
Seek not the food that will pass away; set your hearts on the food that endures. Come, learn the true and the living Way, that the fullness of life may be yours. Ref.

St. Joe's parishioner Jim Thomas accompanied Archbishops Paul Etienne and John Wester (Santa Fe) on their Pilgrimage of Peace to Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Japan, for August's commemoration of the atomic bombings. On Thursday, October 26, at 7:00 pm, Jim will give a presentation on this grace-filled journey.

About Jim Thomas: Jim has more than forty years experience on nuclear weapons issues including a walking pilgrimage to Bethlehem (1982-1983) and uncovering the secrets of the Hanford plutonium factory. While at Gonzaga University, his master's thesis examined the morality of nuclear deterrence. He is the author of the forthcoming memoir Atomic Pilgrim: How a 6700-mile Walk Helped Me Find Peace and Uncover Long-Held Secrets about Nuclear Weapons Production.

Through Caring for Creation in a Changing Climate

In this four-week series, DR. JUDITH MAYOTTE guides participants into a deeper exploration of the themes that spring forth from *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis' encyclical on right relationship with all that God has created.

- **Week 1** In the Great Commandment and the story of the Good Samaritan, we reflect on the nature of Neighbor-Love and caring for creation.
- Week 2 Many must "pick up their life and take it with them" in a vast migration as human lifestyles tilt Earth beyond its capacity to sustain life for all.
- Week 3 "Hear the cry of the Earth and the cry of the Poor." As architects of our lifestyles and the economic systems that support our lifestyles, how can we enable an economy based on Earth's ecological capacity?
- Week 4 Radical change is needed in the way we live on our Earth home. We *can* write a new story of our relation with nature so the Earth, humans and other-than-humans can flourish together sustainably and peacefully.



**ABOUT THE PRESENTER** DR. JUDITH MAYOTTE is a humanitarian, author and spokesperson for refugees worldwide, particularly those displaced by climate change. She is the recipient of a MacArthur Foundation Grant, served in the Clinton Administration, and chaired the Women's Refugee Commission.

# CHILDREN'S FAITH FORMATION

## **Primary School Faith Formation Classes**

**Sunday School CFF classes for grades 1-6** have open registration now through late September! Classes begin mid-October and run through May, for three Sundays each month. Sign up today!

CFF 1 The first year of the Sacramental Preparation for First Reconciliation and First Communion. Children are usually in 1st grade or at a minimum, age 6. CFF 1 introduces students to scripture, prayer, Reconciliation, and Eucharist. Successful completion of CFF 1 is a requirement for CFF 2.

CFF 2 The second year of the Sacramental Preparation for First Reconciliation and First Communion. This year continues to build upon the foundation set in CFF 1. In addition to classes meeting three Sundays a month, children and parents will work through at home materials and attend workshops to prepare for Reconciliation and First Communion.

CFF 3 / 4 This class combines grades 3 and 4. Students will discuss God as Trinity, Community, Church, Sacraments, Morality, Liturgical Year, and continue to develop a relationship with God through Jesus.

CFF 5 / 6 This class combines grades 5 and 6. Students will continue to develop themselves as Catholics and reflect on the how Scripture pertains to each of us today. Discussion will focus on themes from Breakthrough! The Bible for Young Catholics. Students will dedicate one year to the Old Testament and one year to the New Testament.


