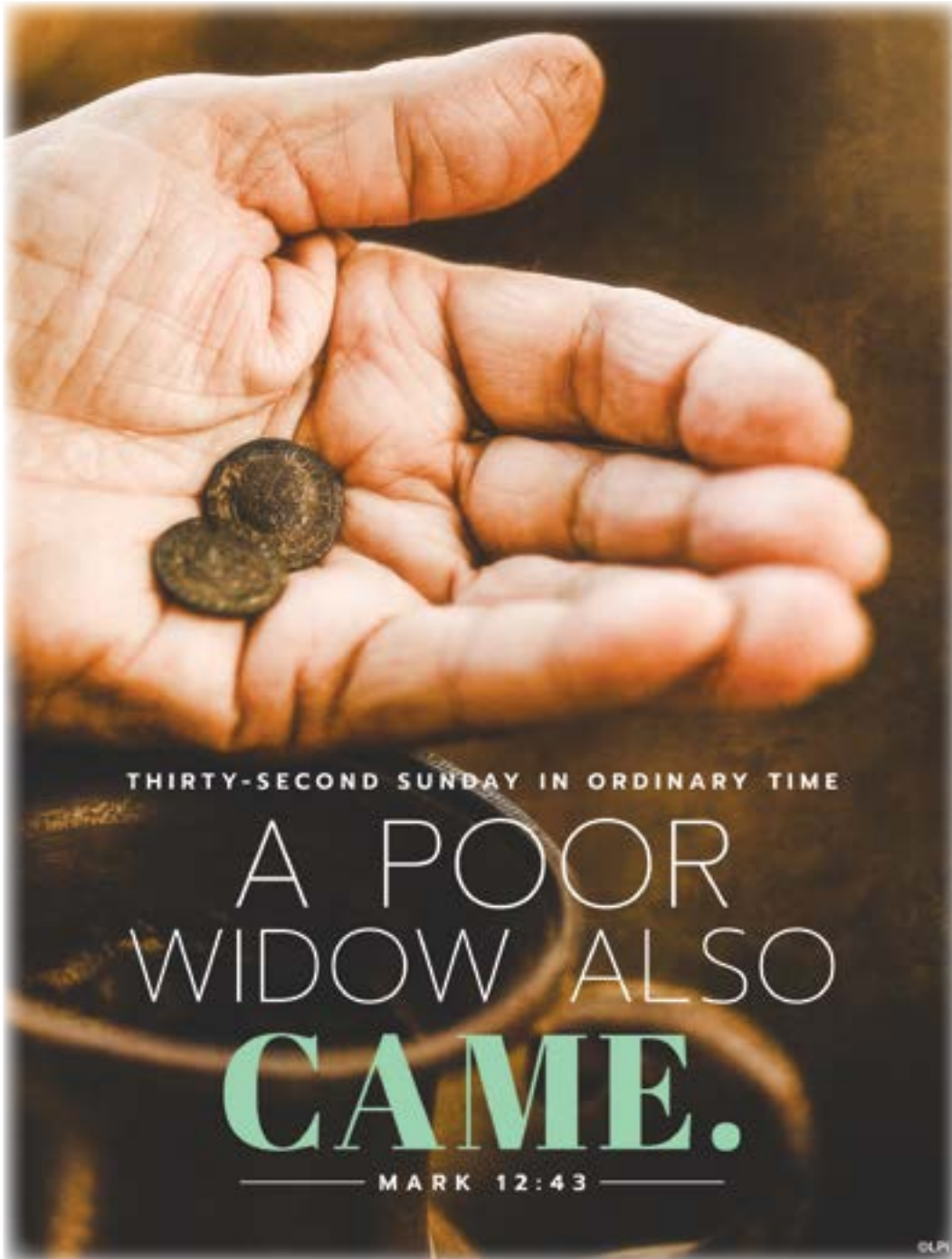

First Reading

1 Kings 17:10-16

In those days, Elijah the prophet went to Zarephath. As he arrived at the entrance of the city, a widow was gathering sticks there; he called out to her, "Please bring me a small cupful of water to drink." She left to get it, and he called out after her, "Please bring along a bit of bread." She answered, "As the LORD, your God, lives, I have nothing baked; there is only a handful of flour in my jar and a little oil in my jug. Just now I was collecting a couple of sticks, to go in and prepare something for myself and my son; when we have eaten it, we shall die." Elijah said to her, "Do not be afraid. Go and do as you propose. But first make me a little cake and bring it to me. Then you can prepare something for yourself and your son. For the LORD, the God of Israel, says, 'The jar of flour shall not go empty, nor the jug of oil run dry, until the day when the LORD sends rain upon the earth.'" She left and did as Elijah had said. But now once for all he has appeared at the end of the ages to take away sin by his sacrifice. Just as it is appointed that human beings die once, and after this the judgment, so also Christ, offered once to take away the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to take away sin but to bring salvation to those who eagerly await him.

Synodal Conversations - There was a great representation of our parish family in Rome the first week of October (see photo) in the pilgrimage group sponsored by Discerning Deacons. When we tell people we were "in Rome during the synod", they think we joined the 300+ delegates in the Paul VI synod hall with Pope Francis, but instead we were in Rome as accompaniers, witnesses, supporters and, most importantly, synodal listeners.

One way we will come to know each other in the parish family is through parish family-wide synodal conversations, one of the early tasks of the PFAC. In a recent conversation with college young adults across the country, many of whom attend Jesuit universities, Cardinal Jean-Claude Hollerich, relator general of the synod in Rome, spoke about how we will become a synodal church. "Synodality is a way of gathering and listening to each other, even when the other's opinions are different from mine. The person with a different opinion is not an enemy. We are together part of humanity. We live in the same world and we have to find common solutions to the [challenges of the] world...this type of listening exposes us to others' lived experiences that are wider than our own which is a wonderful gift."

Many of us have long, highly treasured histories with St. Joseph, St. Therese, St. Patrick and St. Mary parishes, what Cardinal Hollerich would call "lived experience". The synodal conversations will be an opportunity for us to share these lived experiences and for us to practice deep listening so the person behind the words emerges and becomes less of a stranger.

The very concept of a parish family challenges us to enlarge the space of our tent and to widen our views of the church that we share with our sisters and brothers all over the world. The Holy Spirit is omnipresent in every synodal conversation, so after listening to others in the 1st round, and sharing what each of us heard in the 2nd round, the 3rd round question in all synodal conversations is to discern what the Holy Spirit wants for the church and for our parish family. The PFAC looks forward to scheduling and participating in a number of these conversations in the near future.
