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A Message from St. Joseph Head of School, Patrick Fennessy

This week, as St. Joseph School prepares for an online opening on September 8th, Head of School Patrick Fennessy shares his thoughts on virtual learning, resilience, and an historical connection one hundred years in the making.

Twelve years after St. Joseph School opened in 1907, the world was faced with a pandemic: the Spanish Flu. At the same time, the local hockey team, the Seattle Metropolitans, played in the Stanley Cup, having won it two years before. That series was canceled due to the pandemic, and it remains the only time a U.S. major professional sports championship ended with co-champions: the Seattle Metropolitans and the Montreal Canadiens.

Fast forward 101 years, and we find ourselves in a similar situation: we're faced with a global pandemic *and* we have a hockey team again (thought we may have to wait a little longer for another Stanley Cup).

I've been thinking a lot about how St. Joseph School students and families faced the school closures that occurred a century ago. Did parents group together and homeschool their children? Did the nuns who taught here back then put together packets of work for their students and deliver them to students' homes? I don't know for sure, but I'm certain that they did all they could to support their students and families.

When COVID-19 forced us to close our doors last March, our teachers pivoted to online instruction in a matter of days. We closed school on a Wednesday and by Monday, our school was totally online. Our teachers prepared packets, we handed out laptops to any student who needed one, and we worked hard to stay connected to our students while they were at home. While remote learning will never replace the sacred instrument of direct, in-person education, our teachers continued our school's mission to educate and inspire students to reach the potential God has planted in each of them, with incredible grace and efficacy.

Over the summer, all of our teachers took part in professional development, especially the Global Online Academy, demonstrating one of our core values: being open to growth. As school begins, our students will find teachers who are experts in delivering the rigorous curriculum we offer in an online environment. It is a daunting task, but our teachers are up for the challenge, as we continue our tradition of excellence.

If you're not familiar with the school, a brief introduction: St. Joseph School is home to about 550 students, kindergarten through 8th grade, divided into three classes per grade level. We are one of the largest Catholic K-8 schools on the West Coast. We're a founding member of a national group of Jesuit Parish Grade Schools. When our students graduate, they head to the best high schools in our area, well-prepared to use the gifts they have in service to others. Our goal is to educate students who are intellectually competent,

religious, loving, committed to justice, and open to growth. Those of you who studied at Jesuit high schools will recognize those characteristics as the profile of the students at graduation.

It's a blessing to be a part of this parish. We are *your* school. Please pray for us as we begin this most unusual school year. If you'd like to learn more about our school, please don't hesitate to reach out.





Since he had no way of paying it back, his master ordered him to be sold, along with his wife, his children, and all his property, in payment of the debt. At that, the servant fell down, did him homage, and said, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back in full.' Moved

with compassion the master of that servant let him go and forgave him the loan. When that servant had left, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a much smaller amount. 

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church.


I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you so you are to love one another. If there is this love among you then all will know that you are my disciples.



St. Joseph Financial Update

PAYROLL PROTECTION PROGRAM


In the spirit of transparency, I want to make sure that all Parishioners stay informed of our Parish financial decisions. Based on the recommendations of the Archdiocese and our Parish Finance Council, we applied for the federal Payroll Protection Program (PPP) in July, and were approved on the last day that the loan was available. We received \$181,800, almost all of which is likely to be forgiven.


As you may recall, part of our initial hesitation regarding the loan was that the funds would be scarce at the beginning, with many businesses desperately needed them. We know how much you many of you are struggling and we didn't feel right about asking for more in the current year. At that point we felt like we were better off financially than many businesses, and could weather a few months of the economic downturn, Now, six months later, it is clear that we have to adapt and take steps for our staff wellbeing.

Our plan is to use the funds to help offset our current negative budget. As part of the fall stewardship drive, everyone will get a chance to view the budget for FY 20-21. Having the PPP funds available will allow us to continue to maintain our staff without having to increase our income for 20-21. Expect a new look for the state of the Parish mailing along with constant examination of all our costs.

All but three parishes in the Seattle Archdiocese participated in the PPP. Our parish family has continued to support us and I am personally grateful for all your love and support. My hope is that we continue to support St. Joseph together. As always, please reach out with any questions or concerns. I'm happy to email or talk to you anytime.

The Called to Serve as Christ Campaign is kicking off this weekend. This campaign, orchestrated by the Archdiocese of Seattle, supports the pension and medical needs of our retired priests and sisters.

The Archdiocese of Seattle has a canonical responsibility to provide **senior priests** with a pension and medical benefits. The present pay-as-you-go model for the priest pension and medical plans was sustainable when there was a large number of active priests paying into the plan, and a relatively small number receiving benefits.

Now, with relatively fewer priests in active ministry, compared to retired, the burdensome "pay as you go" model is no longer sustainable. As a result, parishes are paying more and more into the plans through increased billings and the Annual Catholic Appeal each year.



Following a successful campaign, the Archdiocese will eliminate the Annual Catholic Appeal's portion of funds designated to priest pension and senior priest medical expenses. Further, the Archdiocese plans to significantly reduce parish billings for the priest pension plan and eliminate the annual increases. Utilizing the income from investments to pay priest benefits puts the Archdiocese on more stable financial footing in addition to saving parishes approximately \$2.5 million a year in billings and assessments.


The campaign will also raise funds for **women religious**, who have played a crucial role in the history of our Church's mission in Western Washington. From schools to hospitals, from ministry to the poor to ministry in parishes, from retreat centers

to social justice and advocacy, the positive impact and reach of their work cannot be overstated. Because they have answered the call to serve as Christ, and because for decades they served with almost no compensation, the campaign will recognize, acknowledge and thank them for their sacrifice and service.



As part of the campaign, 15 percent of the funds raised by **each parish** will be returned for their local needs. Those individual needs will be identified by each parish. Funds raised could be used to reduce parish debt, complete capital improvement projects, grow parish endowments, or other purposes.





SUPPORT FOR OUR PRIESTS | \$55 MILLION

The Archdiocese of Seattle is blessed to have such dedicated and loving priests. As leaders of our faith family, these men have kept our Archdiocese vibrant and spiritual throughout their years of committed service. Because they have answered a call to serve us, as Christ, it leaves us with a clear moral obligation. We must ensure the most basic needs of our past, present and future priests are met.

We will accomplish this by:

- Improving and bolstering the Priest Pension Plan: \$40 million
- Strengthening the Senior Priest Medical Plan: \$15 million

SUPPORT FOR OUR WOMEN RELIGIOUS | \$24 MILLION

The Archdiocese of Seattle celebrates a rich history supported by women religious in numerous capacities. From schools to hospitals, stretching from Vancouver to the Canadian border, the positive impact and reach of their work is undeniable.

Sisters who have and will serve in the Archdiocese need and deserve an adequate and dignified retirement. With the assistance of women religious leaders serving in our Archdiocese, we have identified a strategy to address their needs through this campaign.

Aiding the sisters' pension and healthcare needs will allow them to continue their ministries, sharing God's love and presence with others.

SUPPORT FOR PARISHES | \$15 MILLION

Our parishes are the cornerstones and gathering places for our faith community. To follow the example of Jesus, we must support our parishes for them to serve parishioners in their daily lives. We plan to do that by getting directly involved in every community throughout our Archdiocese.



The Archdiocese has initiated a \$100 million campaign to provide long-term funding for retirement and medical needs of priests and women religious, as well as support of individual parishes. A successful campaign will allow the Archdiocese to:

- **Establish a stronger position** to provide a consistent, appropriate retirement for priests by moving from a pay-as-you-go system to a fully-funded model for priest pension and medical plans.
- Increase the ability of women religious orders to care for their senior members while continuing their ministry to God's people.
- Give parishes more resources for their local ministries, services, works and programs.
- Lead by example in prayer, action, and generosity.
- Reinforce a dynamic faith for the next generation of Catholics in Western Washington.
