


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The State of St. Joseph Parish

Dear Friends & Companions: Peace of Christ!

Not long ago, while organizing some old files on my computer, I rediscovered a written copy of my first homily given at St. Joseph on Sunday, July 26, 2009. Rereading the text, I recalled the feelings I had that day: feelings of anticipation and desire, of joy at being right where God had put me and of hope that I might be a conduit of blessing to this already blessed community. Ascending the pulpit (I had not yet started to preach from in front of the altar), I can remember looking out at the faces—some of whom I knew, most of whom I had yet to meet—and wondering what we would become, who we could be together?

I began that first homily with a story about St. Ignatius of Loyola, who, five years before the Jesuits were founded, was climbing a mountain road on his way to a town in Northern Italy. As he climbed, the path narrowed and the cliff beside him grew so steep that by the end of the day he found himself crawling in the dark, unable to go back and terrified by the precipice at his side. Facing his fears, he made it through this great danger, only to slip off a footbridge at the edge of town and fall into the mud. I have always loved this story for the way it recalls how our courage can be tested without being overcome, and yet also reminds us of the inevitable slips that should keep us humble. For me, on that first Sunday, the story also offered a metaphor, through which I have continued to imagine our work at St. Joseph—a work of great value, but always because it helps others to get where they are going. As my homily on that day put it: "For most of the people here, St. Joseph is not the mountain you are called to climb; it is not the primary path by which you find holiness and grace. Rather, this parish is the base camp for our assent to God. Like Ignatius, we must come (and are called to come) to this church and to this table, so that we can receive the oxygen of the gospels and the food of the Eucharist, so that we can find companions for the journey and, perhaps, find others whose journey we might make easier. Some of you may come so that your children will



learn to climb well; some may come because, like the people in the gospel, you are hungry for the food that Christ offers in this place; and still others may come because, right now, you are on your knees, like Ignatius on the cliff, and can barely find a way forward. But all of us come here, ultimately, so that—like Ignatius— we might go back out into the world: facing our fears with faith, our precipices with hope, and our humiliations with the love that raises us up and unites us as sisters and brothers in the service of all creation."

I still believe, more than ten years

later, that the mission of St. Joseph Parish is to be this "base camp"

for all those in need of nurture and support, education and direction, companionship and the bottled oxygen contained in the word of God. And I believe, that by living this mission well, we inspire and empower the women and men of this Parish to be the Body of Christ not just at Mass, but while ascending all the mountains of this world. Renewed by the many graces offered at St. Joseph, parishioners are becoming the Church it all its richness: proclaiming the gospel of Christ in a million places, in a billion quiet ways, in all the seemingly common moments that they fill with grace and mercy.

These days, I am overwhelmed by what God is doing in our midst: overwhelmed by the vitality of our Children's Faith Formation program and by the growing energy of Adult Faith Formation; overwhelmed by the renewal and deepening of our relationship with our Sister Parish and by our leadership in advocacy for justice; overwhelmed by the vibrancy of our Sunday worship communities and by the flourishing of other venues of spiritual growth, including our Rosary Group and Sacred Silence, Bible Study and Centering Prayer; overwhelmed by the commitment to growth shown in our Women's Ministry and by the innovative and multi-dimensional community being built by our Young Adults; overwhelmed by the adoption and implementation of a Jesuit vision at our Primary and Middle School and by the School's intentional progress on diversity and inclusion; overwhelmed by the deepened relationship between St. Joseph and the other Jesuit Ministries of Seattle and by the many ways St. Joseph parishioners are bringing the graces of this community into the various good works of Seattle and greater Puget Sound.

Working with a dedicated community of professional ministers, and a legion of volunteers, I have watched, in awe, as the People of God at St. Joseph have found their voice and their courage through evening presentations and spiritual retreats, through prayerful liturgies and discerning, engaged homilies. I have followed as this community has gone forth into jails and prisons, hospitals and nursing homes, the streets outside the Tacoma Detention Center and the offices of our Congressional representatives—carrying with them prayer and Eucharist, gospel truth and holy boldness. Every day, members of the St. Joseph community seek to incarnate the corporal works of mercy—living their faith in a manner that invites others to join us at the table of Christ and on all the mountains still before us.

These last years have not always been easy. At times, I have felt a bit like Ignatius, crawling in the dark near a precipice; yet, I am constantly renewed by the grace and goodness of St. Joseph parishioners. Even in times of painful scandal or heartbreaking silence from the larger Church, our Parish continues to nurture and sustain, to

strengthen and send forth—i.e., continues to be the base camp needed by so many of us, including me.

In this, my last year as Pastor of St. Joseph Parish and School, I feel profoundly blessed by the generosity of God, who has allowed me to serve this community. But I also know, the work of God requires all of us. As Pope Francis says, "When you see the poor, you pray, and then you feed them. That is how prayer works." When we see the graces of St. Joseph, we pray in thanksgiving, but then we need to support those graces—that is how a parish works, as well. And so I ask you now for the last time as Pastor: please help build this base camp, and sustain it by your prayers and actions. Pledge yourself to Stewardship, giving as God calls us all to give: fearlessly, generously, lovingly.

May the grace of God, whose love has called us together in this good work of St. Joseph, keep our hearts united now and for all the years to come.



Gospel Luke 17:5-10



St. Joseph Financial Update



This past year I have been trying to trust more. I'm often accused of being the pessimistic one in the office; everyone teases me that my first thought on any subject is the BUDGET. "Have faith the St. Joseph Community always rises to the occasion" is what I hear. I need to learn to trust that everyone in the community WILL support the parish, when asked. I have been working hard at this and feel I am more able to trust than I was two years ago. I know that we are truly blessed here at St. Joseph and our community gives so generously to many causes that touch our heart. Our special collection for the Bahamas was so generously supported that we just sent off a check for \$16,635. Earlier this summer we sent \$6,220 to the International Rescue Committee.

This weekend begins our annual Stewardship drive. This is the one time a year we ask that you confirm your membership and let us know your giving plans for the year. This is how we are able to plan an effective and accurate budget. It can be easy to assume that St. Joseph will always be here, doing what we do; but we need your confirmation so we can be ready to go when the need arises.

Come learn about the humanity behind the headlines, and the ways communities in El Salvador are creating hope with bold initiatives for social change.



Update - Winter Shelter

St. Joseph's Parish in partnership with St. Martin de Porres Shelter operates an Overflow Winter Shelter for up to 14 men, 5 nights a week (Tues-Sat) in the Old Gym underneath the Church. The shelter will open on Friday November 1st with a closing date of either March 30th or April 30th depending on need. A leadership team is being formed and we are now actively seeking volunteers to help with: 1) Serving as an overnight host, 2) Providing 14 lunch bags once a month 3) Doing setup once a week (takes about an hour) and/or assisting with weekly shopping. An orientation for all volunteers will take place on Thursday, October 17th, 7:00 pm - 9:00 in the Social Hall. A mandatory training for anyone serving as an overnight host will precede this orientation in the Parish Center from 6:30 pm - 7:00.
