## Loving God and Having God: A Note from Fr. Chris



Dear Friends,

Jesus answers a question by drawing from the earliest scriptures of Judaism: "Love God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind." [Deuteronomy 6:5] Then he adds: "Love your neighbor as yourself." [Lev 19:18]

Having God is easier than loving God.

To love God you have to think about it. You have to question yourself about how you will do it; where and how will you work it into your life, your daily activities. You have to question yourself: "How am I doing?" with loving.

Most of us see pretty quickly that we don't love so well. We are not all that much generous with our love. We tend to be careful, holding back, self-protecting. Worse, we notice we tend to a bit of narcissism, to loving our own self over-much.

Loving others turns out to be a bit of work! It can be demanding! Loving God? Is that even possible?

St. James reminds us that our love for God is shown in loving acts towards others. [James 2:14-17] St. John writes to us that we love God – who first loved us! [1 Jn 4:19]

Having God's love is not so hard. God first and **still loves us!** Loving God? Let's put the question another way: Since God loves me – *what am I going to do about it!*

I have God because God chooses me; loving God is going to have to be a choice I make!

# PARISH STEWARDSHIP

November is Stewardship Month! If you are a registered parishioner, you'll be receiving the 2022-2023 State of the Parish booklet in the mail soon.

## A Report from Rome by Parishioner Vince Herberholt – The Synod Continues!

Last Friday, October 20<sup>th</sup>, I returned from Rome after praying and witnessing for five days with a [Discerning Deacons](#) group from the US at the Sixteenth General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops. There were nineteen of us (seventeen women and two men) from all over the country, including five from Seattle: Tom and Rose Hesselbrock from St. Therese, Anna Robertson and myself from St. Joe's, and Sarah Pericich-Lopez from the Intercommunity Peace and Justice Center. Discerning Deacons engages Catholics in the active discernment of our Church about women and the diaconate.

The first thing I want to tell you about my experience is that the synodal process is working! I am excited and hopeful for how it will help to renew the Church. The delegates are meeting in small language groups, which include bishops and lay people together at the same tables with equal votes, to discern the questions presented in the [Instrumentum Laboris](#), including both broad questions about communion, mission, and participation, as well as specific questions on themes such as women's participation and possible ordination to the diaconate, LGBTQ+ engagement, lay and ordained collaboration, and care for our common home.

While I am sure that we all have desires and expectations about these issues, I've walked away with a deepened appreciation for the process of listening to the Holy Spirit and discerning a way forward for the Church. The delegates are working hard through the day and into the evening with time off for lunch and dinner. During this final week of the four-week process, they are starting to summarize their discussions that will eventually be included in a synthesis report for the first assembly, scheduled to be released by the time you are reading this, on Saturday, October 30! Synod delegates will be meeting again next year in October, and in the meantime we will all have the opportunity to engage with the fruits of this October's meeting.

As far as our witness on behalf of Discerning Deacons the highlights include:

- Accompanying and teaching synodal practices to a delegation of students from Fordham University in Rome for a week as a part of a class on synodality.
- Showing up in our Discerning Deacons t-shirts at the Papal Audience on Wednesday – see the middle photo above. We were inspired by the energy of Pope Francis, his [reflection](#), and the prayers and responses made in different languages, most of which were made by women. This was certainly a change from when I've attended in the past and responses were made by clerics in full liturgical regalia.
- Co-Hosting with the CEAMA (the Ecclesial Conference of the Amazon) a Symposium on a Synodal Diaconate for synod delegates and invited guests. This was held at the Jesuit Curia near the Vatican. Featured speakers included:
  - Dr. Serena Noceti, an Italian theologian, presenting on the foundational issues for restoring women's ordination to the permanent diaconate.
  - Sr. Elizabeth Young (Australia) and Sr. Laura Vicuña Pereira Manso (Brazil) on their bishop authorized ministries to communities on the margins – truly a diaconal ministry.
- Meeting with the president and staff of the [World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations](#) (WUCWO) that is doing great work in supporting Catholic women around the world, including by documenting their participation in the Synod and documenting the experience of immigrant women.
- Forming a community of protagonists (our US DD delegation) committed to engaging Catholics in the synod process and in the active discernment of our Church about women and the diaconate.

**We hope to have a presentation at St. Joe's when our full Seattle group returns from Rome.** Look for information in the bulletin of the electronic newsletter. Blessings, Vince Herberholt – St. Joe's Pastoral and Mission Council.

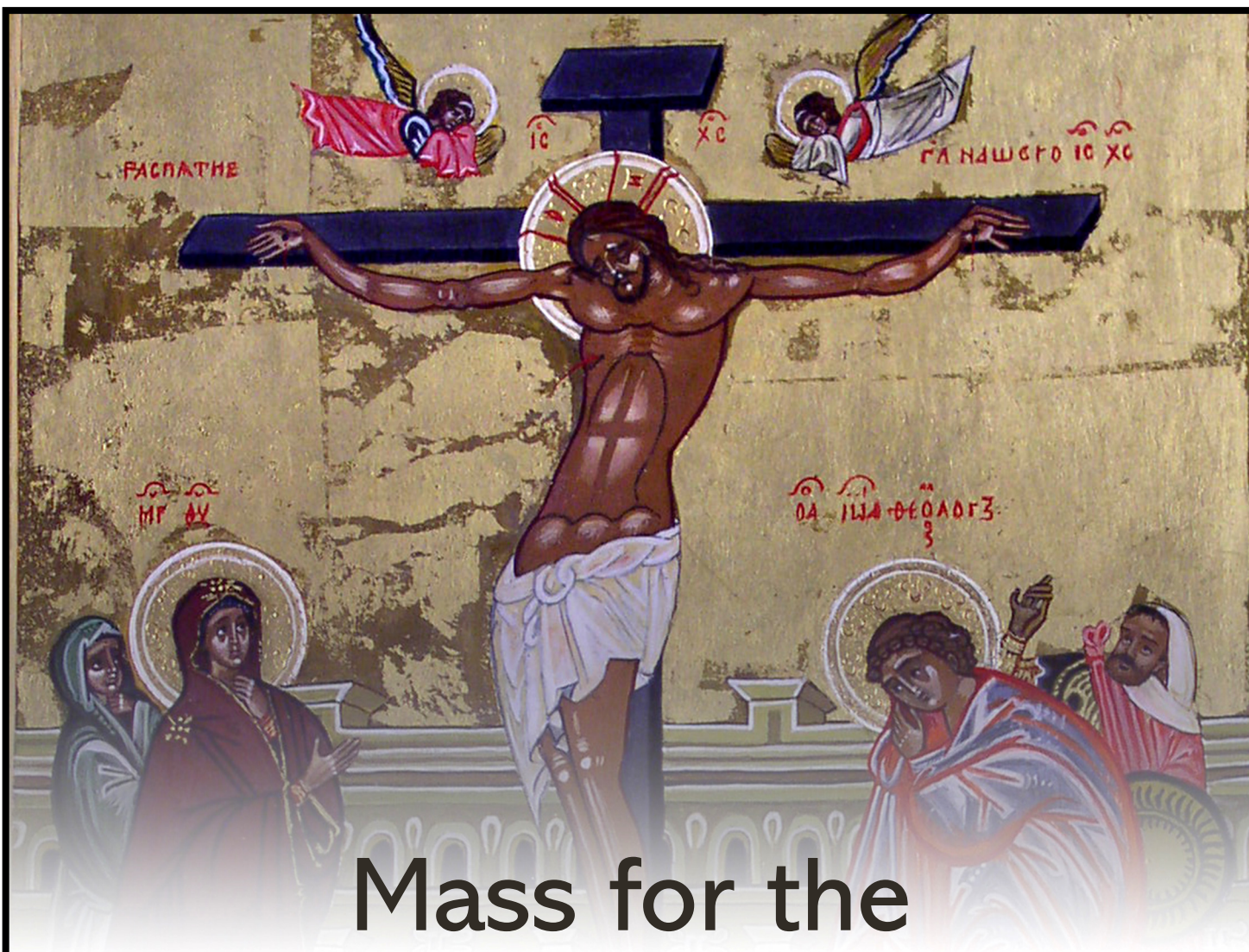

### How safeTALK works

Most people with thoughts of suicide don't want to die — instead, they are looking for a way to work through the pain in their lives. Through their words and actions, they usually invite others to help them in making a choice for life.

### Who can attend?

Middle and High School Students. Parents and community members are highly encouraged to attend as well.

### Goals and objectives

This suicide intervention training helps participants recognize a person with thoughts of suicide and connects them with resources to help them choose to live. Participants don't need any formal preparation to attend the training—anyone who wants to make a difference can learn the safeTALK steps. There will be scheduled breaks and opportunities to practice the skills built in the workshop, including practice on how to talk about this subject with others.
