

A Note from Fr. Chris



Dear Friends,

"It's the hap-happiest season of all!" goes the song (Andy Williams version, "It's The Most Wonderful Time of the Year," 1963)

Actually, not all folks find this season so very happy. The 'holiday season' for many brings forth feelings of sadness, loneliness, regrets, anxieties. Family issues and disputes can be intensified in the midst of all the efforts to make for a 'Merry Christmas.'

A sense of loss can also accompany this time of year, especially the remembrance of loved ones who passed away during the year or those whose death occurred during Christmas past. Broken relationships or past disappointments might occupy space in our minds and hearts while all around us 'Christmas cheer' is being pushed.

It can be hard to go through the days this time of year when one's heart is heavy or aching. Even when one wishes to find joy in the celebrations of Christmastime, it can feel like so much work.

Christ's coming into the world doesn't need us to be overly glad or celebratory. It is true that the scriptures tell of a host of angels singing and praising God; of shepherds telling everyone about the Messiah child they had seen. Remember also this: the scriptures show us a quiet Joseph and a mother Mary who "treasured all these things and pondered them in her heart" [Luke 2: 8-21]. Yes, a quiet Christmas (Jesus' birthday) has a long history of gentle quiet and reflection.

Let us all take in this season with a sense of calm and awareness of God's action in our lives. Christ came for our good - even when we are not able to feel it or see it at the moment. It takes faith to affirm Christ's presence in one's life. If God is to be 'Emmanuel' (God with us) we need to be ready for that grace. Maybe this season doesn't work for all of us. God is patient. Let us be patient as well.




ALL ARE INVITED TO COME FORWARD

asylum defense.



Las Posadas is the name of a religious festivity that takes place every December and forms part of the Hispanic Christmas tradition. The word posada translates to "dwelling" or "lodging". Celebrated in Mexico and in Spanish speaking segments of the United States, Las Posadas celebrate Joseph and Mary's journey from Bethlehem to Nazareth in search of a place for Baby Jesus to be born.

A main component of this celebration is asking for a *posada*, a place to rest, which is done via singing. To remember the journey of Mary and Joseph, a group of people gather and break off into two groups: the travelers seeking posada and the "host family" inside the house. In a back and forth, the outside group asks to be let in, while the "host family" refuses entry at first. Both sides exchange songs, until the "travelers" convince the "host family" to let them inside. After this, the "host" offers a traditional dinner.

We will walk around the neighborhood, stopping at (pre-determined) houses, looking for *posada*, then end at the parish Social Hall where we will finish with singing and ritual (and food!). Email asylumteam@stjosephparish.org to RSVP!
