## The Society of St. Vincent de Paul

How do we care for our neighbors during a pandemic that requires us to stay in non-contact lockdown? How do home visits work when we can't visit homes? How does an organization that operates almost entirely from cash donations after Sunday Mass survive the cancellation of in-person Mass? And how does a charity respond when they begin to get calls from former donors, now in need of assistance because of a global recession?

These are some of the questions that St. Joseph Conference of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul has had to grapple with in recent months as the COVID-19 pandemic suddenly threw global and local financial and social stability into a tailspin. I reached out to members of St. Vinnie's, as it is affectionately called, to see how they are responding. What I found was a resilient and committed group of people who are committed to serving the needy in new and innovative ways during the worst crisis in a century.

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is 175 years old, and has had a presence at St. Joseph Parish since 1927. Run entirely by laypeople, the St. Joe's Conference of St. Vinnie's has 15 volunteer members who help with intake and home visits. Historically, the group has focused on providing financial and material assistance to anyone within the parish boundaries, primarily with rent, utility, and grocery assistance.

In "normal" times, a person in need of financial or other material assistance would call SVdP of King County, who would assign a parish conference to work with them, based on geographical proximity. If a call came within from the St. Joe's parish boundaries, a pair of volunteers from St. Vinnie's would head out to visit the caller. "It's more comfortable that way," Dan Tobin, longtime volunteer, explained to me. "The home visit is what makes us unique."

After the visit, the parish conference would determine what they could share with the neighbor, depending on the need and resources available. Another home visit, and assistance delivered! COVID, of course, threw a wrench into that system.

So, how does St. Vincent de Paul function in this new normal? First, they had to get creative with fundraising. "All of our funds came from the once-a-month collection at church," Dan told me. King County SVdP was funded by thrift stores, most of which are now closed by the pandemic. Now, all donations have been moved online.

The Conference also had to find innovative ways of delivering assistance. I knew that they continued serving folks, even during the pandemic, but I didn't know exactly what how. To find out, I talked to Joe Schumm, president of the St. Joe's Conference.

"We made the transition within a few days to all-virtual," he said. "We still have two people who 'go' now, but this time it's a call via cell phone." Then, St. Vinnie's will either mail a check or drop off donations at the client's doorstep. "We started to do no-contact delivery before the pizza companies were even talking about that idea," Joe said, laughing.

The demographics of need have also been changing, as a result of both long-term economic disparities and the pandemic. Before the pandemic, many lower-income neighbors had been priced out of Capitol Hill, leading the St. Joe's Conference to expand their mission into other parish areas. However, since the pandemic, people from across the economic spectrum have been calling, as the economic fallout from pandemic does not discriminate based on ZIP code.

It's a whole different landscape for St. Vinnie's these days, but the volunteers are up for the challenge. "We're changing out framework," Joe said. "We're being proactive, working with landlords and tenants. We try not to just be there as someone bringing information, but rather to try to make a real connection."

Joe explained his personal connection to St. Vinnie's: "Four years ago, I had just turned 50, and had donated to St. Vincent's for years. I realized then that it was time to really engage. It has changed my life. It has changed who I am. When you stop, and put yourself in the moment, it's really transformative."

## St. Joseph Financial Update

#### PAYROLL PROTECTION PROGRAM

In the spirit of transparency, I want to make sure that all Parishioners stay informed of our Parish financial decisions. Based on the recommendations of the Archdiocese and our Parish Finance Council, we applied for the federal Payroll Protection Program (PPP) in July, and were approved on the last day that the loan was available. We received \$181,800, almost all of which is likely to be forgiven.

As you may recall, part of our initial hesitation regarding the loan was that the funds would be scarce at the beginning, with many businesses desperately needed them. We know how much you many of you are struggling and we didn't feel right about asking for more in the current year. At that point we felt like we were better off financially than many businesses, and could weather a few months of the economic downturn, Now, six months later, it is clear that we have to adapt and take steps for our staff wellbeing.

Our plan is to use the funds to help offset our current negative budget. As part of the fall stewardship drive, everyone will get a chance to view the budget for FY 20-21. Having the PPP funds available will allow us to continue to maintain our staff without having to increase our income for 20-21. Expect a new look for the state of the Parish mailing along with constant examination of all our costs.

All but three parishes in the Seattle Archdiocese participated in the PPP. Our parish family has continued to support us and I am personally grateful for all your love and support. My hope is that we continue to support St. Joseph together. As always, please reach out with any questions or concerns. I'm happy to email or talk to you anytime.
