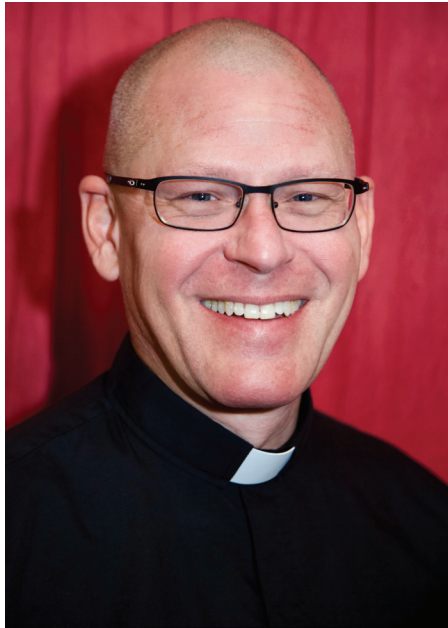

Dear Friends -

On behalf of the new Pastoral and Mission Council, I'd like to add emphasis to some of Fr. Glen's words in his first letter as pastor. But before I do that, I want to acknowledge how fortunate we are to have a new pastor who is familiar with our community, steeped in Ignatian Spirituality and strong in the Jesuit charisms of discernment, justice, peace, and care for the poor and our common home. He's also an all-around nice guy!

In his letter to the parish, Fr. Glen outlined some of the important concerns in front of us in this time of change: the pandemic, the economy, racial injustice, in-person Mass, and the reopening of our school. He has made clear to me and the Council that it is our job, lay and ordained together, to address these concerns with prayer, listening, and action.

He has also made it clear that lay leadership is his organizational priority. The incoming Council is taking that to heart and has already begun conversations on the issues outlined by Fr. Glen as a way to form ourselves as consultative leaders with the pastor. That said, lay leadership does not rest with the Council alone. All parishioners carry this responsibility by baptism and if we are to thrive as a faith community, we will need your participation and engagement.

There are several ways we plan to work on this with Fr. Glen:

- **Managing the many levels of change at hand in our community today.** This includes new pastoral leadership, a new Council, new consultative procedures, evolving COVID-19 operational changes, new staff assignments and routines, decreased sacrificial giving, and fundamental social change in the larger community. We will strive to meet these challenges with openness, careful listening, sensitivity, good humor, and thoughtful action.
- **The review and adoption of a Constitution** that clearly documents the role of the Council and sets out parish processes for communication, consultation, and decision making.
- **The renewal of Commissions** that develop program priorities for specific ministry areas, including Liturgy and Worship, Parish Life, Faith Justice, Faith Formation and School.
- **A closer relationship with the Finance Council** in the budgetary process that will assure, as Fr. Glen says, "greater transparency and member control."
- **The development of an improved communication strategy** that provides opportunities for listening to parishioners and informing the community of God's grace and the action of the Spirit in our midst.

Utmost in our mind is our responsibility to preserve and invigorate the Body of Christ in our community. With Fr. Glen's leadership and pastoral presence, the council's advice, the work of our dedicated staff, and the inclusion and engagement of the community, St. Joseph will continue to be a place where we gather to experience the grace of Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit. And it will be a place where we are sent from to personally share that grace, love, and fellowship with all those around us.

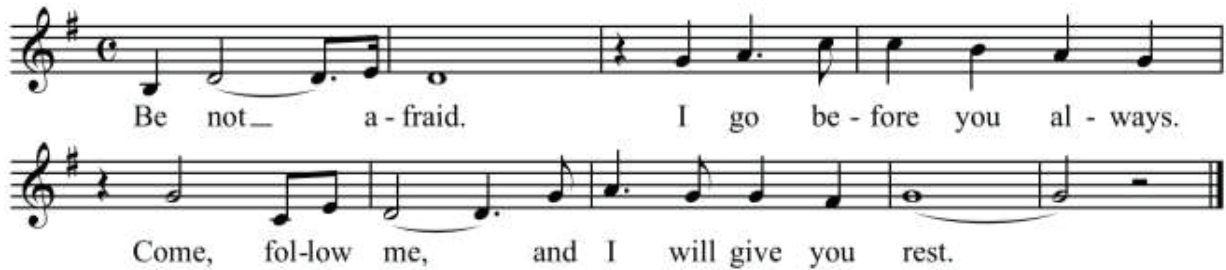

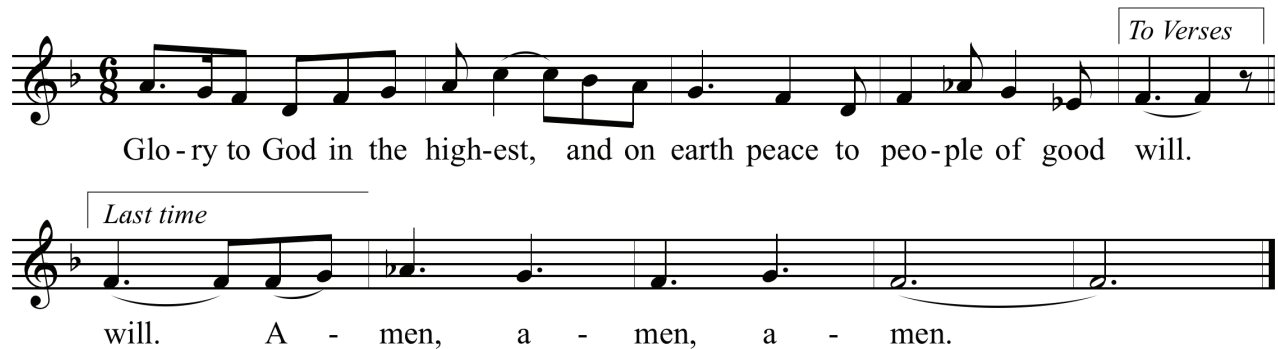

ANNUAL CATHOLIC APPEAL

Every year, in the Annual Catholic Appeal, we are invited to support the ministries and mission of the Archdiocese of Seattle. But this year, under our new Archbishop Paul Etienne, there is a special urgency to this invitation—and, I think, a better reason to give what you can.
