Community Spotlight

Each week, we've been bringing you a profile of a member of the St. Joseph Pastoral and Mission Council. This week, we're debuting a new series, *Community Spotlight*. In this series, we'll be highlighting innovative work that parishioners are doing around the community. This week's feature is <u>Ethnic Cultural Heritage Online Exchange</u> (echoX), an online conversational platform for ethnic culture communities to engage with each other, as well as the general public, in awareness of the shared spaces we inhabit, both digital and geographic.

EchoX intentionally creates a platform to highlight and amplify our region's ethnic cultural community voices. Peter Lam, a parishioner at St. Joe's, co-founded the initiative with his wife, Ann Wright, and Peter Davenport, in 2018. Ann, a Seattle U alum, serves as the Executive Director.

Ann and Peter, who were married at St. Joe's, are the parents of three multi-racial children. After experiencing first-hand the institutional racism that is built into school systems, as well as cultural discrimination and microaggressions, they decided to create an organization that would intentionally support our region's ethnic cultural communities to lend support to students, their families, and their communities who experienced similar situations.

The echoX founders recognized that communities of color, immigrant communities, and Indigenous communities are too often misrepresented or rendered invisible in mainstream media and public policy. This filters down to students who need support. "We are really passionate about empowering students of color," Ann explains. "One of our children had a diversity club at her school that really helped her through high school. But what about students who don't have that support? There is a real need for that support and community."

After researching options, including surveying various community organizations, Ann and Peter decided that echoX's core mission should be connecting people in new and innovative ways. The central community-based components of echoX are fourfold: a *Directory* of area cultural and ethnic organizations in the Pacific Northwest, *Voices*, curated area digital content, a one-stop-shop *Events Calendar* for arts and culture in the area, and *DIGITIZE*, a youth-focused component.

The DIGITIZE component is driven by high school students that have been encouraged to voice their views through various multimodal digital tools. Through online and in-person workshops, students can learn computer code, giving them another tool to connect and make their voices heard.

As they build the DIGITIZE program, high schoolers will begin teaching workshops, creating peer networks and organic communities so that students can support one another. "Kids are digital natives," Ann says, "but often don't have the coding skills necessary to make structural change. It's the difference between giving someone a ride and giving them the keys to the car."

In addition to teaching coding skills, echoX is a platform for amplifying local cultural and ethnic voices by collecting articles, art, and other digital media. "We are trying to honor communities by highlighting their voice and amplifying it. We make space on the platform for direct voice."

EchoX is for everyone, says Peter. "The uniqueness of the site is that it isn't trying to push one agenda for one community," he says, "but rather to help all communities connect and empathize. We all came from somewhere, and for Indigenous people that somewhere is here. We are all rooted in culture. Culture is alive and organic. This is a way to connect people across cultures."

A Message from St. Joseph Parish about Safely Re-opening

Dear friends,

As the COVID-19 situation constantly changes in King County, we want you to know that we are committed to your health and safety as we make decisions regarding re-opening the Church. Nothing is as important as your health and the health of your family. We promise to always put your health *first* as we make decisions deliberately, with the guidance of experts and evidence-based science.

The Church is currently open for small in-person Masses on Sunday. Each week, the Parish Health Advisory Board evaluates the public health data from the county, along with any new recommendations from the Archdiocese and the Governor's Office. Based on this information, the Health Advisory Board makes a recommendation to the Pastor as to whether in-person Mass should be held.

Please know that while we wish to continue in-person Mass, we will not hesitate to cancel weekend services if the evidence suggests that it would be prudent to do so. We will also continue to livestream Mass indefinitely, so that no one feels an obligation to attend in-person services if they do not feel comfortable.







I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.









Support Seattle U Food Workers

Because of the COVID pandemic, Seattle University transitioned to online classes and closed their campus, leaving 120 food service workers without a job.

These are some of the lowest paid workers at Seattle U, many of them immigrants, and almost all have very limited resources to see them through. In order to fill the gap, the service workers union has launched a campaign to raise funds from the community, to be distributed to the workers who are in the greatest financial need.

Rev. Gary Lazzeroni, pastor of St. Joseph in Vancouver, Washington, along with ten other priests, sent a letter asking parishes and parishioners across the Archdiocese for help. This summer, Tent City 3 hosted by our neighbors, St. Mark's Episcopal Church. As a parish, are supporting our friends with bagged meals every Wednesday.

WHAT: To meet the current need, we hope to provide 40 bagged meals each Wednesday, so we are asking each volunteer to sign up to make 10 bagged meals.

WHEN: We will be providing dinner meal bags every Wednesday evening in August and through Sept 15th.

WHERE: We ask that you deliver the meal bags to the St. Joe's parking lot at 5:30pm sharp on your assigned Wednesday and a volunteer will deliver all the meals to Tent City Coordinators at St. Mark's. (Look for the car parked near the elevator to the parish center.) Please follow social distancing protocols when dropping off the bags.

MEAL PREPARATION:

- · Please use extra care in preparing meals to maximize hygiene. Wash hands and kitchen surfaces thoroughly before proceeding.
- · A typical meal might be a sandwich, a drink, a piece of fruit, some chips/snacks, a treat and a next day morning/afternoon snack, such as a granola bar, crackers, extra fruit, and a napkin. Be mindful when thinking of next day snacks that there is no refrigeration.
- · Please pack the meals in individual bags. Use whatever type of bag you deem best.
- *Remember, we are still accepting food donations for Blessed Sacrament Food Pantry and Facing Homelessness lunches. You can drop those off in the Hospitality room during church open hours.

Your response to the ACA has been inspiring. We are still awaiting the final tally from the Archdiocese, but we have fulfilled our matching goal, and with that, we expect to hit our goal. This achievement is fantastic - it is refreshing to not have this expense looming over us this year!

The parish itself is on-budget, as the St. Joe's family continues to generously support our parish.
