Mary and Her Son

"God became human, that we might become divine."

When Athanasius, a young deacon from the city of Alexandria, first wrote these words in the early part of the fourth century, the Church was just beginning more than two centuries of struggle about the nature of Jesus and his relationship to God and to us. On the one hand, there were those—like the deacon, Arius—who held that Jesus was a creature like any other, whom God had elevated to sonship, but who remained always something less than fully divine. For Arius, it was absurd to speak of God becoming human, since God was the Creator, and the Creator becoming a creature was a logical impossibility. In this view, Jesus was the first creature, sent into the world to rescue humanity; yet, his identity as Son was an honor given to him, not a matter of his nature. At the other extreme, were those who held that Jesus was only an avatar of God: the divine merely masquerading as a human being. To Athanasius, however, and to the Church which followed him, the mystery of God becoming human was precisely the point; for through this wondrous impossibility our categories and limitations are overcome, and all that reason and logic demand becomes subject to the greater power of love. From the Council or Nicaea forward, the Church holds that the unity of the divine and the human in Jesus—the oneness of the ineffable God with that scrawny little baby born in a manger, of the Lord of heaven with that convicted felon hanging on the cross—is fundamental to our hope, fundamental to our reconciliation with God and with each another, fundamental to our salvation. So it is, that, following the teachings of Athanasius, the Church proclaims Jesus to be something reason cannot fully grasp, for he is "true God and true man," "one in being" with the Father and one in being with us, as well.

But if the union of divinity and humanity in Jesus is the key of our salvation, how does that key work? How does Jesus' coming into the world as a little baby and leaving the world as a convicted felon unify us with God? How does it save us? How does it make us divine?

Salvation—or *divinization* as it is called in Eastern Christianity—is a gift of God that is given to us through Jesus, but it is a most unusual gift. For it doesn't come to us because Jesus—the Son of God—is so powerful; on the contrary, it comes to us because Jesus—the Son of Mary—is so weak. Or, perhaps a better way to understand this: salvation comes to us because Jesus, the Son of God, has emptied himself of power and the privileges of divinity to become the beau-

tiful and fragile baby who suckles at the breast of Mary and dirties his diapers in a Bethlehem manger. For isn't this at the heart of unconditional loving, that it places the power not in the hands of the one who gives but in the heart of the one who receives?

A few years before my mother died, as my Christmas present her, I gathered up all the family slides going back to 1962—when my father first started taking slides—and put together a slide show, including some music from the different periods. Among these slides, were a great many from various Christmas eves, when we would all gather in our living room in California, as our parents opened up the gifts my brothers and sisters and I had bought for them. As I looked through these slides, one that especially caught my eye was from the early sixties. In it, my mother is holding a scarf that I think my sister gave her. In front of her is a bottle of perfume I had bought at the neighborhood drug store, and on the floor is my brother's gift: one of the largest and ugliest oil paintings you could possibly imagine—a beach scene at sunset. None of these items is worth very much, yet my mother is looking up, clutching the scarf to her chest as though it were made of spun gold, and the tears are glistening on her cheeks. Seeing that picture, I immediately recall the feeling I had that Christmas eve—even before I opened my own gifts. It was a feeling of joy, of love, of incredible communion with my parents; for they had allowed themselves to become the receivers of our love, to become not the ones who provided all to us (although they gave us even the money for these gifts) but the ones who received from us everything they desired. They gave me and my sisters and brothers a great gift by accepting what we had to give, not according to objective standards of value but according to the standard which only love can set. Their greatest gift was that they called us to be for them what they had always been for us: they gave us the grace to become givers, by accepting with grace what we had to give.

This coming Monday, we celebrate a double feast, the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, and the Naming of the Child Jesus. But it is really only one feast: the feast of our salvation. For what makes us divine, what saves us, what unites us in communion with God is that each one of us now participates, through the presence of our brother, Jesus, in the very life of God. Like my parents on Christmas, who rejoiced in even the simplest gifts, God raises up our smallness and makes of us something wondrous. God empowers us by becoming weak for us. In Jesus, the divinity becomes the receiver of our gifts; the Creator of all blessings is blessed by the generosity of the creatures. It is impossible, and yet love makes it happen. In that moment, when Mary, the daughter of God,

becomes God's Mother; when the unnameable Lord of the Old Testament is named by Joseph as *Jesus;* when all that is said of God is now true of a human being and all that is said of a human being is now true of God: everything changes. Suddenly, irrevocably, the Spirit of God is one with us, and we become what God is—not by eating fruit from the Garden, nor by building towers to heaven, but by giving as God has given to us, with a self-emptying and welcoming love.

What Mary, the Mother of God, reveals to us is that salvation is not a "something" we are given or can earn, but is, instead, a relationship we constantly renew—renew each time we open our hands to give with mercy, or open our hearts to receive the mercy of someone else. For when we become weak that others might be strong, become poor that they might be enriched, become servants that they might find their freedom, we manifest the same Spirit as did the Son of God in his Incarnation. Each time we risk our lives or our fortunes by standing up against injustice, by feeding those who are hungry, by reconciling those who are divided, by breaking bread at this table with all who would come to it, regardless of conditions of worthiness or merit—each time we love as Jesus loved, as Mary taught him to love, we signal that his body is our body, that his blood runs through our veins. He has become what we are; we can become what he is.

Let us pray that in this New Year, we might become, more fully, the women and men whom Jesus invites us to be. Let us pray that we might become as Mary became before us: she whom we celebrate as *Theotokas*, *God-Bearer*, *Mother of God*. Let us pray that we might become mothers and fathers of God in the world, bearing in our bodies the power of God, through the weakness of Christ, and the mystery of God's own Spirit.





Gospel Luke 2:22-40



Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon. This man was righteous and devout, awaiting the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord. He came in the Spirit into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to him, He took him into his arms and blessed God, saying: "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted —and you yourself a sword will pierce— so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived seven years with her husband after her marriage, and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple, but worshiped night and day with fasting and prayer. And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem.



A third call finds a man whose daughter is dying of cancer, in Chicago. He wants to visit her but to pay for his travel he can't cover his rent for January. We cover that, \$170, so he can "visit the sick." Lastly, we see a woman on disability, caring for young niece and nephew. We give her the last \$50 we have in food cards.
