Discernment, Indifference, and Love

After meeting for many sessions, there was a cleavage of sentiments and opinions about our situation. While we all had one mind and heart in seeking God's gracious and perfect will, according to the scope of our vocations, nevertheless, we held diverse views regarding the more readily effective and fruitful ways of achieving God's will for ourselves and for others. . . We settled on this: that we would give ourselves to prayer, Masses, and meditations more fervently than usual, and after doing our very best, we would, for the rest, cast all our concerns on the Lord, hoping in him

-The Deliberation of the First Fathers (1539)-

The year was 1539. Ten men, all recently ordained to the priesthood, all of whom possessed Masters degrees from various schools of the University of Paris, and all of whom had committed themselves, individually, to serve God and the Church, gathered in Rome to put themselves under the guidance of the Pope. Already, the Pope, seeing in these zealous and well-educated young men a chance to bring reform and revitalization to the Church, had offered several of them assignments in various diocese across Europe; and one was even scheduled to go farther, fulfilling the request of King John of Portugal for a missionary leader in India. Suddenly, the friendship they had formed in Paris, where they had come to together in prayer and service among the poor, seemed imperiled. They had no leader nor leadership structure to hold them together—when asked whom they served, each man had determined to say that he was, simply, a Companion of Jesus—and now, faced with impending separation, they wondered if this, indeed, was the end of their time with each other, if this companionship, formed by love alone, was now drawing to a close.

Even without bonds of authority, they had already been through much together. Moved by the Spiritual Exercises of their oldest member, Ignatius, they had grown close during the years in Paris—united in a way that often scared their parents, who saw all the plans they had for their sons ruined by this new religious zeal. On the Feast of the Assumption, 1534, several of these young men, along with Ignatius, had made personal vows of poverty in a small chapel in Montmarte, where they had also committed to go to Jerusalem. The others had followed this example on the same feast on each of the next two years. Planning for this trip to the Holy Land, and working among the poor, they had spent almost a year together, after college, in Venice. And when they could not get permission to travel east, they had decided to go together to Rome, to serve God by allowing the Pope to send them wherever they were needed. Now, the Pope was about to do just that, and the end of their companionship—as it became more real—led them to talk seriously about the future.

While the title may sound imposing—i.e., *The Deliberation of the First Fathers (or Deliberatio primorum Patrum,* in the original Latin)—the idea behind this series of meetings is simple: ten relatively young men (even Ignatius, the oldest by nearly 20 years, was only 52 at the time) wanted to figure out what their common future

should be, or if they had a common future. Should they request of the Pope to be made a new religious order, or should they simply separate as friends, carrying their graces with them? Should they vow themselves to one of their own, or remain free to go wherever they are asked, each by the light of his own conscience? These were real questions for these men, questions that would determine how or if they would remain united in the years to come.

However, what makes this gathering unique is not just the product that comes out of their reflection (i.e., the founding of the Society of Jesus), but the way by which the first Companions approach the reflection itself. Rather than each one looking to get what he wants, to make up his mind and persuade the others, these friends spend days in prayer and contemplation, seeking to attain a level of "indifference" to whatever is decided. This indifference is not apathy nor disinterest; rather, it is a passionate desire, in the heart of each of them, to do only that which God wants, instead of what ego or self-interest, personal prejudice or emotional feeling would have them do. Such indifference finds its root in the Spiritual Exercises—which each of them had experienced individually—where the exercitant seeks to be placed, completely, in the hands of God, choosing only that which will give God greater honor and glory. This is the passion at the heart of Ignatian indifference, the deep desire to which one tries to subdue all lesser desires. This is the sense of freedom that the Companions seek, in which no lesser love than God holds sway.

In the Deliberation of the First Fathers, we find the earliest example of communal apostolic discernment—i.e, the first example of a group, and not just an individual, trying to apply the principles of spiritual discernment. Here, the discernment does not belong to just one person, since there is no leader to whom the rest of the group is meant to defer; rather, in this case, the "chief discerner" is the group itself—the ten brothers, gathered together in prayer and reflection. Thus, each decision entails mutual reflection and genuine openness, a willingness to speak up, and then surrender one's will to the will of the majority—believing always that the Spirit of God is at work, and that if each member of the community opens himself to that Spirit, through indifference, the decisions made can be guided by grace and supported by God's mercy. In an age and culture which too often sees the opponent as the enemy and disagreement as disloyalty, such a vision seems almost impossible to imagine. Yet, in the Deliberations, we see how love of one another and trust in the God who has entered the world and promises to remain with us until the end of the age can undermine cynicism and the need to be right, which so often emerges in fearful and defensive people. For these first Companions, there is no alternative truth, but only

the one truth rooted in the will of God. Our task, then, is to try to attain sufficient freedom—to minimize the noise of ego and fear—so that the Spirit might speak to our hearts. Thus, the Companions are able to assume contrary positions—one day arguing for one side, one day arguing for the other—until the blessing of the Spirit, given to each one by the grace of God, is sifted out and made attainable to the community at large.

Looking back at the beginning of the Jesuits, our vision is easily colored by nearly 500 years of history. From such a distance, we can idealize the Deliberations or consider as inevitable their results. Of course the Society had to be founded and of course Ignatius, who had gathered these Companions in the first place, had to be elected as their leader. Yet, such a sense of retroactive inevitability blinds us to the real work that discernment entails for the first Companions, and always entails. It keeps us from noticing that the limitations we feel have been felt before, and that the faith we need to marshal has been marshaled before, and can be marshaled by us. We are called to discernment, which means we are called, as well, to the freedom that comes from indifference built on love. Such indifference, such discernment, requires work—requires prayer and sacrifice, a willingness to set aside our own need to be right and a willingness to believe that God is at work even in those people with whom I disagree. Yet, if we take up this work, if we consider—with honesty and commitment—not just our own position but the position of those with whom we disagree, if we believe that God still loves us and is still willing to intrude into our community, then we might just find the freedom to do something wonderful for God.

In the coming weeks and months, St. Joseph will be engaged in our own difficult work of discernment, as we begin to consider how we might better use the resources that have been entrusted to us to live out the mission and vision of our Parish. Though different from the purely communal discernment found in the Deliberation of the First Fathers (as Pastor, I am charged by the Church and the Society to act as chief discerner), my hope is that we can come close to this privileged model—that each of us can contribute with passion and indifference to the dialogue we take up; that we can disagree with love, knowing that the Spirit comes forth through the purifying actions of debate, and trusting that each of us has the good of all (i.e., the will of God) as her or his deepest desire. I hope many will come to the listening sessions (the schedule is in this week's bulletin) and that more will respond to the survey to follow. But I hope, especially, that all will pray that God, who has begun this good work in St. Joseph will see it through to the day of Christ Jesus.

Course Offerings

Scholarships available for all our course offerings!

Children's Faith Formation Childcare: During the 9am Mass for children 1-3 years old. This is a time for your child to begin experiencing church through playtime. Children are supervised by a paid adult and volunteer youth. Child Care during 9am Mass in the Social Hall. Please visit our Homepage tile Let's Get Started and sign up under Children's Faith Formation. Open year-round, register at any time. The annual fee is \$50.

Children's Faith Formation Pre-Kindergarten (CFF Pre-K): During the 9am Mass for children *3 1/2-5 years old. This is a hands-on, Montessori-style class for our young ones. *Your child should be out of diapers and able to follow simple directions, such as those given in a pre-school setting. The annual fee is \$30.

Children's Faith Formation K (CFF K): During the 9am Mass for children currently enrolled in Kindergarten (private, public, home, or parish school) beginning in the fall. Classes consist of scripture stories, arts & crafts, songs, and gym playtime. Pickup is in the old gym across from the Social Hall. The annual fee is \$30.

Children's Faith Formation 1 (CFF 1): The first of a two year Sacramental Preparation program for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist. Participation and completion of CFF 1 (or equivalent) is required before the second year, during which your child would receive these sacraments. This includes children in our parish school, public school, other private school or home school. The annual fee is \$60.

Children's Faith Formation 2 (CFF 2): ALL children planning to receive First Reconciliation and First Eucharist this upcoming school year must have completed the CFF 1 class (or equivalent) last year whether you attend our parish school, public school, other private school or home school. Additional retreat and home materials provided for immediate preparation. There is a \$100 annual fee.

Children's Faith Formation Year 3 & 4 (CFF 3/4): This class is for children to reflect, learn, and continue to practice their faith. We will continue to use arts, scripture studies, and community building activities to strengthen our faith and knowledge of the Church. The annual fee is \$30.

Children's Faith Formation Year 5 & 6 (CFF 5/6): This class for youth in 5th & 6th grades focuses on the liturgy, Church teachings and growing faith through prayer. The annual fee is \$30.

Children's Faith Formation Year Junior High: This class is a 3-year Bible study for youth in 7th, 8th, & 9th grades. The annual fee is \$30 for each of the classes PLUS \$25 for materials (Bible & workbook).



"John" had just undergone his second surgery for a broken back. The brace he wore held him erect but in a most constricting way. He was most uncomfortable. He face sat least four more surgeries—and the struggle to be declared disabled. Living on less than \$200 a month, he needed help with rent—that was all he had asked for. But his food stamp allotment of \$120 a month did not cover his needs. We covered his rent and provided some food cards for Safeway. Most grate-

ful for this help, "John" cheerfully said "I'll get better." We pray he will and thank you St. Joseph Parishioners for your support!
