Praying Constantly

On one of those late evening twilights, so common in Seattle at this time of year, as the sun, filtering through the tall trees across the street, filled my office with shadow and light, I sat talking to a good friend about prayer and faith and what was going on in his life. He had recently completed the Spiritual Exercises, where he had attuned himself to regular times of prayer and reflection, but now he sat like a school boy who had not done his homework. When I asked him about it, he said that things had been so busy that he had fallen out of the habit of quiet that he had been developing. He felt guilty, as though he were not living up to the gifts he had received in the *Exercises*, and he seemed uncharacteristically sheepish. I didn't really know what to say, so I asked him about the rest of his life. How were things going?

It was then I saw him relax, and a sense of lightness slip over him. He told me about flying across the continent to be with his wife when her father was dying, and how it felt to see her for the first time in many weeks, and about comforting her and feeling so close to her. He told me about work, where a complex problem had arisen and he and his colleagues had had to work long hours together to solve it, and had become much closer through the unexpected challenge. And as I listened to him, reciting grace upon grace—the hard grace of his father-in-law's death, the deep grace of his marriage, and the surprising grace of companionship with his colleagues—I felt the energy and the strength of his spirit, so much at odds with the shame he had expressed just minutes before. And then I knew that all this had been his prayer: all these moments of grace and communion, all the times he had responded to the call of his marriage or lived out his commitments to others, all the times he had felt the gifts of the Spirit drawing him closer and closer to God and to those whom God had brought into his life. And even though he had not found time to sit quietly and reflect, God had been praying through him, the graces of God manifesting themselves in the depth of his heart. All he had to do was recognize it.

In my experience, many of us—perhaps most of us—feel inadequate when it comes to prayer. Indeed, whenever I ask anyone about their prayer—in Confession or in spiritual direction—the answer (usually preceded by a nervous clearing of the throat or shifting in the chair) is almost always the same: “Well, I know I don't pray as much as I should” or “I always feel so distracted”


or “*My prayer never seems very good.*” I have heard it from mothers, who each day corral several children to get them to soccer or school; I have heard it from young men, coming off an evening at the men’s shelter and on their way home before work; I have heard it from religious Sisters, who have spent their whole life in service to the poor and the sick; I have heard it from Jesuit priests, sitting in retirement centers after years in the missions. And I have heard it from my own heart, which so many times leaves me wondering how I got into this line of work, when I don’t seem to pray the way I think priests are supposed to pray and when I don’t feel I live up to the model of prayer I have in my head.

Yet, the truth is that these models, though useful in their place, can easily become idols, that keep us from knowing the true God and the true nature of prayer. Like the false gods of the ancient world, these idols reduce prayer from an internal movement to an external duty, an obligation that one fulfills appropriately or inappropriately, adequately or inadequately. In thinking this way, we become disoriented, and start to mistake the form of a prayer with prayer itself, and to believe that we have failed at prayer whenever we fail to perfect the form. Hence, I see myself as bad at prayer because I doze off during the rosary, or lose my place during the divine office; because I can’t stop thinking about Beyonce’s song, *Put a Ring on It*, while I’m supposed to be contemplating the wedding feast at Cana; or because I keep worrying if there are enough donuts when I’m supposed to be doing my post-communion thanksgiving. I’m a failure at prayer because I get caught up in the rush to work and miss my morning offering, or because, many nights, I collapse exhausted into bed and forget my night prayers. Over and over, we fail to pray as we ought to pray, fail to do our duty to God, and so we feel unworthy of God and distant from God’s love.

The truth, however, is that prayer is not about a form, but about a relationship. It is not about duty but about desire. It is about finding a way to be present to the One who loves me and the One I love. Prayer is anything by which the presence of God is known, by which we sense the relationship in which we “*live and move and have our being.*” While various forms, at various times, may be helpful (or harmful), the measure of our prayer is not how well we practice the form but how much we live out, in the rush and quiet of our lives, our relationship to God and our reception of God’s loving response. Prayer’s fulfillment is communion with God, which happens not by the incantation of the one who prays, but by the Spirit of God taking flesh in the fabric of our life and the passion of our hearts. Thus, the fruit of all prayer can be seen when we live according to the call that God has given to us, whether in the Sacrament of Marriage or in the availability of religious vows, in our care for the people

of God or in our merciful and compassionate engagement with the world. We may not always know we have prayed well, but if we have loved and healed, sacrificed and supported, then the Spirit of God has been at work in us.

My first day as a novice in the Society of Jesus, I went into the room of my confessor and he asked me about my prayer. I responded, automatically, “*Well, I don’t pray as much as I should.*” He looked at me, and with a little smile said, “*Okay, but do you pray as much as you want to?*” His question changed my world, and opened to me the possibility of true prayer: prayer rooted not in my abstract duty to God, but in my deep desire to live as a man in love with Jesus Christ, and so in love with all those other people, brought to me through Jesus. While I still seek time to be alone with Jesus (all relationships need a little personal time), I worry less about that now than I once did. For my prayer—all prayer—is every act of love and mercy, done from the Spirit that gives me life.

FAITH FORMATION

Children's Faith Formation 2016-2017

The CFF program continues to flourish with the participation of so many children and youth in grades Pre-K thru Junior High. This is a program that takes many hands and hearts to provide strong and consistent faith formation for our youngest parishioners. To volunteer, please contact Dottie at dfarewell@stjosephparish.org

Course Offerings

Children's Faith Formation Childcare: During the 9am Mass for children 1-3 years old. This is a time for your child to begin experiencing church through play. Children are supervised by a paid adult and volunteer youth. Beginning in September. The annual fee is \$50 and scholarships are available.

Children's Faith Formation Pre-Kindergarten (CFF Pre-K): During the 9am Mass for children *3 1/2-5 years old. This is a hands-on, Montessori-style class for our young ones. **Your child should be out of diapers and able to follow simple directions, such as those given in a pre-school setting.* The annual fee is \$30 and scholarships are available.

Children's Faith Formation K (CFF K): During the 9am Mass for children currently enrolled in Kindergarten (private, public, home, or parish school) beginning in the fall. Classes consist of scripture stories, arts & crafts, songs, and either outside or gym playtime. Pickup is in the old gym across from the Social Hall. The annual fee is \$30 and scholarships are available.

Children's Faith Formation 1 (CFF 1): The first of a two year Sacramental Preparation program for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist. Participation and completion of CFF 1 (or equivalent) is required before the second year, during which your child would receive these sacraments. This includes children in our parish school, public school, other private school or home school. The annual fee is \$60 and scholarships are available.

Children's Faith Formation 2 (CFF 2): ALL children planning to receive First Reconciliation and First Eucharist this upcoming school year must have completed the CFF 1 class (or equivalent) last year whether you attend our parish school, public school, other private school or home school. There is a \$100 annual fee and scholarships are available.

Children's Faith Formation Year 3 & 4 (CFF 3/4): This class is for children to reflect, learn, and continue to practice their faith through the Sacraments. We will continue to use arts, scripture studies, and community building activities to strengthen our faith and knowledge of the Church. Children participate in a Spring Passion Play during Lent. The annual fee is \$30 and scholarships are available.

Children's Faith Formation Year 5 & 6 (CFF 5/6): This class for youth in 5th & 6th grades focuses on the liturgy, Church teachings and growing faith through prayer. Children participate in a Spring Passion Play during Lent with the CFF 3/4 class. The annual fee is \$30 and scholarships are available.

Children's Faith Formation Year Junior High: This class is a 3-year Bible study for youth in 7th, 8th, & 9th grades. The annual fee is \$30 for each of the classes PLUS \$25 for materials (Bible & workbook). Scholarships are available.

High School Confirmation: Youth must be at least 16 years old by the Confirmation Mass date (late January/early February), already received the Sacraments of Baptism and Eucharist, and continued in ongoing faith formation through parish programs or Catholic High School. Students are actively seeking the Sacrament of Confirmation and are participating members in their parish and personal faith life. The annual fee is \$135 and scholarships are available.

AGAPE Travels to Bellingham

During this coming week, twelve middle school students and several adult volunteers will travel to Bellingham to participate in the Agape service trip. Agape allows participants an opportunity to serve the migrant community of Whatcom County and gives them a better understanding of the "social justice" tradition of the Catholic Church. This trip helps participants realize how they can impact their local community and the world through serving others. This year's participants are: Juliette DeLaurentis, Elise Bernard, Mary Farewell, Sarah Greely, Mackenzie Jones, Alexa Mauad, Gabriel McMillan, Tess McMillan, Sarah Mirkin, Annie Mirkin, Jeremy Freiburger, and Niko Nicoloudakis.
