

Refrain: The seed that falls on good ground will become the bread of life.

Brothers and sisters: I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us. For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God. We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves as we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

Gospel Acclamation

The seed is the word of God, Christ the sower. All who come to him will have life forever.

Gospel Matthew 13:1-23

On that day, Jesus went out of the house and sat down by the sea. Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat down, and the whole crowd stood along the shore. And he spoke to them at length in parables, saying: "A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seed fell on the path, and birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky ground, where it had little soil. It sprang up at once because the soil was not deep, and when the sun rose it was scorched, and it withered for lack of roots. Some seed fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it. But some seed fell on rich soil, and produced fruit, a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold. Whoever has ears ought to hear."

The disciples approached him and said, "Why do you speak to them in parables?" He said to them in reply, "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted. To anyone who has, more will be given and he will grow rich; from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away. This is why I speak to them in parables, because they look but do not see, and hear but do not listen or understand. Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled in them, which says:

You shall indeed hear but not understand,
you shall indeed look but never see.
Gross is the heart of this people,
they will hardly hear with their ears,
they have closed their eyes,
lest they see with their eyes
and hear with their ears
and understand with their hearts and be converted,
and I heal them.

"But blessed are your eyes, because they see, and your ears, because they hear. Amen, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it.

"Hear then the parable of the sower. The seed sown on the path is the one who hears the word of the kingdom without understanding it, and the evil one comes and steals away what was sown in his heart. The seed sown on rocky ground is the one who hears the word and receives it at once with joy. But he has no root and lasts only for a time. When some tribulation or persecution comes because of the word, he immediately falls away. The seed sown among thorns is the one who hears the word, but then worldly anxiety and the lure of riches choke the word and it bears no fruit. But the seed sown on rich soil is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold."

and his kingdom will have no end.


I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified,





Filled with gifts and filled with goodness, Spirit breathing life into all who seek to find their purpose: we belong to you. Ref.


When we share the bread you've broken with the many and the few, we are blessed and we are broken; we belong to you. *Ref.*



ANTI-RACISM COMMITTEE

WHAT WE DO

We raise awareness about Indigenous histories and advocacy—during Native American Heritage Month (November) we showed a documentary about tribal recognition, gathered signatures for the removal of the Snake River dams, and shared the new Parish Land Acknowledgment.

We lift up stories of Black Catholic leaders like Sr. Thea Bowman, FSPA—we hosted a gathering to watch videos and learn about Sr. Thea Bowman, who challenged her church to accept her as "fully black and fully Catholic." She is currently a Servant of God (a candidate for sainthood). In addition, we have facilitated book groups and JustFaith modules, set up the Say Their Names project, as well as marched in Black Lives Matter demonstrations.

We facilitate open discussions about parish culture, art, iconography, and representation in the church building — last year, we organized an Anti-Bias Training for parish staff and volunteers, focusing on what it means to be an inclusive place. We plan on continuing these conversations, along with other topics, during Allyship Trainings later this year that will be open to the parish. This year, we engaged in conversation with Fr. Matthew about how to contextualize some of the icons and artworks in the church, and also about ways to bring greater diversity and representation.

We engage in regular discernment about areas of focus — the decision to focus on one project at a time is the result of a thoughtful conversation about how best to maintain focus and direct our energy.
