise in the cost of living, coupled with the country's recession law, has motivated the emigration of more young people and adolescents, in order to protect themselves and help the deteriorated economy of their family. Consequently, young people are at stake to decide between studying or emigrating.

The trend is to decrease the number of students applying for support and one of the beneficiaries immigrated to the United States and intends to continue his studies online, as well as give back what he received to help another young person in need.

Among the achievements we had are: the graduation of five new professionals, the approval of subjects of the majority of the beneficiaries, the students of the pre-university course, and the eighteen former beneficiaries who returned tobenefit receive ID.

In this way, towards the 34 years of solidarity with St. Joseph Seattle Parish and the 22 years of making possible together this opportunity to study to have more possibilities of employment in our country, it is still necessary because it is an alternative window to the development of our communities.

### **INFORMATIVE SYNTHESIS**

## In the accompaniment

- 1. We held six meetings of the DHP committee for the selection, monitoring and evaluation of beneficiary students. These meetings were once again face-to-face in the communities with beneficiaries: Arcatao, Sicahuites, Carasque, Huizucár, Nueva Trinidad and Arcatao.
- 2. Visits of the promoter in the houses of beneficiary students for three days a week to know their situation, solve the logistics, maintenance of the houses and necessary advice.
- 3. We made twelve extended meetings with beneficiary students from January to December 2022, with the agenda: Greeting and welcome, prayer, training theme: mental health of bio dance, how to bring good nutrition, use of renewable energy, emotion annex, crafts, my place in the world.

- 4. An important part of accompanying each student is their academic performance and decisions during the year. Of the 21 students benefited, six left, four of them to finish their studies and one to take advantage of a safe opportunity to emigrate and continue their studies online.
  - 5. The performance of the service to the community on behalf of each beneficiary is monitored and thus served in: schools, community directives, pastoral and church areas, soccer fields, drinking water projects and health units.
  - 6. It motivates, facilitates and accompanies the students of the last year of baccalaureate the Pre-University Course from March to October. 7 students participated Arcatao and Nueva trinidad, and reinforced knowledge of: Mathematics, Physics, Psychology, Motivation, Methods and strategy of study and learning, techniques of oral and written expression, Social, on professional vocation, Language, The art of serving and Sciences.
    - 7. When the student graduates or finishes the studies of his career, he may or may not request a house benefit or loan and we will attend him as he decides. If you leave, we monitor your process andencourage you to persevere until you graduate. Some do theses and others do other work to graduate.

At the time of his graduation we rejoice with his family and feel his desire to find a job in his professional field.

Some ask for the statement of accounts to know how much was invested in them and how much they will return when they work, as agreed. Thegraduation of five other new professionals thanks to the solidarity of brothers and friends beyond our homeland borders: Cristian Daniel, María Eugenia, José Amadeo, Reina Isabel and Aylin Adali.
