Dear Friends,

I had a great weekend 'hanging out with the guys!'

No, it wasn't about sports or women or cars or the economy, politics, best restaurants, best brands of scotch or bourbon. I was with a great group of guys on the Men's Retreat.

When it comes to church, one will find that women generally outnumber and outpace the men. More women attend Mass, join and lead clubs and groups, volunteer in greater numbers, can be counted on come to the aid of just about any need they hear of. And yet...

I was so very inspired by the men with whom I spent last weekend. Let me tell you – our parish men are quite deep, spiritual, let me even say: holy! They pray and meditate; read inspirational texts, poetry. Some belong to prayer and/or bible study groups. More than a few of them have very tender hearts (tears were often a part of our time together). They open their personal stories, wounds, struggles-and-all to one another so that we might take courage from their courage, wisdom from their journey.

To you unlucky men who missed this opportunity, make plans to watch next fall for the announcement of the date and make a reservation. It will do you good, because it is good, 'hanging with the guys!'.

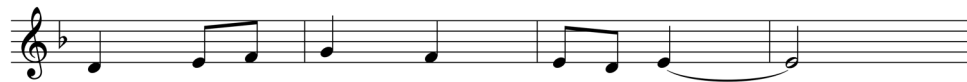

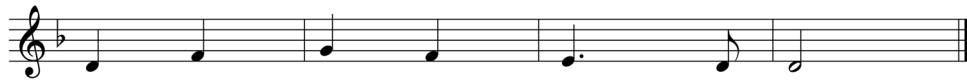

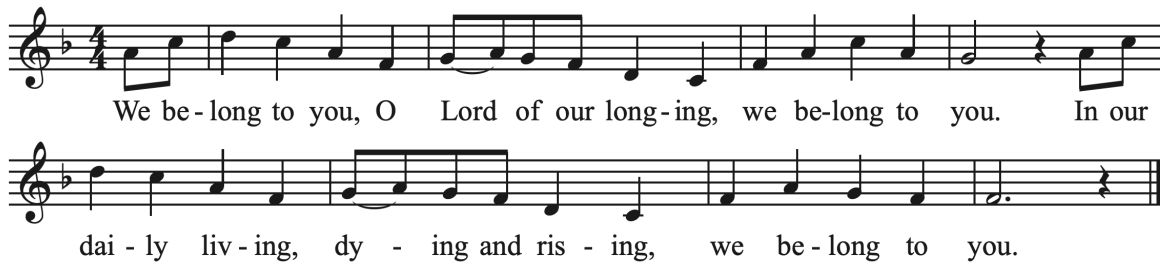

PARISH STEWARDSHIP

November is Stewardship Month! To prepare, this weekend we are hearing from Erin Smith, Pastoral Assistant for Administration, about the financial state of the parish. If you are a registered parishioner, you'll be receiving the 2022-2023 State of the Parish booklet in the mail soon. You can find St. Joe's financial information (also in the booklet) on the next page.

Here's a snapshot of our most recent Mass collection/donation information:

September: Budgeted - \$92,000 / Actual - \$95,944

Year-to-Date (July to September): Budgeted - \$273,000 / Actual - \$300,101

Our collections of the month of September reflect a positive trend, exceeding the budget by \$4,000. On a year-to-date basis, collections are \$27,000 higher than budgeted. Let's keep up the momentum! ~

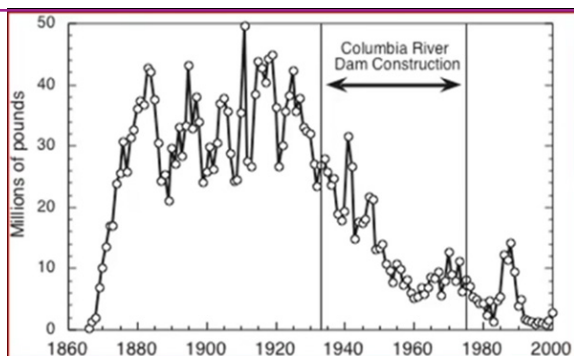

Dance for Peace

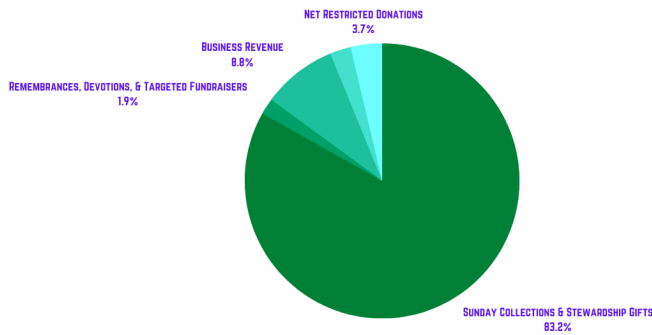

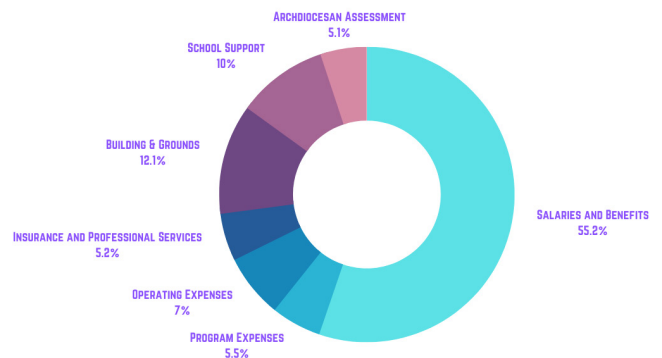

On Thursday, October 26, at 7:00 pm, Jim will give a presentation on this grace-filled journey.

About Jim Thomas: Jim has more than forty years experience on nuclear weapons issues including a walking pilgrimage to Bethlehem (1982-1983) and uncovering the secrets of the Hanford plutonium factory. While at Gonzaga University, his master's thesis examined the morality of nuclear deterrence. He is the author of the forthcoming memoir *Atomic Pilgrim: How a 6700-mile Walk Helped Me Find Peace and Uncover Long-Held Secrets about Nuclear Weapons Production*.

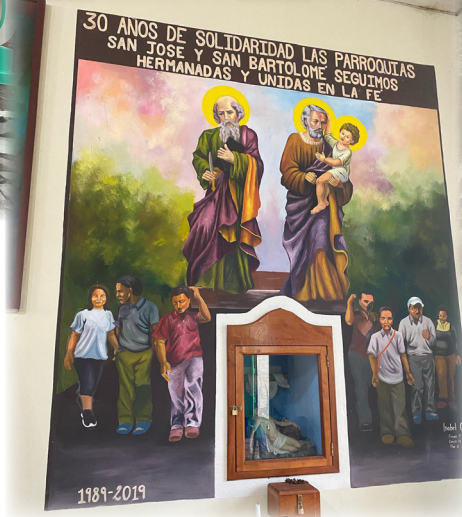

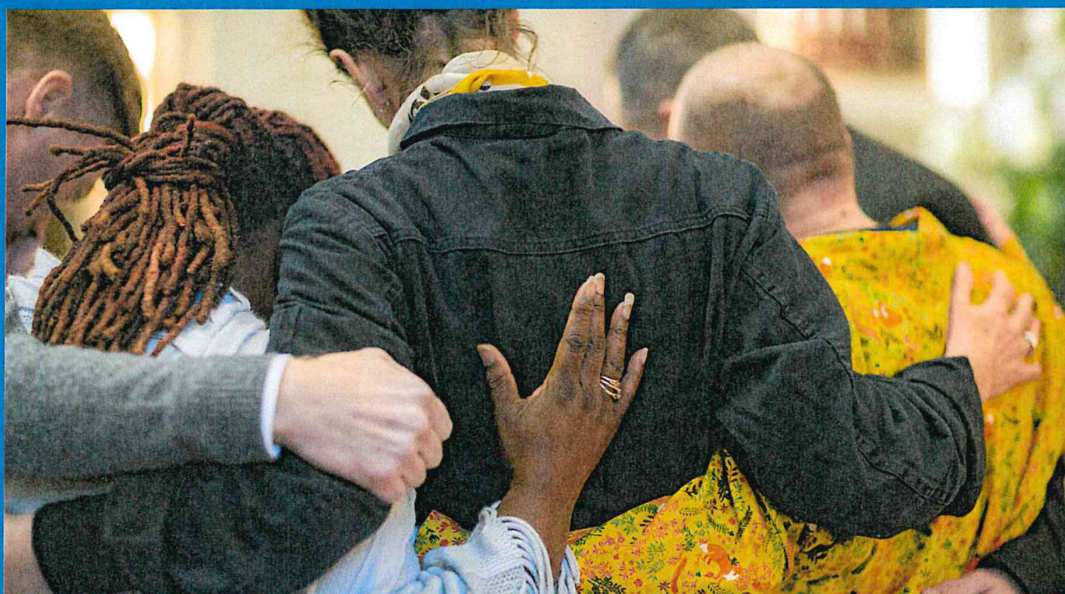

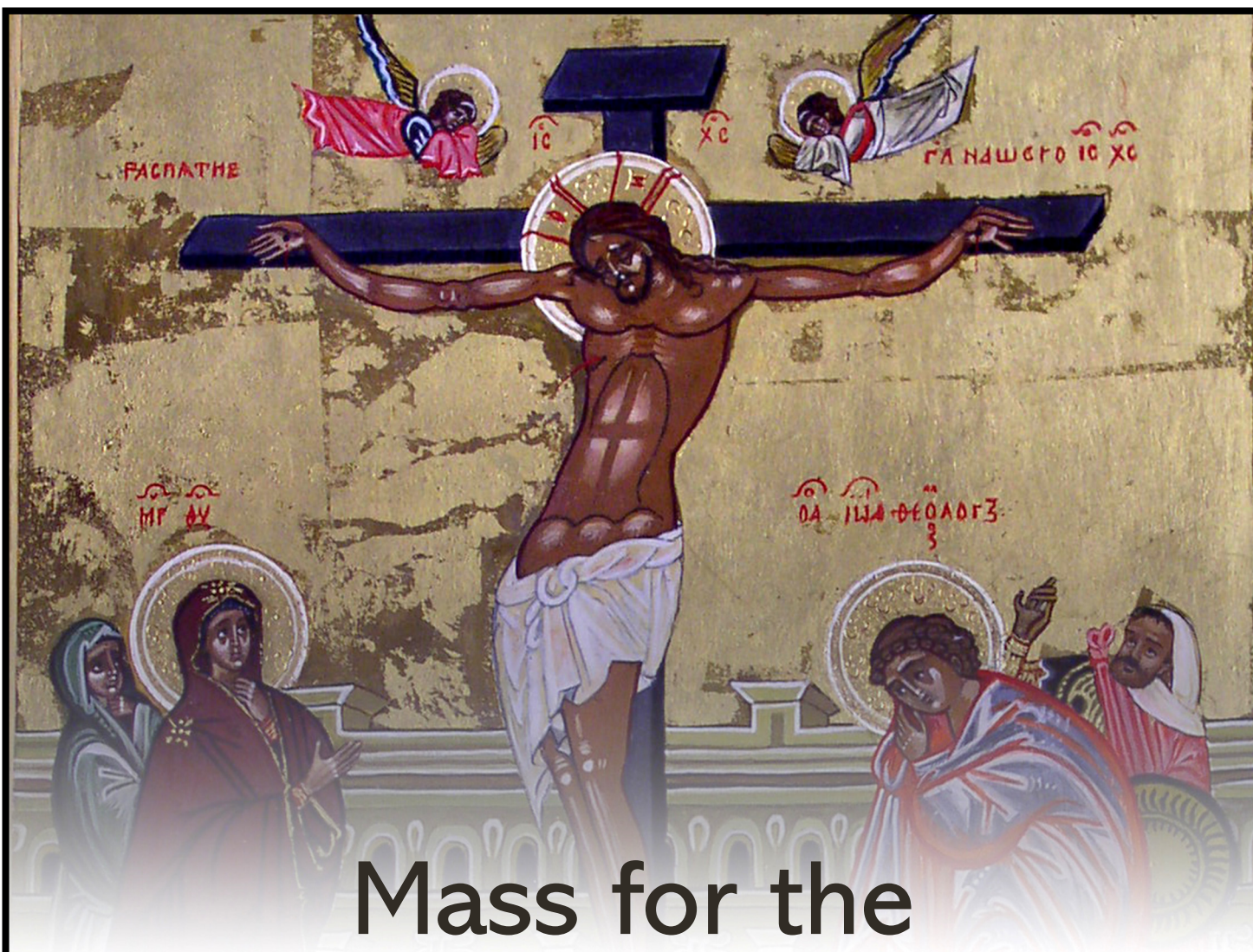
