On Remembrance in November



In dreams begin responsibilities.

-W. B. Yeats-

This last week we celebrated the Feast of All the Saints and Blessed of the Society of Jesus (November 5), and the Commemoration of All the Dead of the Society (November 6). These include not just the saints who are familiar to us, but all the dead and all those received fully into God's presence. They include Jesuits, but also the women and men who lived and served in the Jesuit ministries and works.

These are the people who dreamed of St. Joseph and built it. Some of you are their descendants in blood; all of us our their descendants in spirit.

Let us give thanks for the dreams and for the dreamers. Let us give thanks that God poured into them all such life, and that they poured it out, as a libation, for our good and for the love of each of us here. Let us honor our ancestors this month with laughter and with tears, with stories and with truth, with impossible dreams that we, too, can help make true. Let us become part of the quest, as they were a part of it, for the glory of God and the life of the world.

Of Synods and the Call of Grace

The Synod experience also made us better realize that the true defenders of doctrine are not those who uphold its letter, but its spirit; not ideas but people; not formulae but the gratuitousness of God's love and forgiveness. This is no way to detract . . . from the importance of laws and divine commandments, but rather to exalt the greatness of the true God, who does not treat us according to our merits or even according to our works but solely according to the boundless generosity of his Mercy.

-Pope Francis, Address at the Conclusion of the Synod on the Family-

Like many of my mornings, this one began with Mass at 7:00 am in the Parish Center. It was Monday, All Souls' Day, and from the many readings offered, I listened as the lector proclaimed the words of St. Paul-words that never fail to stir me and even surprise me by their boldness: "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." For all the times that he can be infuriatingly circuitous or obscure, in this one sentence Paul proclaims the deepest hope of all faithful people, the hope of the Church, the hope borne by the life, death, and resurrection of Christ Jesus. I can never hear it without being changed, renewed, deepened in my sense of the miracle God offers.

After Mass, with my necessary coffee in hand, I headed to my office to begin the day—knowing that a busy week awaited me, but still buoyed by the words of Paul, and hoping to take an hour for reading and quiet before the madness descended. I opened my file of things I wanted to read, and found two documents that caught my interest: Pope Francis' closing remarks to the Synod on the Family, and his homily at Mass the next day. Having read much about the controversies of the Synod—the accusations that Francis was trying to undermine Catholicism, the give-and-take around communion for divorced and remarried Catholics, and the bold suggestions to ordain women as deacons and welcome gays and lesbians into fuller participation—I knew that the final document was, in many ways, an uneasy compromise. Yet, I wanted to know how Francis saw the gathering, and I hoped to discern what I might do as Pastor and what we might become as a parish, following the Synod.

What I found were two documents bold in their honesty, clear in the direction they saw for the Church, and offered to me and to us: a direction marked by mercy and welcome, by the living Spirit and not merely the Law. At the conclusion of the Synod, Francis affirmed that the gathering had, "laid bare the closed hearts which frequently hide even behind the Church's teachings or good intentions, in order to sit in the chair of Moses and judge, sometimes with superiority and superficiality, difficult cases and wounded families." The next day, in his homily, he went further, noting that the crowd of disciples who followed Jesus remained deaf to the call of Bartimaeus, even as that call stopped Jesus in his tracks, leading him to attend to the ignored and outcast beggar with the compassion that was his deepest desire. With imagery that ties these disciples, who were too busy and too important to stop, with his fellow Synod members, Francis proclaims, "We are in his group, but our hearts are not open. We lose wonder, gratitude, and enthusiasm, and risk becoming habitually unmoved by grace. We are able to speak about him and work for him, but we live far from his heart, which is reaching out to those who are wounded." Following, as it did, on the footsteps of his address at the conclusion of the Synod, this homily suggests that this Francis, the Vicar of Christ, will not be deterred by a "spirituality of illusion," but intends to follow with courage "the working of the Holy Spirit, who is the real protagonist and guide of the Synod."

There are many pundits and bloggers who, seeing the world only in political categories, speak of the Synod as a failure for Francis and his "progressive agenda" for the Church. Yet, in reading his words, I do not hear the small vision of traditionalists v. progressives, that aims to divide the Church as it has divided civil society. Rather, I hear in Francis the voice of the One who stopped for Bartimaeus when his disciples kept going, who responded when they sought only to silence. I hear a man caught up in the great sweep of grace, articulated by St. Paul—a grace in which the Spirit of God is the motive force, drawing all people into communion; a grace through which the unwavering love of Christ Jesus pulses, calling each beggar to come forward; and for which the whole of Creation groans, awaiting its redemption. In the face of this movement, neither the politics of the cardinals nor the opinions of columnists "will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."





First Reading 1 Kings 17:10-16

In those days, Elijah the prophet went to Zarephath. As he arrived at the entrance of the city, a widow was gathering sticks there; he called out to her, "Please bring me a small cupful of water to drink." She left to get it, and he called out after her, "Please bring along a bit of bread." She answered, "As the LORD, your God, lives, I have nothing baked; there is only a handful of flour in my jar and a little oil in my jug. Just now I was collecting a couple of sticks, to go in and prepare something for myself and my son; when we have eaten it, we shall die." Elijah said to her, "Do not be afraid. Go

and do as you propose. But first make me a little cake and bring it to me. Then you can prepare something for yourself and your son. For the LORD, the God of Israel, says, 'The jar of flour shall not go empty, nor the jug of oil run dry, until the day when the LORD sends rain upon the earth.'" She left and did as Elijah had said. She was able to eat for a year, and he and her son as well; the jar of flour did not go empty, nor the jug of oil run dry, as the LORD had foretold through Elijah.



Second Reading Hebrews 9:24-28

Christ did not enter into a sanctuary made by hands, a copy of the true one, but heaven itself, that he might now appear before God on our behalf. Not that he might offer himself repeatedly, as the high priest enters each year into the sanctuary with blood that is not his own; if that were so, he would have had to suffer repeatedly from the foundation of the world. But now once for all he has appeared at the end of the ages to take away sin by his sacrifice. Just as it is appointed that human beings die once, and after this the judgment, so also Christ, offered once to take away the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to take away sin but to bring salvation to those who eagerly await him.





Gospel Mark 12:38-44


In the course of his teaching Jesus said to the crowds, "Beware of the scribes, who like to go around in long robes and accept greetings in the marketplaces, seats of honor in synagogues, and places of honor at banquets. 



LITURGY AND WORSHIP

Liturgy & Worship Survey

One of the parish commissions is the Liturgy and Worship Commission and one branch of our stated mission is "evaluating and discerning the ongoing worship of the People of God." To that end, beginning next weekend we will initiate the first of twice yearly evaluations of our liturgical life. This evaluative tool is designed to assist the pastor and parish staff in understanding the aspects of liturgy that support parishioners in active and meaningful participation in the liturgy. We want to know what elements of how we celebrate Mass together help deepen your experience of worship and/or your engagement in the community. We also want to hear from you about elements of our worship together that take away from your experience, that you have questions about and/or that you find distracting.

In undertaking this survey, we acknowledge that we are a diverse community. What may be inspiring for some people, may be distracting for others. Our intention is to use this feedback to affirm those things which deepen our community worship experience. We also want to determine whether there are elements of how we worship that might benefit from some changes. Because we have several Sunday liturgies, there is room to incorporate a variety of preferences related to style of music and atmosphere. We will be looking at shared themes once the survey results are compiled.

This is intended to be primarily an online survey which will make collating and sharing of data much easier than having to compile and collate date from several hundred written surveys. However, for those who do not have access to a computer there will be written evaluations available from the receptionist in the Parish Center.

The survey will be "live" on the parish website Saturday, Nov. 7 at 6 pm and will conclude two weeks later at midnight on Sunday, Nov. 22. Paper surveys must be dropped off by 7 pm on Nov. 22. After the information is compiled the liturgy commission will gather to explore the range of responses, to seek out what there is to be learned from the results and how best to interpret them. The commission will then present an executive summary to the parish after the new year and the evaluation process will be repeated in the late spring.

The Rosary At St. Joseph
