

The Voice in the Wilderness

God saw the world falling to ruin because of fear and immediately acted to call it back with love. God invited it by grace, preserved it by love, and embraced it with compassion.

-John Chrysologus-

If I were to choose a means by which to save the world, and call humanity back to a moral way of life, I think that John the Baptist would very likely have been my first choice for a messiah. The ascetic, living in the desert, clad in camels' hair and a leather belt, with nothing on his table but locust and wild honey—this prophet of the old style appeals to me, in part because he so clearly articulates my own self-judgment and self-appraisal. In my heart, as I reflect on my faults of vanity and pride, of selfishness and smallness of mind, I can imagine his voice, speaking to me in the same way he spoke to the crowds at the Jordan. I hear him, bellowing out in that powerful voice, filled with the tones of the Old Testament God—a voice that attracts by its certainty, even as it offers the most profound judgment and inescapable condemnation: "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance. . . . Even now the ax lies at the root of the trees. Therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire." Now that is good stuff! Drillsergeant Christianity! It stings and it summons; it kicks a listener in the backside and reminds us just how miserable and despicable we are. This is just what I think I really need to become better; just what I think the world needs! Just the kind of messiah who can topple our own intractable sinfulness and all our enemies—both internal and external. A messiah who will punish the world in its depravity and darkness. Yes, I think John the Baptist would be my kind of messiah: ax and fire, wrath and the destruction of all those bad folks.

Nor do I think I am alone in my predilection for a Church of John the Baptist. Every day, I meet people whose hearts and minds are filled with self-judgment and self-condemnation, who are constantly seeking repentance, yet believe they deserve nothing but the fire. They hear the words of the prophet at the Jordan, and they are certain those words apply to them: a brood of vipers, unable to provide proof of their righteousness. At the same time, I meet others who sense that they have taken up the mantle of John, and are filled with the righteous rage of the morally pure. These people cannot wait for the judgment to fall upon whatever brood of vipers they happen to oppose. And in this desire, it matters little if one is liberal or conservative, traditional or progressive, religious or secular, Alt-right or far left: we all seem, at times, to want a messiah after the model of the Baptist, who will condemn the Pharisees among us and shout God's warnings in the street (or at least post them in the comments section of various publications). Perhaps not surprisingly, these groups—the self-loathing and the self-righteous—often involve the same people, whose pain at feeling condemned leads them to condemn others. Yet for both, the message of the Baptist seems the true redemption and the most profound expression of a just and righteous God.

Given this attraction to John's message, I admit that I am happy

that none of us chooses how the world is redeemed. For while the message of repentance and self-recognition, of justice and transformation, preached by John the Baptist, is an important moment in every life and in every community, that message is not, itself, salvation. It is not enlightenment, but only the first glimmer of light, which, with grace, might help us turn towards the dawn.

In the first week (i.e., first movement) of the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius, the retreatant is invited to examine her life in much the way that John calls the people of Israel to examine theirs. Meditating on the sin of the angels, on the sin Adam and Eve, on the sin of the world, and then on his own history of sin-of all the ways in which he has lived "as a source of corruption and contagion from which has issued countless sins an evils and the most offensive poison" (Sp.Ex. 58)—the retreatant is moved to reflect "How it is that the earth did not open to swallow me up, and create new hells in which I should be tormented forever!" (Sp.Ex. 60). Yet, this realization that she is a sinner, that she is one who lives among, as John notes, a "brood of vipers," is only a means by which the retreatant can come to recognize how much more than justice God offers us—i.e., how much greater is the promise of "the one who comes after me." No, the flame, ignited in the second turn of the Advent wreath, in the second week of the Spiritual Exercises, is not the flame of some new hell, awaiting us because of God's righteous judgment; it is not the fire of retribution, into which we are to be thrown like chaff. Rather, it is the flame on the roadside, that causes us to turn away from the darkness, and move towards the east, where the new light has begun to grown along the roadway to Bethlehem.

On the first Sunday of Advent, we lit a single candle, a call to us to awaken to the work that God is still doing in the world. In a time of great brutality and cold, when children are stolen from their parents and locked in cages in the name of security; when refugees are imprisoned in cold and crowded cells, so that the smell of their sweat will not contaminate the clothing of their guards; when trillions are spent on weapons of death, while agents of life call out, unheard, for the barest scraps, we can easily seek to avoid the call to awaken. Yet, God, who each day remakes the world anew, will not let us slumber, and so the light is lit, and we are called out of the warmth of our beds and the comfort of our own dark thoughts, that we might believe in the light and in the small acts of goodness and love that are never extinguished.

In this second Sunday, we light another candle, which calls us not just to awaken, but to repent, to turn our path towards the light that is to come. With the words of the

Baptist echoing in our ears, we are called to acknowledge who we are: loved sinners, whom the darkness has not yet overcome. Women and men, prone to judgment of ourselves and others, but desirous of the judgment that is to say, the mercy—of God. We have awakened, and we see the sin that surrounds us and invests itself, even in our hearts; but, we also see the light that calls us back, that invites us forward, that illumines not just what is broken in us—though that, of course—but also that part which longs to be healed, and preserved, and loved, and embraced. The voice in the wilderness, the summons of the herald, the call of him who comes before: this makes us face our brokenness, but it does not make us whole. For that we seek, step by step, light by single light, the one at the horizon, the one who alone brings the dawn.






Gospel Matthew 3:1-12



A voice of one crying out in the desert, 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths.'


John wore clothing made of camel's hair and had a leather belt around his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey. At that time Jerusalem, all Judea, and the whole region around the Jordan were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins.

When he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to his baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance. And do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I tell you, God can raise up children to Abraham from these stones. Even now the ax lies at the root of the trees. Therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire. I am baptizing you with water, for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fan is in his hand. He will clear his threshing floor and gather his wheat into his barn, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."











All Are Invited To Come Forward








- 1. Console my people, the ones dear to me: speak to the heart of Jerusalem: the time of your morning is ended now. The Lord of life will come. *Ref.*



In November we completed the first part of our annual stewardship drive. Thank you to everyone who has pledged and reaffirmed your membership for the year!
