

Beyond That Roar is Life

Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you have been purchased at a price. Therefore glorify God in your body.

-1 Corinthians 6:17-20-

The year after I graduated from college, while thoughts of the Jesuits were still far away, I moved to the Midwest to become a graduate student in English Literature at the University of Chicago. With very little money, I lived on the edge of the Hyde Park neighborhood, near Lake Shore Drive, and worked part-time as a bartender. The small apartment I shared with another graduate student was close to the tracks of the elevated train system—what Chicagoans call the *L*.

Those who have visited Chicago or lived there for any length of time, or even seen it in the movies, know that the L is a major part of public transportation in the city—running big trains about fifteen feet off the ground and making a tremendous amount of noise. I lived about a block from those tracks and, when I first moved in, I didn't think I would ever sleep again. Every night, every few minutes, the northbound train would roar by, followed just a few minutes later by the southbound train—which in turn would be followed by another northbound one. And so it went, all through the night.

The roar and rumble of the trains seemed impossible to bear, at first. But gradually, I got use to the noise—so used to it, in fact, that I could fall asleep and never even think about it. Within a few months, I stopped hearing it completely and stopped noticing how its roar and rumble covered up every other sound and left me deaf to the rest of the city.

But the fact that I stopped noticing the noise doesn't mean that it wasn't affecting me—wasn't making me just a bit edgier and perhaps a bit more well suited to the harshness of the city. All it meant was that I had grown numb to it. The roar of the northbound train and the rumble of the southbound became background noise—covering up everything else and disappearing in their own repetition.

It was only later, after I had left Chicago to live in far-western Alaska as a Jesuit Volunteer, that I really noticed what the noise had done to me. For the first time in two years, the roar and the rumble were gone and I could suddenly hear things at night—the wind in the trees and the voice of my housemates downstairs, the sound of music playing from the boys' dorm next door and the laughter of the children on their way home. Ironically, I suddenly became a very light sleeper, as I realized a world of sounds that had been masked for me by the clattering noise of the L. In the wilderness of

Alaska, I suddenly lost that great roar of noise and the numbness it entailed, and could hear my own heart soften, as I became part of a community of voices, a community of whispered prayers and gentle laughter, of breezes rustling and snow falling, a community alive with sounds that had been drowned out by the single, manufactured noise of the train that passed by me.

I had not thought of living near the L in many years, but then a quiet morning brought these memories back to me. I was sitting in my office with a cup of coffee, trying to find a moment for prayer before the day began. Opening the Gospel of John, I turned to the story of the call of the first disciples—one of my favorite passages where John the Baptist points to Jesus and says "Behold the Lamb of God." And then they follow Jesus to find out what John means. Reading that passage, I began to wonder what I would have done, or if I even could have heard the words at all. Preoccupied as I am by the lure of work and by my psychic "to-do" list, by noise of politics and by the constant drumbeat of outrage and distraction that is public media, I wonder if I would have ever heard the words of John or the invitation of Jesus to "Come and see."

The truth is that it is not easy to hear the small voice calling us in the night; not easy to hear the words of our baptism that invite us to receive a new name and become a new people. For the world is loud in our ears—rattling and rumbling just outside our windows with messages of fear and anger, doubt and despair, war and terror—and just like living next to the L, we have become used to it, hardened to it, and we don't even notice the deafening isolation it invites. Fifteen years after the fall of the towers and the burning wreckage in Pennsylvania, fifteen years after the Pentagon was struck by a plane full of innocent people, war has become simply the background to our lives, and the great noise of suffering and death hardly even wakes us when it passes.

In these first weeks of the fall and these last weeks before the election, we are particularly targeted by all the noise—and by those who would pierce the noise by shouting louder, speaking more coarsely and outrageously to us, or by those who would simply lull us back to sleep. We are deafened by the rattle of death, which clouds our hearts and lets us barely notice when children blow themselves up or when millions are housed in refugee camps. How can we hear the whisper of life after years of hearing nothing but death?

In the midst of all this noise, what can we do? With hearts accustomed to the roar, what chance is there to hear the quiet invitation to life? Perhaps it is St. Paul who offers the best advice:

Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you have been purchased at a price. Therefore glorify God in your body.

We must stand and acknowledge that all these calls of death and despair are not the truth within us, for we have—in our very core—a deeper truth, spoken not loudly but constantly by the Spirit we have been given. We must stop being numbed by the roar and rattle of the world around us and become a people of discernment and prayer-not yelling to God for what we want, but listening to God's quiet voice, already within us, even now offering something new, promising something we have almost forgot: life, love, hope, peace! We must deny power to the clatter and the clamber that calls us to despair and fear; deny all the voices that preach consumption in place of compassion, security in place of freedom, power in place of the cross. We must listen to our hearts, which have been healed by the touch of Christ Jesus, and purchased at the price of his blood.

Then our ears shall be opened and our hearts shall proclaim the gospel, which cannot be silenced: mercy and communion, freedom and salvation, love and courage, life and hope for all of God's people, for all of God's creation!



Remember, you are not to prepare your defense beforehand, for I myself shall give you a wisdom in speaking that all your adversaries will be powerless to resist or refute. You will even be handed over by parents, brothers, relatives, and friends, and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name, but not a hair on your head will be destroyed. By your perseverance you will secure your lives."

All Are Invited To Come Forward




