

Meet the Parish Council!

To help you get to know the St. Joseph Parish Pastoral and Mission Council, we'll be publishing biographies of each member in the coming months. This week – **Leo Lyons.**



Leo Lyons

Listening to Leo Lyons talk about St. Joe's, it's clear that he has a great deal of affection for the place. But the more you listen to him, it becomes clear that St. Joe's isn't just a place to go to church for Leo; it's part of his identity.

Born and raised in Buffalo, New York, Leo attended Canisius College (a Jesuit school), majoring in Finance. Immediately after college, Leo decided to join the Jesuit Volunteer Corps, an organization that provides opportunities for lay volunteers to serve communities around the world.

As luck would have it, he was sent to Seattle in 1978 on his assignment, teaching Physical Education, coaching sports, and supporting the confirmation program at St. Joseph School. He worked as a JV at the school for a year, then decided to stay in Seattle. He got married to a local "Hiller" (someone who grew up on Capitol Hill), has four children, three of whom attended St. Joseph School, all while living just a few blocks away from the church. He has been a member of the Parish the entire time and served on a previous iteration of the Parish Council.

After his formative experience as a Jesuit Volunteer, Leo took a job at Boeing, working with commercial contracts. For 39 years, Leo was able to travel all over the world, facilitating sales of Boeing's planes. Having just retired last year, the travel bug stuck. "I've been nearly everywhere," he says, but points to Europe as one of his favorite places to travel. "Any place I can get out and walk around, I just love."

While raising his family on Capitol Hill, Leo has embraced his passion for social justice and Ignatian Spirituality. He serves on the

Board of the Ignatian Spirituality Center, and is very involved in the St. Joe's Men's ministry, planning and leading multiple retreats, many of which were at Nestucca Sanctuary in Oregon. "It helps 'shrink' the church for me," he says, explaining how small groups make for a more reflective community.

Just prior to COVID, Leo began volunteering with the Archdiocese to distribute communion to patients at Harborview Medical Center. After moving his partner Joanne's mother to an assisted-living facility, he was struck by the importance of the communion distribution ministry, and immediately signed up to help. Though the ministry has been paused due to the pandemic, Leo is looking forward to starting again when it's safe to do so. "It has been a powerful experience," he says.

During quarantine, Leo has stayed busy remodeling with major projects around the house, but he's especially fond of woodworking. "I've been repairing these old benches in my spare time," he says as he points to a collection of park benches in various stages of repair. He's also managed to get out of the city, with road trips to Pittsburgh and a recent sailboat trip to the San Juan Islands.

Leo is looking forward to serving on the Parish Council, especially during these uncertain times. "Things are always changing," he says. "But I love this church, and I believe in it. I want to do anything I can to help it as a community."

A Message from St. Joseph Parish about Safely Re-opening

Dear friends,

As the COVID-19 situation constantly changes in King County, we want you to know that we are committed to your health and safety as we make decisions regarding re-opening the Church. Nothing is as important as your health and the health of your family. We promise to always put your health *first* as we make decisions deliberately, with the guidance of experts and evidence-based science.

The Church is currently open for small in-person Masses on Sunday. Each week, the Parish Health Advisory Board evaluates the public health data from the county, along with any new recommendations from the Archdiocese and the Governor's Office. Based on this information, the Health Advisory Board makes a recommendation to the Pastor as to whether in-person Mass should be held.

Please know that while we wish to continue in-person Mass, we will not hesitate to cancel weekend services if the evidence suggests that it would be prudent to do so. We will also continue to livestream Mass indefinitely, so that no one feels an obligation to attend in-person services if they do not feel comfortable.

For many months now, the One Parish One Prisoner ministry at St. Joe's has been meeting and supporting our friend, Wes Atkinson, who has been incarcerated in the state prison in Shelton. Several members of the group talk to Wes regularly by phone, and he is enthusiastic about becoming a part of our community upon release.

Wes will be released on August 24. A small group of parishioners will meet him in Shelton and drive him to his new home in Shoreline. Please read the introduction that Wes wrote, and see our request for support below:

"Hi, my name's Wes, and I'm 29 years old. I was in prison back when this program was still being talked about and now I get a chance to actually do it! A little about me: I've been to prison four times, but this time, though, from day one I've been on a mission to finally change my life and I'm excited to do that with you guys.

The biggest things I want in life are to have a family and hopefully get married one day and I realized that's never going to happen living how I've been living. I'm ready for change, I'm really looking forward to trying to join a union when I get out. I don't really want a job, I want a career; something I can grow in and excel at and one day retire on.

I enjoy the outdoors a lot - I've worked on farms and ranches and around animals a bunch. I also like the idea of traveling. (I've never been outside of California, Idaho, or Washington.) I'm looking forward to meeting all of you who I haven't got to meet yet."

Magis Family Formation

Support Seattle U Food Workers

Because of the COVID pandemic, Seattle University transitioned to online classes and closed their campus, leaving 120 food service workers without a job.

These are some of the lowest paid workers at Seattle U, many of them immigrants, and almost all have very limited resources to see them through. In order to fill the gap, the service workers union has launched a campaign to raise funds from the community, to be distributed to the workers who are in the greatest financial need.

MEAL PREPARATION:

- · Please use extra care in preparing meals to maximize hygiene. Wash hands and kitchen surfaces thoroughly before proceeding.
- · A typical meal might be a sandwich, a drink, a piece of fruit, some chips/snacks, a treat and a next day morning/afternoon snack, such as a granola bar, crackers, extra fruit, and a napkin. Be mindful when thinking of next day snacks that there is no refrigeration.
- · Please pack the meals in individual bags. Use whatever type of bag you deem best.
- *Remember, we are still accepting food donations for Blessed Sacrament Food Pantry and Facing Homelessness lunches. You can drop those off in the Hospitality room during church open hours.

July has been a month full of activity at St. Joseph. After four months of online-only services, we began holding small in-person Masses. The staff has been busy making sure the in-person Mass adheres to the highest safety protocols, while also meeting your spiritual needs.

While the Parish Center remains closed to the public, please know we are here working both in the office and remotely on the parish operations, along with continuing to provide our online content for those who can't yet attend Mass. We are currently working on Fall programs and scheduling sacraments as well, now that we can hold small Masses.

Your response to the ACA has been inspiring. We are still awaiting the final tally from the Archdiocese, but we have fulfilled our matching goal, and with that, we expect to hit our goal. This achievement is fantastic - it is refreshing to not have this expense looming over us this year!

The parish itself is on-budget, as the St. Joe's family continues to generously support our parish. Look for more information on the full parish budget during our stewardship drive in September/October.
